

IT'S MY OPINION AND I HAVE ONE!

Hello all!

This week is National Vocations Week and you will notice that all of the articles by the staff this week deal with vocations. I thought I would give a brief summary of my vocation story in this column as my lead into vocations, something I am preaching on this weekend!

My vocation story is not the norm. Most men who become priests were altar servers as boys, were influenced by a priest in their life and their families fostered vocations in the home! For me that was not the case.

I was a public school educated kid. Yes we went to mass every Sunday in my house, but when I was confirmed, I was the last of the Richards' kids. We basically stopped going to church regularly. My family was a good family but my family stopped going to Church except for Christmas and Easter, as many catholics do.

When I went to college, MSU (where else would one go), I had a group of friends that went to mass every Sunday and I followed along. We would attend St. Johns in East Lansing, which is the campus parish at the University! However, when I would come home I would cease and desist my attendance. When I finished school with an engineering degree, I decided to go back to become an educatorand ended up working at Brother Rice, still not really ever attending mass. Oh I would go sporadically but not on a regular basis. While at Rice, a campus minister was hired and he brought in a retreat program for the boys, seniors, called Kairos. He needed 7 students and 4 adults to learn this retreat and for some foolish reason he thought I should be one of the adults.

Well it was this retreat that began the road of me opening my eyes to the priesthood. At the time I was very successful at the school both as a teacher and a coach. To this day, even though I had a number of state championships, I believe I was a far better teacher than coach and loved every minute of teaching. So the decision to go into the seminary was very difficult. I recognized that not only was I giving up some notoriety that I had achieved from my coaching, but leaving something I absolutely loved doing and that was teaching physics.

However, though I loved what I was doing, I was unsettled in my life and decided that I needed to see what it was all about. So I decided that in the fall of 1998 I would enter the seminary and the rest is history. This is the Reader's Digest version of the story. If I were to go into detail I would be writing pages and pages!

Now my story is unusual, in that I really had NO IDENTIFICATION with religious life in any way as a child or young adult. Most men who go into the priesthood have strong support around them for this. So yes, God can work without that support, but people it is a lot harder. More often than not, without the outside support, a lot of men never end up giving their vocation a chance. The Holy Spirit can be working to bring young men into the priesthood but as a people we can stifle the spirit from working. Hence you have young men who live their entire lives "unsettled" as I did for a while. Fortunately I was able to hear the spirit.

As a community you have an obligation and responsibility to foster a vocation to the priesthood in ALL YOUNG men, even your own sons, making this a viable choice. Please keep that in mind especially during this National Vocations Week.

I would like to add though I speak of the priesthood in this article this also goes for women to the religious life and men to the permanent diaconate!

January 17th is the feast for Anthony the Abbot. Anthony was born at Coma, a village south of Memphis in upper Egypt. When he was around 18 years old he gave away his family possessions and became a disciple of a local hermit. Around 285 he left the hermitage seeking greater solitude and spent the next 20 years living on his own. In 305 he organized a colony at Fayum where each monk lived in solitude except for worship. Anthony was the founder of the monastic lifestyle. He was respected for his holiness and was consulted by many people even Constantine the Emperor. In 311 when Emperor Maximinus was persecuting Christians, Anthony decided to go and provide encouragement to the Christians. Anthony died in the year 356, most likely on January 17th. He was 105 years old.

Today, January 13th, we begin National Vocation Awareness week.

The word vocation in the broadest sense means "call." Truly, we are all called to discipleship at the time of our Baptism. But the focus of this particular week is to consider the vocations of the priesthood, the deaconate and the consecrated religious life.

It seems the point of this week of awareness then is to spend time learning about these vocations and to consider the significance of those who follow such vocations for ourselves personally and for the Church overall.

Sometimes stories are the best way to learn and understand. A few years ago we considered vocations in a Faith UNwrapped session. We heard the story of Deacon Pat Conlen's call to the deaconate (told by him), but we also kept a written copy of it in the Religious Education library for our youth. Consider stopping by and taking a look.

Another wonderful vocation story in our library is <u>He Said Yes</u>, which tells the story of Father Mychal Judge, the chaplain for the New York City Fire Department. He gave his life serving the fire fighters and others at the time of 9/11.

One more book in our library is <u>The Clubhouse Conundrum</u>, which tells a story about the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary of Monroe, MI. This true story shows the leadership and inspiration that persons who live a consecrated religious life give to us.

Each of these "books" is a quick read. I encourage you to stop by and take a moment of inspiration.

FAITH WORKS

Who am I? The identity question is a great place to begin when looking at the process of **discerning**, or making decisions for our lives based on faith. Our vocations, or the way that we will say "Yes" to God with our lives, ultimately come from God, but they also come from our sense of who we are. There are three important questions to consider when looking at our identity. The first question is "What am I going to do?" This is sometimes considered to be the career question. Adults need to

support themselves and their families, and most people need to have a job to provide an income to do this. When considering a career, people often ask questions like: What am I good at? What do I like to do? Is it a good thing to do? How much money can I make doing that? How much education is required to do that?

The second question is "What is important to me?" The core values that we build our lives around help determine how we naturally respond to situations in life. Another way to look at this question is to ask, "How do I want other people to know me for who I really am?" We consider the importance of things like family, friends, our faith, material things, education, money, simplicity. The choices that we make are guided by these core values that we hold important.

The third question goes beyond the individual questions of "me" and "I" and looks at "How am I to love?" Each of us has a responsibility to share who we are with other people. There are different ways to express love and to give of oneself, as acquaintances, friends, best friends, and spouses. The ways of sharing love are as varied as there are people.

When we consider these three questions together, the depth of the simple question "Who am I?" begins to be revealed. These are not simple questions to answer, they take time and patience to answer. It is not as though we wake up one day and say, "I've got it all figured out, I know who I am to be for the rest of my life." The responses we make to these questions will change as we change. Our understanding of who we are will deepen and grow as we prayerfully consider these questions.

Ministry in the Church as a priest, deacon or religious is the result of personal discernment and love for the People of God. Individuals, families and parishes encourage all vocations when we witness to our baptismal call of loving God and loving others. Check out vocations.com. It's a great site to explain the process of discernment which may lead to ministry in the church as a priest, deacon or religious.



The Permanent Diaconate

The Diaconate was restored as a permanent Order in the Church during the Second Vatican Council. Since that time, thousands of men throughout the world have received the sacrament of Holy Orders, and have been ordained to serve the Church as Permanent Deacons.

Often the most visible ministry of Permanent Deacons is liturgical: assisting at Mass, proclaiming the Gospel and preaching, and presiding at weddings, funerals, and baptisms. But the permanent deacon is also ordained to serve in many other ways. Deacons minister in hospitals, nursing homes, soup kitchens, and prisons. They serve as chaplains to police and fire departments, and work with people that are often forgotten by others. A deacon's true charism is to bring the love of Christ and His Church to the street, and to meet God's people where they are. He then invites those he serves back to the Church, so that all people, regardless of their circumstances, realize that they are loved and welcomed at the Lord's table.

Because a married man is allowed to be ordained a Permanent Deacon, he has an opportunity to give witness to the beauty of family life. A married deacon's first responsibility is always to his family, and the secular work he does to support them. The balance of family, work, and ministry is always a challenge for permanent deacons. But the rewards of bringing Jesus to the street, and the street to the altar, are priceless. The time and effort is always well spent.

Perhaps you have considered the Permanent Diaconate. Or maybe you know someone that you think would be a good candidate for the Diaconate. I am always available to talk about the Order of Deacon, and would be happy to answer any questions you may have. Please feel free to contact me at any time.
