Hello All!

I wanted to use this week to continue my excerpts from the book *Rediscovering Catholicism*. In the next chapter, Kelly delves into the possible problems people have in embracing their faith due to the overwhelming philosophies that have taken hold on our society these days, those being: Individualism, Hedonism, and Minimalism.

**INDIVIDUALISM:** What is in it for me?

This is the prevailing question of individualism. People in our society are faced with many decisions these days and quite often the first thing they ask themselves is “what is in it for me?” This person generally has an all-consuming concern of one’s self, something psychologists call narcissism. With this type of attitude the community is never strengthened but always weekend.

Many of the social and political reforms of our age have strengthened the individualist. Quite often we see the rights of the individual being exalted (via special interest groups) above the rights and good of society. Some years ago the courts of California banned the use of the words “under God” in the Pledge of Allegiance in public schools, why? Because ONE student was offended!

Under the banner of false freedom, the rights of the individual have taken hold. Freedom is misunderstood to be an opportunity “to do whatever you want, wherever you want, whenever you want, without the interference of any other person or party. This is not freedom.”

“The fruits of individualism are no secret to any of us: greed, selfishness, and exploitation. What would become of a family or a nation in which each member adopted individualism as his or her own personal philosophy?”

**HEDONISM:** “If it feels good do it!”

Hedonism emphasizes pleasure as the ultimate goal of life. The motto: “If it feels good, do it!”

This idea has been around for as long as we have existed and has yet again taken hold of this age! As we look into history at cultures that have embraced this philosophy we see that they have all declined, the Roman Empire for example!

Whenever hedonism has come to fruition in a society, we have seen the production of men and women who are lazy, lustful, and gluttonous.

“Hedonism is not an expression of freedom; it is a passport to enslavement by a thousand cravings and addictions. And in the end it produces not pleasure, but despair.”

**MINIMALISM:** “What Is the least I can do?”

This philosophy “perfectly complements individualism and hedonism in the demise of human character.” Minimalists are always seeking to exert as little effort as possible, while at the same time receiving the maximum award. Quite often we see people asking themselves, “What is the least I can do and still keep my job? What is the least I can do and still get reasonable grades in school? What is the least I can do and still keep my marriage alive? What is the least I can do and still stay physically fit? What is the least I can do and still get to Heaven? What is the least I can do...? Minimalism is the enemy of excellence and the father of mediocrity. Not only has minimalism infected our lives and society but it is also one of the philosophical diseases that is eating away at the Church.”

The philosophical realms of individualism, hedonism and minimalism are part of the majority of peoples decision making every day. These philosophies are communicated to us through the media, literature and fashion, government policy and education, these philosophies have “nudged their way into every aspect of our lives.” This is something we woke up to and was here, it has crept into our lives over the years.

Knowing all of this, Kelly states the following: "It shouldn't surprise us that corporate and political fraud have escalated at alarming rates. Truth be known, we shouldn't be surprised that during my short lifetime more than nine times the number of people murdered in the atrocity we call the Holocaust have fallen victim to abortion in the United States alone."

Any community choosing to adopt these philosophies does so at its own peril. The philosophy we live by is a way of life and these three philosophies "will destroy every individual and community that practices them. The crisis of the modern world is a crisis of ideas. Ideas shape our lives and the world. Thought determines action. It would not be too soon for us to learn that ideas have real consequences."

# FAITH WORKS

Gene Kijek



In today's gospel, Jesus went home. But, he wasn't at home. In spite of his powerful teaching, his family and old friends met him with scepticism.

In a static culture that measured a person's worth on their place in society, Jesus had clearly overstepped his bounds. Carpenters had the lowly reputation of traveling salesmen. Men who left their wives and mothers without physical and economic security to seek work did not have even the respect of their own families. People gossiped and speculated about carpenters' activities away from their families. Jesus came from such a profession.

The static culture also cast a critical eye toward those who stepped above their station in life. Such people did not fit into the world of family and old friends, no matter what these people did, no matter what kind of reputation they built up.

Jesus exercised a ministry different from his previous profession. He went from the marginally honorable to the highly respected (notice Jesus referred to himself in the third person as a "prophet," while those in Nazareth insisted on calling him a "carpenter"). But, he was no longer what people of Nazareth expected him to be. So, he could not lead family and old friends to faith in God through his miracles, simply because they did not trust him. Any acts of "power" would be futile. So, he went back out on the road to serve the surrounding villages.

who hasn't completed the Sacraments of Initiation?  
who wants to be updated in the Catholic Faith?

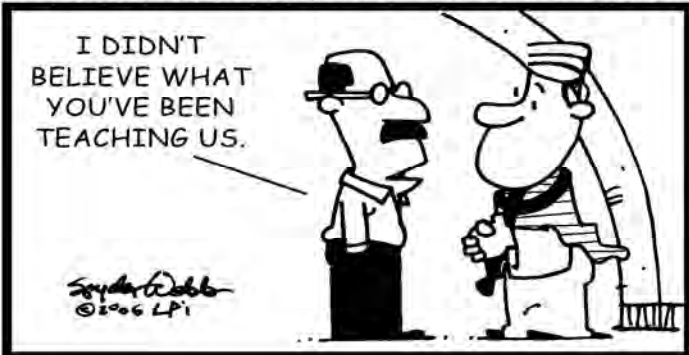

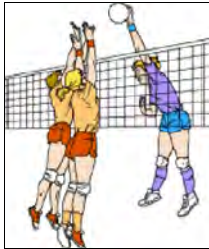
