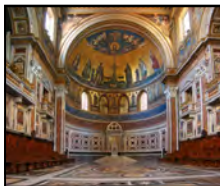
Cucchi's Corner



As we prepare to celebrate this Friday the *Dedication of the Lateran Basilica* in Rome my thoughts take me back to when the new St. Hugo of the Hills was dedicated in 1989. I remember the lector who proclaimed the scripture passage taken from 1 Cor 3, 9-13. 16-17:

For we are God's co-workers; you are God's field, God's building. According to the grace of God given to me, like a wise master builder I laid a foundation, and another is building upon it. But each one must be careful how he builds upon it, for no one can lay a foundation other than the one that is there, namely, Jesus Christ. If anyone builds on this foundation with gold, silver, precious stones, wood, hay, or straw, the work of each will come to light, for the Day will disclose it. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire (itself) will test the quality of each one's work. Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy that person; for the temple of God, which you are, is holy.

This has always been one of my favorite passages of scripture. Do we really see ourselves as God's temple? I think it is interesting when we think of holy buildings we consider all of those who passed faith onto us. And of course to think of all those we will pass our faith onto who come after us.



FAITH WORKS

In today's gospel a scribe (someone who copies the Jewish scripture by hand onto scrolls) asks Jesus about the most important law or commandment. Jesus responded with what every Jew of his day learned in childhood - the *Shema*.

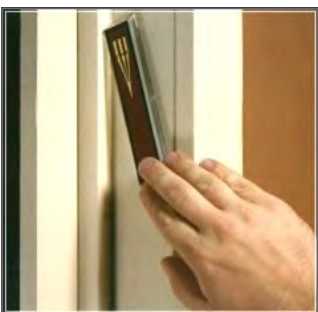
This is the most important of all Jewish prayers. *Shema Yisrael Adonai Eloheinu Adonai Echad*" are the first words of the Jewish prayer known as the **Shema Israel**.



Hear, O Israel, The Lord is our God,
The Lord is One.

It is a declaration of faith and a pledge of allegiance to God. Twice daily, recitation of the Shema Israel is a mitzvah (commandment) for the Jewish people -- it is said upon rising in the morning and going to sleep at night. It is said when praising God and when beseeching Him. The Shema Israel is the first prayer taught to Jewish children and it is the last words Jew says before death. It is a prayer of praise to God and it is a prayer of petition, as well. The Shema is recited in preparation for the reading of the Torah on the Sabbath and Jewish holidays and at the end of the holiest day, Yom Kippur. Judaism teaches that the name of God is not read aloud in the Shema; it is replaced with Adonai ("my Lord"):

In the Torah, Moses gives **The Shema** to his people in his last words to them. In the book of Deuteronomy 6:4-9, God dictates that the Shema Israel be contained in the mezuzah that is placed on home doorposts.




Jewish law states that mezuzahs must be placed on every door in a home or business owned by a Jew. The mezuzah parchment should be placed on the right side of the door, from the point of view of the one entering the building or room. The mezuzah should be affixed to the lower part of the upper third of the doorway, and it should ideally be placed at a 45° angle, tilted towards the inside of the room. If this is impossible due

to the thinness of the doorframe, place the mezuzah at 90° and continue rotating the mezuzah counter-clockwise as much as the door frame will allow. (Check my office door.)

Jesus backed up the Shema with another important verse: love of neighbor. This meant allegiance to one's community. "You will love your neighbor as yourself." Jesus quoted Leviticus 19:18 for this command. These two commands meant more than any worship in the Temple. But how do you love God and neighbor? For the Christian, the answer could be found in a relationship with Jesus.

What is this the most important value in your faith? What religious insight or practice has had the greatest impact on your life? Who exemplifies that insight or practice or value in your life?

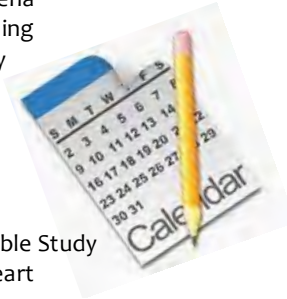
