

IT'S MY OPINION AND I HAVE ONE!

Hello to you all!

In Pope Benedict XVIth Apostolic Letter *Porta Fidei* he declared the year from October 11, 2012 – November 24, 2012 as the year of faith. This is something I will address in later articles. With this in mind, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops have listed saints of the month for the Year of Faith. I thought I would let you know the saint for the month of November.

November – St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, M.S.C. – Missionary and founder of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

"Francis Xavier Cabrini was born into a family of thirteen children. Due to health reasons, her first request to join a religious community was refused, but she was finally able to take her vows in 1877. Soon after being named prioress of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, she was urged by Pope Leo XIII to become a missionary in the United States. However, the house that had been promised to her for an orphanage was unavailable when she reached New York City, and the archbishop advised her to return to Italy. Frances departed from the archbishop's residence all the more determined to stay and establish that orphanage. And she did. In 35 years, Frances Xavier Cabrini founded 6 institutions for the poor, the abandoned, the uneducated and the sick, and organized schools and adult education classes for formation in the Catholic Faith. She died of malaria in her own Columbus Hospital in Chicago in 1917. She was the first United States Citizen to be canonized, and she is known as the patron saint of immigrants." (USCCB website)

Cucchi's Corner

This weekend we begin singing a new Gloria entitled Holy Name of Jesus Glory to God composed by Norah Duncan IV. Norah was the Music Director of the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Detroit for over 26 years. He is the second longest serving Roman Catholic cathedral musician in the country. This new Gloria uses the new translation of our Roman Catholic Gloria (revised order of the Mass 2010). Norah's Gloria is dedicated to Monsignor John P. Zenz and the parishioners of Holy Name Church, Birmingham, Michigan, in memory of Sister Shirlee Hoski.

The Gloria or as it is sometimes referred to: The Great Doxology (hymnus angelicus) is preferably sung on Sundays & Holy Days of Obligation. Starting out first as a morning hymn of praise in the east then later came to the west becoming part of the Mass. The beginning of the text, and we, bear witness (and herald) the song of the angels at the Nativity (Luke 2:14).

Norah Duncan IV is Associate Chair and Associate Professor of Music at Wayne State University. Additionally, he directs the WSU Concert Chorale and coordinates many of the choral concerts presented by the Department of Music.

Duncan received an undergraduate degree (English Literature) from the University of Detroit, a Master of Fine Arts degree (Organ Performance) from Wayne State University, and a Doctor of Musical Arts (Church Music/Organ Performance) degree from the University of Michigan.

FAITH WORKS

With his Apostolic Letter, *The Door of Faith*, Pope Benedict XVI declared that a "Year of Faith" to begin on October 11, 2012 and conclude on November 24, 2013. October 11, 2012, the first day of the Year of Faith, is the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the

Second Vatican Council... (Vatican II) and also the twentieth anniversary of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. During the Year of Faith, we are asked to study and reflect on the documents of Vatican 2 and the catechism so that we might deepen our knowledge of the faith.

The Year of Faith is an opportunity for Catholics to experience a conversion – to turn to Jesus and enter into a deeper relationship with him. The "door of faith" is opened at one's baptism, but during this year Catholics are called to open it again, walk through it and rediscover and renew their relationship with Christ and his Church.

The United States Council of Catholic Bishops' website, www.usccb.org, has a whole section established for the year of Faith. One of the sections recalls American Saints for each month of the year. The following are featured in October.

Martyrs of North America

John de Brébeuf, ordained at 33, was the first Jesuit missionary in Huronia (1626) and a master of the Indian language. He worked throughout all the district, founded mission outposts converted thousands to the faith. He inspired many Jesuits to volunteer for the missions of New France. Massive in body, strong yet gentle in character, his visions of the cross and of his future martyrdom were fulfilled when he was tortured for hours after being captured March 16, 1649. He was martyred at Sainte Ignace, six miles from Sainte Marie at the age of 56

Gabriel Lalemant, a Jesuit at 19 and ordained at 27, was a scholar, professor and a college administrator. After seven months, he was able to speak the native language. For one month he was assistant to Brébeuf and then his companion in martyrdom for 17 long hours.

Anthony Daniel, ordained a priest at 29, was a missionary near Bias-d'or Lakes (1632); he founded the first boys' college in North America (Quebec 1635) and laboured in Huronia for 12 years. On July 4, he just finished Mass when the mission was attacked. His martyred body was thrown in the flames of the burning Church at Mount St. Louis. He was 48 when he died.

