IT'S MY OPINION AND I HAVE ONE!

Recently a workshop was held dealing with “The Catholic Spiritual Gifts”. The intention of this workshop was to aid Catholics in discerning, developing and using their spiritual gifts (charisms). I thought I would take what that workshop had to say about the different charisms and let you decide where you lie in all of these.

From 1 Corinthians 12:7-10,12, “To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the speaking of wisdom, and to another the speaking of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the ability to distinguish between spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues... For just as the body is one and has many members, and all members of the body, through many, are one body, so it is with Christ.”

The charism of Administration empowers a Christian to be an effective channel of God’s wisdom by providing the planning and coordination needed to accomplish good things.

The charism of Celibacy empowers a Christian to be most fulfilled and spiritually fruitful by remaining unmarried and celibate for the sake of Christ.

The charism of Craftsmanship empowers a Christian to be an effective channel of God’s goodness to others through artistic or creative work that beautifies and/or orders the physical world.

The charism of Discernment of Spirits empowers a Christian to be an effective channel of God’s wisdom by accurately perceiving a divine or demonic presence in certain people, places or things.

The charism of Encouragement empowers a Christian to be an effective channel of God’s love—nurturing others through his or her presence and words of comfort, encouragement, and counsel.

The charism of Evangelism empowers a Christian to be an effective channel of God’s love by sharing the faith with others in a way that draws them to become disciples of Jesus and responsible members of his Church.

The charism of Faith empowers a Christian to be an effective agent of God’s purposes through an unusual trust in the love, power, and provision of God and a remarkable freedom to act on this trust.

The charism of Giving empowers a Christian to be a cheerful channel of God’s provision by giving with exceptional generosity to those in need.

The charism of Healing empowers a Christian to be a channel of God’s love through whom God cures illness and restores health when healing is unlikely to occur quickly or to happen at all.

The charism of Helps empowers a Christian to be a channel of God’s goodness by using his or her talents and charisms to enable other individuals to serve God and people more effectively.

The charism of Hospitality empowers a Christian to be a generous channel of God’s love by warmly welcoming and caring for those in need of food, shelter, and friendship.

The charism of Intercessory Prayer empowers the intense prayer of a Christian for others to be the means by which God’s love and deliverance reaches those in need.

The charism of Knowledge empowers a Christian to be a channel of God’s truth through diligent study and intellectual activity that enables us to better understand God, ourselves, and the universe.

The charism of Leadership empowers a Christian to be an agent of God’s purposes by sharing a compelling vision of a better future with others and by directing the overall efforts of a group as they work together to make the vision a reality.

The charism of Mercy empowers a Christian to be a channel of God’s love through practical deeds of compassion that relieve the distress of those who suffer and help them experience God’s love.

The charism of Missionary empowers a Christian to be a channel of God’s goodness to others by effectively and joyfully using their charisms in a second culture.

FAITH WORKS

As we approach the world around us, we Christians do so in the name of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace. We say this and we believe it, but what does it mean? How do we teach about peace in our parishes and schools? Vatican II can help us find ways to make teaching about peace central to our work.

To say that the promotion of peace - peace within men and women, social peace, and international peace - was important to Blessed Pope John XXIII and Vatican II is to understate it! Nothing was more important to Pope John than this.

For example, on October 12, 1962 the day after the opening of Vatican II, he met with a group of diplomats from nearly 80 nations who had sent a delegate to the Council. Vatican II would be a religious event, he told them, but he also hoped it would contribute to the development of world peace. This peace, he said, should be "based on growing respect for the human person and lead to freedom . . ."

Shortly after this, Pope John conceived the idea to write an encyclical on war and peace which he called *Pacem in Terris*, meaning "Peace on Earth." At this time Pope John was very sick with cancer. He had less than a year to live. Yet, he was absolutely determined to write about peace. The Council took up this theme in its *Constitution on the Church in the Modern World*, especially in articles 77-90.

What did Pope John and the Council teach? How can we ourselves teach about peace in a world torn constantly by war? From Northern Ireland, Iraq and Afghanistan to Kosovo, from central Africa to India and Pakistan, peace seems impossible to attain. How can we really be effective?

The answer lies in the council documents and Pope John's letter, *Pacem in Terris*. It's a threefold teaching which is easy to understand and is based on Jesus' own promise that he would leave us with peace. It's

also easier than you may think to teach about.

First, teach that **peace of heart** is the beginning point. This is, of course, an interior thing, belonging to the spirit, and its fundamental condition is a loving heart and a willingness to spend at least a few minutes each day in prayer. As St. Augustine has written, "You have made us for Yourself, Oh Lord, and our heart is restless till it rests in You." We must, first of all, bind ourselves to God.

Second, teach that **social peace** is lived every day. It's within our reach if we believe in the personal dignity of everyone. This means that in our homes, in our classrooms, and in all the rest of our lives, we can "declare peace." We can learn on a day to day basis how to live in peace with one another, learn to respect and trust each other. This requires that we enter deeply into the Mystery of the

Incarnation. God wants us to love one another profoundly - the message of Advent and Christmas could not be more clear. So we must, secondly, bind ourselves to one another.

And third, teach that **international peace** is more than the absence of war. It's the presence of *trust* between nations. This means that we must teach the necessity of overcoming erroneous ideas: The myth that using force produces peace. The myth that nationalism is the highest value. The myth that revenge brings peace of heart. And most importantly, we must teach that for peace to be realized, justice must come first. So we must, thirdly, bind ourselves to the human community on Earth.

This is our work, yours and mine, as teachers of the Faith. In the Spirit of the Gospels, of Vatican II, and of Pope John XXIII, let us recommit ourselves here and now to "teach peace and follow after it."
