Hello to you all

Who out there remembers the song *Cats in the Cradle*, by Harry Chapin? The last bit of the song goes:

"I've long since retired, my son's moved away I called him up just the other day I said, "I'd like to see you if you don't mind" He said, "I'd love to, Dad, if I can find the time You see my new job's a hassle and kids have the flu But it's sure nice talking to you, Dad It's been sure nice talking to you" And as I hung up the phone it occurred to me He'd grown up just like me My boy was just like me

And the cat's in the cradle and the silver spoon Little boy blue and the man on the moon When you comin' home dad? I don't know when, but we'll get together then son You know we'll have a good time then"

I bring this up as I reflect on the last holy day of obligation we celebrated in the Church!

On the 8th of December was the Immaculate Conception of Mary, which is a Holy Day of Obligation in the Church. I have brought up in mass a few times about the importance of what a Holy Day of Obligation means but thought I would address that here in my article.

I was pleased to see a number of people here on Friday evening the 7th for the vigil service and the people we had at the morning service on the Feast Day itself. However given that it was a Holy Day of Obligation we should have had many more people. What I did notice missing was a great number of young families. Hence my reason for talking about what the Church means by a "holy day of obligation."

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) # 2042 "You shall attend Mass on Sundays and on holy days of obligation ad rest from servile labor." This statement requires the faithful to sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord as well as the principle liturgical feasts honoring the mysteries of the Lord, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the saints; in the first place, by participating in the Eucharistic celebration, in which the Christian community is gathered, and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days."

Also from the CCC #2223, "Parents have the first responsibility for the education of their children." Not only in word but by example, the expectations of the Church are that on Sundays and holy days of obligation, all the faithful would make every effort possible to attend mass.

Are there valid reasons for missing? ABSOLUTELY—should one be ill, or if it is a matter of losing your job (though employers should be understanding of religious obligations, sadly not all are). Unfortunately, for the most part, either people do not care, they do not recognize the obligation, or make feeble excuses as to why they cannot show up.

I fully recognize that all the lives of the families out there are very busy. I know what my brother and his wife went through for many years while all three of their children were on different travel basketball teams. They were all over the place. But a question of priorities has to come into play. If God is a priority in our lives we always find a way to give God the time He deserves. If God is not, we constantly make excuses and teach our children that God is not important either.

Last weekend I preached on "Preparing the way for Christ." Part of that preparation is celebrating the sacred liturgy. If we choose to find any excuse not to attend on Sunday or holy days of obligation, in the end what are we teaching our children? We are teaching them it is unimportant. If we teach them that God is unimportant now, where will we be in 20 years from now? We already live in a society that continually put God on the back shelf. If we, as the faithful, do the same thing, we are in a whole heap of trouble!

Today, the Third Sunday of Advent is known as Gaudete Sunday. The term Gaudete refers to the first word of the Entrance Antiphon(introit), "Rejoice". Rose vestments are sometimes worn instead of violet to emphasize our joy that Christmas is near, and we also light the rose candle on our Advent wreath.

"Rejoice: the Lord is nigh." Just as in Lent, a penitential season, we have a mid-way point— A time to evaluate, but more importantly a time to rejoice! As we journey again this year to Bethlehem, to see the Christ child in the manger, we should be filled with the hope of Christ's coming and once again meditate on what the birth of our Savior means for us. The great **JOY** of Christians is to see the day drawing close when the Lord will come again in His glory to lead them into His kingdom.


A great way to evangelize others is to simply be a joyful Christian. Others may observe this witness and say to themselves..."I want what they have." Joy is a sign of the presence of God. Fr. John Cantoir puts it this way: Joy blossoms from a compassionate heart. There's a 15th century mystic named Julian of Norwich who said, "The greatest honor that you can give to Almighty God, greater than all your penances and sacrifices, is to live joyfully because of the knowledge of his love."

And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless until the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God. FAITH FORMATION

Today is the 3rd Sunday of Advent. This is a day to "Rejoice." Christmas is almost here. Soon we will celebrate Jesus' birth! The Scriptures we pray and hear during Mass tell us to rejoice. The first reading begins "Shout for joy, O daughter of Zion! Sing joyfully, O Israel! Be glad and exalt with all your heart..." The Responsorial Psalm begins "Cry out with joy and gladness: for among you is the great and Holy One of Israel." And St. Paul tell us in the second reading "Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice! Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near."

You may read or hear someone refer to this day as "Gaudete Sunday." This name for this Sunday comes from the time in our history when the liturgy was prayed in Latin rather than in the language of the congregation. "Gaudete" is Latin for "rejoice" and it is the first word of the Entrance antiphon and the introductory word of the second reading.