Charles Garnier, was a Jesuit missionary in Huronia at age of 31. For 13 years he was pastor and missionary to the Hurons and Petuns. Gentle, innocent, fearless, a person of faith, he drew converts to the faith. Even when the mission of Etharita was attacked and he himself wounded, he continued to baptize neophytes and to assist a wounded Huron. In this act he died at the age of 44.


Noél Chabanel, a Jesuit priest at 28, a successful professor and humanist in France, had a strong desire to come to the Canadian missions but was unable to learn the native language and felt useless in the ministry. Even his martyrdom came secretly at the hands of an apostate on December 8, 1649 on the Nottawasaga, 25 miles from Sainte-Marie.

René Goupil had to leave the Jesuit novitiate because of ill health. He studied medicine and offered his services to the Jesuit missions in Canada. On his way to Sainte-Marie, he was martyred while making the sign of the cross on a child. The first of the eight martyrs to be killed, he was 35 years old when he died..

Isaac Jogues came to Huronia in 1636 and supplied at mission outposts for three years; he helped to build Sainte-Marie (1639) and explored as far west as Sault Sainte-Marie. Captured by the Mohawks when returning to Sainte-Marie from Quebec (1642), he was tortured, loosing several fingers and being made a slave. He escaped to France, but returned the same year as an emissary and missionary to the Mohawks. He was martyred at Auriesville, N.Y. at age 39.

John de La Lande offered his services as a layman to the Jesuits in New France. He accompanied Jogues to the Mohawk Mission (1646), was captured with him and tortured. He saw Jogues martyred. On the following day (October 19, 1646), he himself was killed at Auriesville, N.Y.

Pope Pius XI canonized the whole group of missionaries known as the eight North American Martyrs, whose feast the Church celebrates on October 19: Fathers Isaac Jogues, John de Brébeuf, Gabriel, Lalemant, Charles Garnier, Anthony Daniel and Noel Chabanel, along with René Goupil and John de La Lande.

FAITH FORMATION

CELEBRATING ALL SAINTS DAY!

Last Sunday, October 21, 2012, Pope Benedict XVI canonized seven new saints. Two of those saints are especially important to us because they served God and his people in North America and Hawaii.

St. Kateri Tekakwitha was born about forty miles west of what is now Albany, NY. She was the daughter of an Algonquin Catholic woman who was captured and given in marriage to a Mohawk chief who was not Catholic. During a smallpox epidemic that struck when Kateri was just a toddler, she not only lost her parents and a younger brother but also contracted the disease and was disfigured and partially blinded by it.

Kateri was adopted and raised by an uncle and the women of her community. Throughout her growing up, Kateri was impressed by the Jesuits who lived among her people but she did not request religious instruction, fearing her uncle's angry reaction. But at the age of 18, she gathered the courage to request instruction and was baptized a year later on Easter.

After her baptism Kateri experienced harsh treatment from her uncle who was very opposed to her becoming Catholic. With advice from one of the Jesuits she fled, walking nearly 200 mile to a Catholic Native American village at Sault St. Louis, near Montreal Canada. There she received spiritual direction from a priest and an older Iroquois woman and continued to grow in holiness. Kateri gave herself to prayer and helping others. She also practiced fasting offering the sacrifice involved for the conversion of her people.





St. Marianne Cope was born in Germany but when she was 2 years old her family moved to the United States and settled in Utica, NY. She grew up in an American working class family. To help support her family she left school after the 8th grade and worked in a factory for nine years. Then she joined the Sisters of St. Francis in Syracuse, NY.

In 1883 King Kalakaua of Hawaii asked for her help in caring for lepers of his kingdom. St. Marianne responded to this call and with the help of other sisters she built a hospital for the lepers and eventually a school for girls. Later in her life St. Marianne was asked by Father Damien, who himself had contracted leprosy, to help him with his mission to people with leprosy on the island of Molokai. St. Marianne worked to the end of her life helping people with leprosy but never contracted the disease. This is considered a miracle.

This week we celebrate the feast of All Saints. On November 1st (Thursday) we celebrate all the saints that are in heaven. These people have led such Gospel-driven lives that they are united with God. On this Thursday we celebrate the canonized saints, like St. Kateri Tekakwitha and St. Marianne Cope; but also the millions of other holy people through the ages who have obeyed the Commandments, lived the Beatitudes, loved God, and loved their neighbors.


