Hello All

As you know for some time now we have had Eucharistic Adoration every Friday. I thought I would use my article this week to once again talk about this Devotion of our Catholic Faith!

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Simply, Eucharistic Adoration is adoring or honoring the Eucharistic Presence of Christ. In a deeper sense, it involves "the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us".

During Eucharistic Adoration, we **"watch and wait"**, we remain **"silent"** in His Presence and open ourselves to His Graces which flow from the Eucharist. By worshiping the Eucharistic Jesus, we become what God wants us to be! Like a magnet, The Lord draws us to Himself and gently transforms us. In its fullest essence ... Eucharistic Adoration is "God and Man reaching out for each other, at the same time!"

At the beginning of the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, a priest or deacon removes the sacred host from the tabernacle and places it in the Monstrance on the Altar for adoration by the faithful.

"Monstrance" is the vessel used in the Church to display the consecrated Eucharistic Host, during Eucharistic adoration or benediction. The word monstrance comes from the Latin word *monstrare*, meaning "to expose". It is known in Latin as an *Ostensorium*. When a consecrated host is placed in the monstrance, It is said to be a solemn exposition.

When the Monstrance contains the Sacred Host, the priest does not touch it with his bare hands, but instead, holds it with a *humeral veil*, a wide band of cloth that covers his shoulders (humera) and has pleats on the inside in which he places his hands.

"Could you not watch one hour with Me?"

Jesus waits for us in the Blessed Sacrament. He waits for our little Acts of faith, adoration, love, thanksgiving, repentance, reparation and charity that we can offer Him as we contemplate -- His Divine Majesty -- in the Blessed Sacrament.

St. Alphonsus Liguori wrote: "Of all devotions, that of adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest after the Sacraments, the one dearest to God and the one most helpful to us". The Eucharist is a priceless treasure: By not only celebrating the Eucharist, but also by praying before It outside of Mass, we are enabled to make contact with the very wellsprings of Grace ..."

Pope John Paul II in one of his homilies said, "It is pleasant to spend time with Him, to lie close to His breast like the Beloved Disciple (Jn 13:25) and to feel the infinite love present in His heart ... If, in our time Christians must be distinguished by the "art of prayer", how can we not feel a renewed need to spend time in spiritual conversation, in silent adoration, in heartfelt love before Christ present in the Most Holy Sacrament?"

"Come to Me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

Are you tired because of the burden of your duties, because of frustration due to unsuccessful projects, because many misunderstand you? Are you heavy laden with guilt from past sins? Are you trying to find hope and meaning in life? Do not lose heart! Abandon yourself to Jesus in this "Sacrament of Love": He will refresh you!

The more time you spend with Jesus, the more you will come away feeling renewed and healed. Miracles of conversion, peace, discovery of vocations, answers to prayers, physical healings, and many other wonderful things happen where and when the Lord Jesus is adored in the Blessed Sacrament. They are the "gifts" that point to the Almighty Giver and testify to His Real Presence in the Blessed Sacrament...

Let us love being with the Lord! There we can speak with Him about everything. We can offer Him our petitions, our concerns, our troubles, our joys, our gratitude, our disappointments, our needs and our aspirations. Above all we can remember to pray: 'Lord send laborers into Your harvest! Help me to be a good worker in Your vineyard!'

When asked, "What would save the world?" ... Mother Teresa replied: "My answer is prayer. What we need is for every parish to come before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament in holy hours of prayer."

Jesus asks for so little.... Yet, He gives so much!

"This - The Eucharist - the whole Christ" is His gift to all. Whether we are young or old, sick or healthy, poor or rich, only by regularly partaking in the sacrifice of the Holy Mass and Eucharistic Adoration, can we reap immense spiritual and temporal blessings in our lives! The Blessed Sacrament is the LIVING FOUNTAIN OF LIFE where we drink in the love of Christ Who alone quenches our thirst.

