

Hi All!

I want to take some time this week to inform you about a project, or maybe better a prayerful task, the Vocations Committee is going to be bringing forth to the parish—it is called the Vocations Chalice.

What this program entails is families from the parish will have in their possession, for a week, a chalice for vocations. While the Chalice is in the possession of the family, it will be a center piece in their home for the week. Daily prayers, as a family, will occur dealing with an increase in vocations. The purpose of the Vocations Chalice is to have a parish family involvement in the propagation of vocations in all facets of religious life, that being the priesthood, permanent diaconate and consecrated life.

The way this program works is that families will sign up to have the Chalice in their possession each week throughout the course of the year. At mass, each week, the Chalice will be transferred from one family to another. That is, the family that had the Chalice for the past week will give the Chalice to the family who will have it in their possession the following week, thus receiving the Chalice and accepting the responsibility of prayers for vocations.

This program serves many things: first, prayers by the parish for vocations; second, prayers within our individual families for vocations; and third, a witness to the members of our families how important vocations are to the life of the Church.

So, in this program we need all of you as parish members to not only prayerfully consider taking on the Vocations Chalice for a week, but actually taking the responsibility of accepting it!

I thank you ahead of time for all the prayers you do for vocations all ready but we need more along with personal action in this area.

Cucchi's Corner

The psalm response after the 1st reading this weekend is taken from a new collection of psalms called The Lyric Psalter. The new settings in this collection have been composed by Tony Alonso and Marty Haugen. Their new musical settings are based upon The Revised Grail Psalms (2010). On April 9, 2010, the Most Rev. Arthur J. Seratelli, Bishop of Paterson, NJ, and Chairman of the Bishops' Committee on Divine Worship of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, informed the bishops of the United States that The Revised Grail Psalms had received an official recognitio from the Vatican's Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments. It was the monks of Conception Abbey, in Conception, Missouri, under the direction of Abbot Gregory J. Polan, O.S.B., who produced this new translation.

This is what Fr. Michael Joncas has said regarding the new translations:

The approval of Benedictine Abbot Gregory Pollan's revision of the Grail Psalter for liturgical use in the United States has enriched the English-speaking world with a translation faithful to the original Hebrew, informed by usage in the Roman Rite, and contoured toward song.

LENT SOUP AND BREAD SUPPERS and STATIONS of the CROSS

The three traditional practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. One of the Lenten events that St. John Neumann has offered for a number of years is Friday Soup and Bread Suppers followed by Stations of the Cross. Supper starts at 6:00 PM and runs until we run out of soup or until about 6:50ish. The soups are meat free with a side of bread provided and a beverage. Then there is the option to move to church for Stations of the Cross. At the supper a donation that would be equivalent to what you would spend on a meal for your family is accepted. Donations go directly to our St. Vincent De Paul ministry. Stations start at 7:00 PM. Your family is invited to one or both parts of the evening.

There are plenty of opportunities to go beyond just savoring the fine soups that are provided every week. In the gathering area there is a sign up board over the credenza. The following are the various opportunities you and your family can participate in.

COORDINATOR: This individual / family / group supervises the kitchen preparations and the evening activities. They need to be available from 4:45 PM until clean up is completed. A list of who has signed up will be provided. Making a reminder call to those who have signed up during the week before the supper is helpful to make certain the evening goes smooth. Training and a walk through the kitchen for the team/individual will be provided. Dates open for this are March 8 and March 15. Please contact Marshall Grazioli at mgraz5@yahoo.com or 734-981-6778 if interested.

SOUP PROVIDER: Please make or purchase 6 – 9 quarts of meatless soup. You may use a meat base like beef or chicken, as long as there are no chunks of meat. In the soup section they do sell vegetable soup stock and soup base. If we are warming, please get it to the kitchen by 5:15 PM; if you are bringing it hot, bring it by 5:45 PM.

Possible soups: Vegetarian Chili, Cabbage, Cream of Broccoli, Mushroom, Corn Chowder, Seafood, Vegetable, Seafood Chowder or your favorite.

BREAD PROVIDER: Please make or purchase One Large Loaf or it's equivalent (about 20 slices). Bring it to the kitchen during the day on Friday by 5:15 PM.

Suggestions: Dinner Rolls, Whole Wheat, Rye or other Grain, French or Italian.

SET UP CREW: Need to be available from 5:00 PM until 6:00 PM. This team of folks will be responsible for covering and setting the tables, getting out the soup bowls, napkins and silverware, setting up the butter, peanut butter, jelly and bread area, making coffee and tea water, cutting up bread and warming soups as necessary. Setting soup out.

SERVING CREW: Need to be available from 5:45 until 7:00 PM. Possibly help with last minute set up details. Serve the soup and beverages as needed. Replenish peanut butter and jelly, bread and punch as needed.

CLEAN UP CREW: Need to be available from 6:45 PM until area is cleaned up. This crew is responsible to clear and clean the dinning area and the kitchen. Left over soup can be returned to their providers or they can be packaged and left in the refrigerator to be distributed to families in need.

