Hello to you All

I was reflecting on the notes and opinions I have received from parishioners from time to time, critiquing something I have done or said, either in a homily, or the celebration of mass, or a person does not like the way an EME is dressed because they may be in jeans, etc.. Many times when people make these criticisms, they are unaware of the underlying circumstances of the situation, for example, a person acting as an EME was not on the schedule but we did not have enough EME's so they graciously volunteered, even saying Fr., I am not appropriately dressed should I do this?

This article is not meant to defend myself or the actions of others, except to say that I as your pastor, am always doing the best I can. Sometimes I make mistakes but it is always with your best interest at heart, it is never intentional. This article is meant to look to ourselves and what we all think of whenever we criticize anyone in this world.

As I reflect on this, I think of the Beatitude of "Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy." What does mercy mean? It is the ability to get right inside other people until we can see things with their eyes, think things with their minds and feel things with their feelings.

Most people are so focused on their own feelings and concerns rather than those of others. A scriptural example of this would be the visit of Jesus to the house of Martha and Mary in Lk. 10:38-42. This visit takes place only a few days prior to his death on the cross. Jesus was simply looking for a short rest from His travels. Martha loved Jesus, and so she would provide the best meal the house could supply. She bustled and hurried around and all He wanted was quiet. Martha meant to be kind, but she could hardly have been crueler. However, Mary did the opposite. She understood Jesus' wish. Jesus showed his appreciation of Mary's kindness and as a result, Martha took offense at the reaction of Jesus. Martha failed to see the inner motivation of not only Mary, but also Jesus.

I guess how often do we all react as Martha? I would say more often than not, I myself can be guilty of this as well. So a piece of advise I have is before we react from our emotions in criticizing, as Martha did, maybe we need to see what the motivations and emotions are of the person we are criticizing.

This weekend as you go home, I ask you to reflect on the following from this weekend's readings:

Can you imagine Paul speaking to the Lord? What did Paul say?

Visualize and imagine a conversation with the Lord?

How do you love as Jesus commanded?

Do you believe Jesus/ promise in John 15:7? What do you ask from Jesus?

FAITH WORKS

Jesus of Nazareth was the man who came to tell us that it is all right to trust our hopefulness. "Dream your mo impossible dream," he tells us. "Hope your most expansive hope, fantasize your wildest fan-

tasy, and you will have just begun. Out beyond those dreams, hopes, and fantasies, the generosity of my heavenly Father only begins. For eye has not seen nor has ear heard nor has it entered into the human heart what the heavenly Father has prepared for those who return his love."

It is the nature of hope that it shatters our sorrows and our fears, our disappointments and our anxieties. Hope has its healing effect because it enables us to see things differently, to put together the pieces of our life in a pattern we may not have tried before.

Our life can begin all over again. If we hold on to hope, we can see possibilities in the other and in ourselves which were not apparent before. Angers and injuries dissolve and love is reborn.

Jesus is the man of hope. He is the Christ, the one whose words and deeds reveal the heavenly Father to us as he was never revealed before. Jesus is the "sacrament" of God, the best revelation we will ever have of what God is like. Jesus' hope was rooted in the unshakable conviction that the power of God was at work in the world. He called it the "kingdom of God," and we sometimes call it the "reign of God."

The idea is that God has a plan for the world and that plan is going forward irresistibly. Jesus not only believed in the kingdom of God, he died for it. He was not only convinced that hope was valid, he went to his death because of that conviction. He knew that the power of God would guarantee that his death would not be in vain; he knew that death would have no final victory over him; he knew that the power of God would sweep away the temporary triumph of death. But he also knew he had to die.

Jesus claimed a special intimacy with the Father. Christians believe that God revealed "who God is" to us in a special way through Jesus; hence his hope was necessarily unique. Indeed the whole point of Jesus' life was that he disclosed to us a vision of hope based on his intimacy with God, something we would not dare believe, something we would not dare commit ourselves were it not for Jesus.

So Jesus went to his death with a special hope. Jesus knew he would win; he did not know how. Such is the anguish of all human life-no matter how hopeful. Jesus was supremely confident of the triumph of God's plan and of his own victory as the revelation of that plan. God's kingdom would succeed as certainly as does the seed become the tree, as does the tiny grain grow into the harvest.

The followers of Jesus who hope in the king-dom of God, live lives of courage, vigor, confidence, commitment, and generosity. they never stop trying, never give up, never sink into a rut, never turn back, never refuse an opportunity to help, never reject the possibility of reconciliation, never think that it is too late to begin again. For the followers of Jesus who hope in the kingdom of God, tomorrow is not merely the first day of the rest of their life; tomorrow will also be different even when today is the last of their life. Jesus brings a kind of certainty to hope, a certainty that we could never achieve alone. That's why we put our trust in him and allow him to form us with his great hope.

"Music expresses so much about us, much more than words alone ever could. If we are going to share with each other what we have learned about life and God, we must use all of our arts. Greetings and Salutations,

In today's Gospel, Jesus describes his relationship with the Father and our relationship with him. This reading makes me think of a story about a young man in high school who quit the football team because he lacked confidence and didn't have friends on the team. He later regretted his decision. It was much too hard for him to practice every day with all his self doubts. Confidence and friendship both can be tough to find. Many young people struggle to connect with their peers who will accept them as they are. Many also struggle to be confident in who they are. Today's gospel hits home on both points. Even though all of us teens and adults can feel alone and insecure, it reminds us that in some real way we are also connected to our Savior Jesus. Through that connection, we can discover and develop our talents for changing the world. We can also use this connection to call for help when we do feel disconnected and lonely. Young people and even adults struggle with confidence and loneliness. During these times reread this passage. Remember we are connected to the Savior of the world. The more you hang out with Jesus the stronger the connection will become. Involve yourself in Mass, scripture, prayer, and friendships with other Christians. You'll feel the connection growing. The more you strengthen that connection the easier it will be to find the confidence and friendships you've hoped for.

Reflection question... Do you know anyone at school or church that is lonely? Jesus wants them to feel connected to friendship. What could you do to ease their loneliness?

HIGH SCHOOL WITH MARY WILKERSON

!"Every person, at one time or another, experiences the intense pain of losing someone. Sometimes it is so unexpected that it hits you and a multitude of emotions pour out of you. It's hard to understand sometimes why someone dies? It's confusing, it is sad and it is painful. Yet, amongst all the pain and suffering it is the time when you become close to your family and friends and God. In the bible there is a story about Jesus coming to see his friend Lazarus,

John 11:33-36 "When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who had come with her, also weeping, He was deeply moved in spirit, and was troubled, and said, 'Where have you laid him?' They said, 'Lord, Come and see.' Jesus wept."

The beauty about being Catholic is having this deep connection with God and with our Catholic community. During difficult times we are not really alone. Recently, I participated in a prayer vigil for a family who was in need of prayer, community and love. We as a community came together and said the rosary. I have found that the rosary helps me cope if someone is sick, dying or even if you are suffering. It is powerful to have thousands sit together and pray for something. My mom even said "You know when two people pray for someone it does amazing things, just think about what a thousand prayers do." Even Jesus came and prayed for his friend when he suffered. At youth group we talked about how "if today was your last day what would you say to others, is there something unfinished in your life?" I learned that we should enjoy life and try to bring as many people to heaven as possible. We need to make sure that you touch as many people's lives as possible and make a difference. When you do die you know it's sad, and there is suffering but at least as Catholic's we know we will be in heaven. My challenge of the week is that you tell someone that you love them that you haven't told that to in awhile. For example, if you have been fighting with your siblings stop and tell them you love them. Hug your mom and dad. "