During Advent the liturgical color that the celebrant wears is purple; but if it is available, the celebrant may wear a rose colored vestment. We will light the 3rd candle on the Advent wreath and that will be the rose or the pink candle. This is another way to say, "rejoice." The waiting is half way over!

Perhaps you are very aware of the way we celebrate the 3rd Sunday of Advent. But if you have young children, it is a great opportunity to tell them about the tradition and our waiting for the Lord. They will love to hear about the practice and its meaning. If you have older children, who already know the tradition, allow them to remind you. You might ask, "Are you sure we should light the pink candle today?"

In the second reading, St. Paul also tells us to pray with a spirit of gratitude, which plants a bit of joy in our hearts. One suggestion is to create a family gratitude journal. I am thinking it would be fun to place it next to our Nativity set and our family members could include a sentence or two or just a word, whenever they think of something for which they are grateful.

FAITH WORKS

For God to take on real flesh and power in our world, we must first do something. What? The answer to that lies in the way Jesus was born.

Mary, Jesus' mother, shows us a certain blueprint, a pattern for how God is born into our world and how faith is born in our lives. When we look at how Mary gave birth to Jesus, we see that there are four moments in the process: Impregnation by the Holy Spirit; gestation of God within one's body and soul; the stretching and agony of giving birth; and the nurturing of an infant into adulthood.

Impregnation by



the Holy Spirit: Mary, we are told, became pregnant by the Holy Spirit. What an extraordinary notion! This doesn't just mean that Jesus didn't have a human father, but also that Mary so let the seed of God's spirit (charity, joy, peace, patience, goodness, long-suffering, fidelity, mildness, faith, and chastity) take root in her that it began to grow into actual flesh.

Gestation of God within one's body: As we know, pregnancy is not followed immediately by childbirth. A long, slow process first occurs, gestation. In the silent recesses of her heart and body (and surely not without the normal morning-sickness that accompanies pregnancy) an umbilical cord began to grow between Mary and that new life. Her flesh began to give physical sustenance to the life of God and this steadily grew into a child which, at a point, as in all pregnancies, demanded to be born into the world.


The agony of giving birth: Only with much groaning and stretching of the flesh can a child emerge into this world. It is always excruciatingly painful to birth something to the outside world, to take what's precious inside and give it birth outside. Mary experienced the normal birth-pains common to all mothers. Nothing secretly gestated is born into the world without pain, Jesus included.

How did you share your Faith this week?

Nurturing an infant into adulthood: We always find God in our lives as Jesus was found in Bethlehem on Christmas, a helpless infant in the straw who must be picked up and nurtured into adulthood. Mary gave birth to the baby, Jesus, but what she ultimately gave the world was the adult. Christ. Like all mothers she had to spend years nursing, cajoling, teaching, and nurturing an infant into adulthood.

In that pattern, in looking at how Mary gave birth to Christ, we are given a blueprint that invites imitation not admiration. Mary is the model of faith. What she did each of us too is called upon to do, namely, give birth to God in our lives. We should marvel at what once took place, but we should also imitate and continue to give God flesh in the world.



The document at Vatican II that addressed the relationship of the Church to the Modern world passed by a final vote of 2309-75!



Advent Greetings,

Today is Gaudete (Gow-DAY-Tay) Sunday. Gaudete is a Latin word that means "REJOICE!" Today, we light the rosecolored candle on our Advent wreath, rejoicing that Jesus is coming soon. In today's Gospel people wonder if John might be the expected Messiah, the one God will send to lead his people.

John the Baptist and Jesus were cousins, and had grown up side by side. We know from the Gospel that their mothers, Mary and Elizabeth, were close, since Elizabeth was one of the first people Mary went to tell when she found out that she was pregnant. Imagine what it would be like to grow up in the shadow of Jesus. Even as a young child we know that Jesus was remarkable, speaking to the adults in the Temple. And now, here he is all grown up, and John the Baptist does not seem to be tempted, even for a second, into acting like he is the Messiah who the people have been waiting for. Think about the relationships in your life. Are there any friends or siblings who you compete with for the spotlight, or who sometimes seem to outshine you? This week, consider John the Baptist's approach as you deal with these people. Remember that acting like John the Baptist doesn't mean acting like you are less than someone else, it means recognizing who you are. Just as God gave John the Baptist a unique and invaluable role to play in the salvation of us all, God has created you for a unique, wonderful, purpose, too.

A Prayer for Advent......

Look on us, Jesus, and let all the darkness of our souls disappear before the beams of your brightness. Fill us with your holy love, and open to us the treasures of your wisdom. You know all our desire, so bring to perfection what you have started, and what the Holy Spirit has wakened us to ask in prayer. We seek your face, turn your face to us and show us your glory. Then our longing will be satisfied and our peace will be perfect. Amen.