FAITH FORMATION

In today's Gospel (Luke 5: 1-11) Jesus said to those who would be among his apostles, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men." And the story continues, "When Fifteenth week of class they brought their boats to the shore, they left everything and followed him.

> I always find this story a bit amazing. Simon Peter, James and John were fishermen by trade. They worked hard at their job to bring fish to market and to support and feed their families. Yet when Jesus suggested that they should now become fishers of people, they set aside their trade and went with Jesus.

> How do we respond to this story? We too are given the job of being fishers of people at our Baptism. This fishing can happen in many different ways. It can happen within our families when we pray together or talk about our faith. This is truly one of the goals of spending our time together in the Faith UNwrapped sessions that we have each month in our parish. For example the sharing or discussion within families and with other families can deepen our own faith as adults and it can nurture the faith of our children as they become identified with our St. John Neumann Faith Community.

But this fishing expedition doesn't end with the Faith UNwrapped sessions.

With each session we are given a Take Home Gift, which has suggestions of ways to respond to the messages that are provided for all ages.

All our families with children in Religious Formation, participate in Faith UNwrapped as part of the Faith Formation program. But actually all parishioners are encouraged to participate. Faith UNwrapped is a great way to help us deepen and share our faith together as a parish. Give it a try, if you haven't. Lent is coming and it might be a great time to try Faith UNwrapped. Each session offers four opportunities to attend. Our next session is March 10th through March 13th.

One of the FUN things (pun intended) about Faith UNwrapped is sharing a meal with other parishioners. You may share a comment about your own faith that helps someone else catch the Spirit. Remember Jesus' words, "..from now on you will be catching people."







FAITH WORKS

In 1966 Pope Paul VI reorganized the Church's practice of public penance in his "Apostolic Constitution on Penance." The 1983 revision of the Code of Canon Law incorporated the changes made by Pope

Paul. Not long after that, the U.S. bishops applied the canonical requirements to the practice of public penance in our country.

To sum up those requirements, Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

Fasting as explained by the U.S. bishops means partaking of only one full meal. Some food (not equaling another full meal) is permitted at breakfast and around midday or in the evening—depending on when a person chooses to eat the main or full meal.

Abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, milk products or condiments made of animal fat.

Each year in publishing the Lenten penance requirements, the U.S. bishops quote the teaching of the Holy Father concerning the seriousness of observing these days of penance. The obligation to do penance is a serious one; the obligation to observe, as a whole or "substantially," the days of penance is also serious.

But no one should be scrupulous in this regard; failure to observe individual days of penance is not considered serious. Moral theologians remind us that some people are excused from fasting and/or abstinence because of sickness or other reasons.

In his "Apostolic Constitution on Penance," Pope Paul VI did more than simply reorganize Church law concerning fast and abstinence. He reminded us of the divine law that each of us in our own way do penance. We must all turn from sin and make reparation to God for our sins. We must forgive and show love for one another just as we ask for God's love and forgiveness.

The Code of Canon Law and our bishops remind us of other works and means of doing penance: prayer, acts of self-denial, almsgiving and works of personal charity. Attending Mass daily or several times a week, praying the rosary, making the way of the cross, attending the parish evening prayer service, teaching the illiterate to read, reading to the blind, helping at a soup kitchen, visiting the sick and shut-ins and giving an overworked mother a break by baby-sitting—all of these can be even more meaningful and demanding than simply abstaining from meat on Friday.

"THE 40 DAYS OF LENT" (when a symbolic number becomes a real number) has always been more of a

metaphor than a literal count. Over the course of history the season of preparation for Easter Sunday has ranged from one day (in the first century) to 44 (today in the Roman church). Officially since 1970, Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sunset on Holy Thursday.

Already at the Council of Nicea in 325 the bishops spoke of the quadragesima paschae (Latin for "40 days before Easter") as the well-established custom. At that time Lent began on the sixth Sunday before Easter and ended at dusk on Holy Thursday—40 days. But the council also forbade fasting, kneeling, and any other acts of sorrow and penance on Sundays, even in Lent. So only 34 of the 40 days were for fasting.

Since Jesus fasted and prayed for 40 days after his Baptism, Christians in the fifth century wanted literally 40 days of penance before Easter. The first step was to add Good Friday and Holy Saturday, the "paschal fast," to make 36 fasting days.

Then, four more days of fasting and penance were added: Ash Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday before the first Sunday of Lent, bringing the total to 40. So today, while the season of Lent (Ash Wednesday to Holy Thursday) is technically 44 days, the number of days for penance and fasting before Easter is still 40: 44 days minus 6 Sundays equals 38, plus Good Friday and Holy Saturday equals 40.

However you do the "math," Lent calls us, the Church, to let go of those things/attitudes/actions that prevent us from living a life of love and compassion.





THE PASSION AND DEATH OF JESUS (According to Matthew, Mark, and Luke)


