Hello!

Well we had our last pastoral council meeting last week and a question came up as to what I do as a Canon Lawyer in the Archdiocese. Within that, the statement was made that it might be good to share that with all of you so you understood how it really does aid you as well, even though it does pull from some of my time here at SJN.

As a Canon Lawyer, I serve the diocese in two capacities. First I serve in the Tribunal; this is the court in which the annulment cases are dealt with. My role in the tribunal is as Defender of the Bond in the Court of Second Instance. What does that mean?

When an annulment is submitted, the initial court, the Court of First Instance, the judges, along with the Defender of the Bond, make a determination as to whether the decision is an AFFIRMATIVE or a NEGATIVE for the nullity of marriage. If the decision is Affirmative, the case is automatically sent to the Court of Second Instance. In the Civil law world this would be the appeals court. Every annulment in the affirmative must go to this court.

When the case comes into the Second Instance Court, it is first sent to the Defender of the Bond in that court, ME! As Defender of the Bond, I represent the Church to Defend the Bond of Marriage. Basically to make sure that if a marriage is asked to be annulled or shown to be invalid, my function is insure the decision reached in the first court is a good decision. My purpose is to always protect the Bond of Marriage because it is a sacrament, something sacred, that must always be protected.

One may ask how this benefits SJN— directly, not a lot - indirectly, a huge amount. In that we are here to serve all the people, someone who has had a previous marriage needs this annulment in order to be married in the Church in the future. Some of you at SJN have been through the process and others of you know of people who have been through the process. Without enough Canon Lawyers, such as myself, this process which currently takes from 9–12 months could take as long as 3-4 years! Imagine if this were you seeking an annulment and you are the one who has to wait 3-4 years because there are not enough of us to aid in the expediency of the process.

Secondly, as a Canon Lawyer, I also serve as part of the review board and Assistant to the Promoter of Justice for clergy abuse issues in the diocese. These abuses happen in many capacities, liturgical, financial, substance abuse and others. Basically, if a member of the clergy, be it a Deacon, Priest or Bishop, within the diocese abuses this office in some way, I am part of the investigative team who determines if the accusation and/or abuses are legitimate and what penalties need to be invoked as a result. We then advise the Archbishop as to what we recommend and he makes the final decision as to how to proceed. On this advisory board are two priests, myself included, and 5 laity. For me, and all involved, the less of these cases we have the better. These are situations that come up unexpectedly and need to be dealt with immediately.

Hopefully this helps in some way to not only let you know what I do outside of SJN, but also that it does aid our parish, even if it is indirect in its affect.

# FAITH WORKS

In the ancient world, two kinds of physicians existed: the philosopher-physician and the folk healer. The former served the rich with advice and philosophic musings. The later served the poor with herbal medicines, incantations, and rituals. In today's gospel, Jairus sought Jesus out as folk healer, one who would touch the child and heal. The story of Jairus' daughter showed a tender side to Jesus. For the sake of a child, he came, endured ridicule, and raised the dead to life. Like many other passages in Mark, narrative elements foreshadowed the death and resurrection of the Lord.

With the high death rate among pre-teens in the ancient world, communal grieving was common place and had the markings of ritual (loud lamentation implied in 5:38b). Communal grieving gathered relatives and friends together with a common purpose. In fact, the crowd in 5:38-40a helped prepare the family for the worst and hastened the grieving process.

Jesus entered the scene opposing the inevitable. He interrupted the messenger with a proclamation of faith for Jairus and ejected the critical crowd from the leader's home. Then, he took the girl's relatives and his closest followers to see his miracle. Jesus raised the girl from death and restored her to her place in the family (the command to "give her something to eat" reflected the notion that place at the table symbolized a place in the family, and, by extension, a place in society).

This narrative reflected a common pattern in the ministry of Jesus: proclamation, opposition, restoration. We can even see his life, death, and resurrection as the model for this pattern. Jesus proclaimed the Good News, was opposed by the leaders unto death, and was restored to his rightful place as the only Son of the Father. He promises the same for us Christians. In spite of opposition to lives that proclaim the Good News, we, too, will see restoration as children of the Father.

Almighty and Eternal God! You have revealed your glory to all nations. God of power and might, wisdom and justice, through you authority is rightly administered, laws enacted and judgment is decreed.

Assist with your spirit of counsel and fortitude the President of these United States, that his administration may be conducted in righteousness, and be eminently useful to your people over whom he presides. May he encourage due respect for virtue and religion. May he execute the laws with justice and mercy. May he seek to restrain crime, vice and immorality.

We likewise commend to your unbounded mercy all citizens of the United States, that they may be blessed in the knowledge and sanctified in the observance of your holy law. May we be preserved in union and that peace which the world can't give; and, after enjoying the blessings of this life, be admitted to those which are eternal.

We pray to you, who are Lord and God, For ever and ever. Amen.

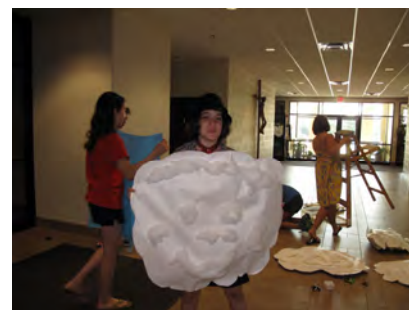

Greetings and Salutations,

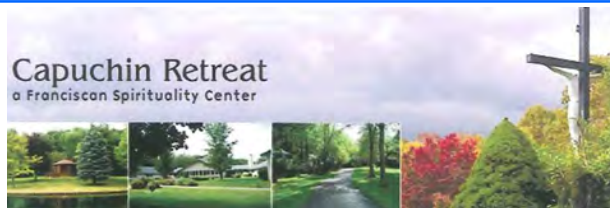

## Neumann's Needlers

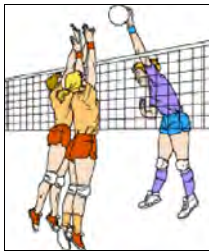
**The Neumann's Needlers are currently creating lap blankets/shawls for older adults, baby hats and blankets, as well as hats for cancer patients.**
