Hi All!

Well I hope you all had a pleasant week. As I believe you all know I was at the March for Life on the 25th, so that was just over a week ago. I wanted to touch on that experience a bit here- that is to the beauty of the march. First, I was there a few members of our youth group, along with people from St. Michaels. It is my hope that next year we can have a bus load of our own going to the march!

To describe the experience as beautifully peaceful and prayerful is an understatement. To have hundreds of thousands of people, all of different background and belief structures, joining together as on common body is amazing.

In Paul's letter to the Corinthians he states: "For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or freemen, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit" (1 Cor 12:13). This issue on life in the womb is a great place for all of as humans to ban together with one common purpose, that being, the protection of life.

I think this is an experience we all can benefit from!

As you head home this weekend I ask you take this with you from the readings:

Does Jesus have a different "world view" from the townspeople who were so outraged at his words that they wanted to kill him?

Can you look past the expectations of others-of the world-to let God find you?

Is a mother's unquantifiable love beyond any measure of commitment in the world?

Is this the metaphor for God's unrelenting love?

Where is Jesus to be found after he departs from the mob who would kill him?

Is union with God your true self?

"Every one of us is shadowed by an illusionary person – a false self. This is the man I want myself to be but who cannot exist because God knows nothing about him. And to be unknown to God is altogether too much privacy. My false and private self is the one who wants to live outside the reach of God's will and God's love – outside the reach of reality and outside of life.

And such a self cannot help but be an illusion. We are not good about recognizing illusions, least of all the ones we cherish about ourselves the ones we are born with and which feed the roots of sin. For most of the people in the world, there in no genuine subjective reality than the false self of theirs, which cannot exist.

A life devoted to this life of shadow is what is called a life of sin. ... The self that exists only in my own egocentric desires is the fundamental reality of life to which everything else in the universe is ordered. Thus I use up my life in the desire for pleasures, and the thirst for experiences, for power, honor, knowledge, and love, to cloth this false self and construct this nothingness into something that is real." (Thomas Merton, New Seeds of Contemplation)

The psalm response after the 1st reading this weekend is taken from a new collection of psalms called The Lyric Psalter. The new settings in this collection have been composed by Tony Alonso and Marty Haugen. Their new musical settings are based upon The Revised Grail Psalms (2010). On April 9, 2010, the Most Rev. Arthur J. Serratelli, Bishop of Paterson, NJ, and Chairman of the Bishops' Committee on Divine Worship of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, informed the bishops of the United States that The Revised Grail Psalms had received an official recognitio from the Vatican's Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments. It was the monks of Conception Abbey, in Conception, Missouri, under the direction of Abbot Gregory J. Polan, O.S.B., who produced this new translation.

This is what Fr. Michael Joncas has said regarding the new translations:

The approval of Benedictine Abbot Gregory Pollan's revision of the Grail Psalter for liturgical use in the United States has enriched the English-speaking world with a translation faithful to the original Hebrew, informed by usage in the Roman Rite, and contoured toward song.



In today's Gospel (Luke 4: 21-30), Jesus let's us know that he sees himself as a prophet, a person who has an important message from God. A prophet challenges us to make God the most important thing in our life. We are challenged to put God before other things, like riches or friends or power. Sometimes people don't want to hear this message because it is too difficult.

A prophet challenges us to act in the ways that God wants us to act, that is being loving people who put others first. Sometime we know that what a prophet is challenging us to do is the right and best thing to do; but it is hard to hear a reminder from someone else. This may be the reason that the people became angry with Jesus in today's Gospel story.

No doubt it is <u>our</u> challenge to be open to the message Jesus gives to do our best to put God first in our life and to love others as ourselves (no matter who is reminding us).

A ritual says something that words cannot communicate. Christ left us the ritual of Eucharist. The Word of God gathers us and Eucharist touches us in a

physical embrace. The Body of Christ means Jesus, the Eucharist and us, the body of believers. We are the body of Christ on earth.

~When do you feel like you are part of the Body of Christ?

The Eucharist has multiple facets--

- ~Are you more conscious of Eucharist as the enactment of the Last Supper or as a daily feeding, an embrace by God?
- c) Eucharist as sacrifice. It is a ritual, and it isn't to be explained rationally. By ritually reenacting the Eucharist we believe it is actually happening and so are able to enter into the Mystery of Christ's death and resurrection. We go to Eucharist not just to consume Christ, but to enter into the event, the Mystery.
- ~What do you feel about entering into this Mystery in which God will embrace you?
- d) Eucharist is both a sacrifice AND a meal. It exists in order that Christians can get together to enjoy one another. Eucharist exists for people to get together for the sake of getting together, to be in community. ~What is your experience of being a part of the community at Eucharist?
