Hello to you all,

Recently I have finished reading a book from Matthew Kelly entitled, *Rediscovering Catholicism*. Some of you out there may have read the book as well it has been in print for about two years now. I thought I would share some ideas from the book with all of you throughout the course of the year. In the first chapter of the book the following two thoughts are posed: Why has Christianity been rejected and The Cry for Help!

Why Has Christianity been rejected?

Increasing numbers of people are choosing not to attend Church these days, in particular the younger generations. Many of these people were raised Catholic, they are intelligent, contribute in the community but want nothing to do with the Church. Sometimes we have to look within ourselves and ask some probing and uncomfortable questions: "Is it possible that we failed to engage them? Did the hypocrisy of individual church members or leaders obscure their experience of God? Did we fail to feed them? Did we ever really welcome them?"

We call ourselves Christians because "we believe that the life and teachings of Jesus Christ are the personification of truth, sincerity, and authenticity, and, in a practical sense, simply the best way to live." Given that this is true and we know that in the twenty-first century people are hungering for authenticity and the best way to live, as Christians we must ask ourselves: "Why are more people not enthusiastically embracing Christianity? Why, in fact, are so many people so hostile toward Christ and his Church?"

The possible reason is that people have become wary, doubtful, skeptical, and sadly, even cynical in their search for the truth. The position is wrong but the attitude is understandable. What is the cause of this confusion on their part?

It would seem to be the "unprecedented proliferation of words, symbols, images, and every manner of communication in the latter part of the twentieth century. People are tired; they are worn out, overloaded with information, and overwhelmed with the social, political, and economic climate. They are not *striving* to thrive; they are merely trying to survive. This is a tired culture."

The Cry for Help!

These people, the non-Christian and non-practicing brothers and sisters are indirectly giving witness to the Gospel. Within the message they send there is a challenge for you and me to embrace a life rooted more fully in the example and teaching of Jesus Christ. These people are saying to us "Don't tell me- *show me*!"

Their cry is a cry for help because they are so hungry for a courageous example of the authentic life, a life lived to the fullest, in this day and age. When we do not live it they see us as hypocrites and become disillusioned. In the words of Mahtma Gandhi, a man who read the New Testament every day and often quoted Christian Scriptures, as he answered a question from a reporter when asked why he never became a Christian - "If I had ever met one, I would have become one." Ghandi was saying "Don't tell me- *show me*!" revealing his search for an authentic life.

We all desire to live and authentic life, to be a witness. We want to be true to ourselves. But we are human and at times we fail in this. We know the need for kindness, compassion, generosity, forgiveness, acceptance, freedom, and love, but we have divided our hearts with a thousand contradictions and compromises.

At every moment, the entire modern world kneels before us, begging, pleading, beckoning for some brave man or woman to come forward and lead them with the example of an authentic life.

We are an age of abundance, but amid this abundance is a great hunger in people. A hunger for authenticity, a longing to be and become and experience all we are capable of and created for. Everything good in the future depends on whether or not we will follow this longing.

Thomas More (1478-1535)

June 22 is Saint Thomas More's feast day. Thomas was a lawyer, statesman & author. In his lifetime he held many public offices including Lord Chancellor from 1529–1532. He was canonized in 1935 by Pius XI. More is also venerated in the Anglican Church. More is mostly remembered for his refusal to accept Henry VIII's claim to be supreme head of the Church of England. If you have never seen Paul Scofield play Thomas More in the movie *A Man for All Seasons* I urge you to see it! It is one of my all time favorite movies. *Man for All Seasons* was originally a play by Robert Bolt. It was first performed in London opening at the Globe Theatre on July 1, 1960. It later found its way to Broadway. The movie with Paul Scofield came in 1966.

Thomas More refused to endorse King Henry VIII's plan to divorce Katherine of Aragon; He refused to attend the coronation of Anne Boleyn in June 1533; and didn't like Henry's denial of the Pope's authority. One of my favorite lines from the movie, when Thomas More is speaking: "What matters is not that it's true, but that I believe it; or no, not that I **believe** it, but that I believe it." More fears that if he breaks with his conscience, he will be damned to hell, while his friends are more concerned with holding onto their own earthly power. More was found guilty of treason and beheaded on July 6, 1535. More's final words were: "The King's good servant, but God's First."

their open speech and encouraging words. Their contributions have blessed and challenged us, and we have become a richer and more diverse community because of them.


- As they step forward into the world that awaits, comfort their fears with the full knowledge of your divine presence.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

As both Catholics and Americans, we have enjoyed a freedom to live our faith that, in many parts of the world, sadly does not exist. As we approach the anniversary of American Independence this year, my brother bishops and I are asking every Catholic in the United States to reflect seriously on the state of religious liberty through your own participation in the

Church's Fortnight for Religious Freedom, which begins on Thursday.

Today, we face some alarming circumstances. The freedom we have to believe in Jesus Christ and to live our lives according to the teachings of His Church is a freedom we are accustomed to having protected by our federal government and by our states. It is a freedom given by God, that is meant to be protected by government. Today, however, in too many instances, we are finding it under attack.

Most prominently, Catholic institutions in Michigan and across the country are fighting an unconstitutional health care mandate that would force Catholic organizations to pay for services that violate our deeply held religious beliefs. That, however, is not our only concern. As Christians, we give charity and pastoral care to undocumented immigrants – a practice that is threatened by a number of state laws. We are experiencing the federal government imposing its own definitions on what a church is, and what a minister is. In several states, Catholic organizations can no longer provide foster care, adoption services, and vital humanitarian aid – simply because we do so according to our Christian faith. We are seeing Christian student organizations at college campuses being denied their status in certain states because of their beliefs. The list goes beyond what I can convey in this letter.

Religious liberty is not only about our ability to go to Mass on Sunday, or to pray the Rosary at home. It is about whether we can live as Christ would have us live – whether we can make our contribution to the common good of all Americans.

In your parish bulletins, and on the website of the Archdiocese of Detroit (www.aod.org), you will find information on the *Fortnight for Religious Freedom*, which takes place from June 21 through July 4. The fortnight entails Masses, rallies, prayer services and other events. All are welcome to join me for Mass at the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament at 4 p.m. on June 24. I also encourage you to take part in the events and services in your area – and to learn more about this initiative through our website.

Above all, I ask that you pray for our country, and for its leaders. I invite you to join with Catholics across the country in our urgent prayer for religious liberty:

Prayer for Religious Liberty

Almighty God, Father of all nations, For freedom you have set us free in Christ Jesus (Gal 5:1).

We praise and bless you for the gift of religious liberty the foundation of human rights, justice, and the common good. Grant to our leaders the wisdom to protect and promote our liberties; By your grace may we have the courage to defend them, for ourselves and for all those who live in this blessed land.

We ask this through the intercession of Mary Immaculate, our patroness,

and in the name of your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

with whom you live and reign, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Preserving our God-given religious liberty is not a Catholic issue. It is an American issue. If our obligations and duties to God are impeded or contradicted by the government, then we can no longer claim to be a land of the free and a beacon of hope for the world. May God bless you, and may God bless our United States of America.