Cucchi's Corner

Colors tend to conjure up emotions & ideas associated with each of the liturgical seasons. The use of colors to distinguish liturgical seasons became a practice in the Western church in the fourth century thanks to Pope Innocent III. The color for the liturgical season Ordinary Time (which I have always thought should be called extra-ordinary time) is **GREEN**, sometimes called "Time of the Church" which begins after Epiphany and after Pentecost. During this season we explore the mission of the church; green symbolizes hope & growth. The next season on our liturgical journey is Advent which is actually when the Liturgical year begins. **Royal PURPLE or VIOLET** (symbolizing Christ's sovereignty) is usually the color used. In recent years liturgists have encouraged a blue-violet to be used during the Advent season and a red-violet (passion) to be used during Lent. Violet, which symbolizes penance and atonement, can also be worn in Offices and Masses for the Dead. **WHITE** symbolizing joy, purity, light, holiness, innocence & triumph is worn or displayed during Christmas; Easter; Feasts of the Lord (other than His passion), Feasts of Mary, Angels, and Saints (who were not martyrs) and for Nuptial Masses. White can also be used during Funeral masses expressing the hope of the Resurrection. **RED** symbolizing the Passion, blood (martyrdom) & fire can be used on Palm Sunday and on Good Friday, Pentecost, on celebrations of the Lord's Passion, on feasts of the Apostles and Evangelists and on celebrations of Martyr Saints. Although not often seen **BLACK** and **ROSE** still remain. Black denoting mourning & sorrow can be used for Funeral Masses (GIRM 346) & All Souls Day. Rose, expressive of joy that half a penitential season is over can be used for Gaudete Sunday (3rd Sunday of Advent) & Laetare Sunday (4th Sunday of Lent). When rules exist... there are always exceptions. **BLUE**, a color associated with Mary is allowed for the feast of the Immaculate Conception in some dioceses in Spain, Mexico & South America. On more solemn days, sacred vestments may be used that are festive, that is, more precious, even if not of the color of the day (even **SILVER**). Also, **GOLD** can be interchanged with white.

26TH ORDINARY SUNDAY / OPEN-MINDED RESPECT AND LOVE FOR ALL



IN TODAY'S GOSPEL, the disciples were scandalized by an outsider curing in Jesus' name. To the Jew of Jesus' time, a name revealed the power and purpose of the person; to invoke the name of Jesus meant to tap into his healing power. But use of the name had a price; to use a name meant the one invoking it had a relationship to the person, the power, and the movement the name represented. On these grounds, John objects to the outsider healing in Jesus' name. John's question seems to say: "How dare he! This outsider should be one of us!"

"Jesus turned the objection to the question of discipleship. No matter how small the kind act, no one who did good in the name of Jesus should be stopped. In fact, anyone who did not oppose Jesus and his movement were considered potential friends and benefactors. Friendship began with a simple kindness. A benefactor relationship began with a single act of charity. The good others did for Christ and his followers did matter!"

But what good were the disciples inside the movement doing? Were the actions of the disciple causing scandal to the "little ones?" Scandal was such a great concern, it deserved a great punishment (to make the point Jesus infers capital punishment). In the gospels, the "little ones" can be either the faithful or traveling missionaries. Scandal among the congregation or the leadership caused dissension, discord, and disunity. It could destroy the Church to a far greater extent than any outsider.

Jesus used extreme language to make his point about the choice between the Kingdom and Gehenna. For the Jew in Jesus' time, the hand and the foot represented the areas of human activity. Did the activity of the disciple represent Christ or selfishness and evil influence? It was better not to be involved in a certain activity (have hands and feet "cut off") than to scandalize and be condemned.

The eyes represented windows to one's heart and mind. Their use could weaken or strengthen the faith life of the disciple. Better not to see something (have the eyes "cut out") than to "scandalize" one's self and be condemned.

What is worse, to cause scandal or to be scandalized? Neither advance faith, only egos. Both can destroy faith and community participation. Both can lead to spiritual death.

Jesus gave us guidelines to address scandal. Encourage the faith of those outside the community. Know yourself and your weaknesses that can cause scandal. And, do not aspire to offices where you can cause scandal. Jesus wanted an increase in faith, not scandal. We should, too.

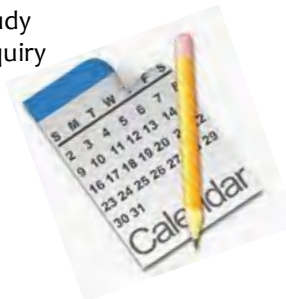
