LENT SOUP AND BREAD SUPPERS and STATIONS of the CROSS

The three traditional practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. One of the Lenten events that St. John Neumann has offered for a number of years is Friday Soup and Bread Suppers followed by Stations of the Cross. Supper starts at 6:00 PM and runs until we run out of soup or until about 6:50ish. The soups are meat free with a side of bread provided and a beverage. Then there is the option to move to church for Stations of the Cross. At the supper a donation that would be equivalent to what you would spend on a meal for your family is accepted. **Donations go directly to our St. Vincent De Paul ministry.** Stations start at 7:00 PM. Your family is invited to one or both parts of the evening.

There are plenty of opportunities to go beyond just savoring the fine soups that are provided every week. In the gathering area there is a sign up board over the credenza. The following are the various opportunities you and your family can participate in.

COORDINATOR: This individual / family / group supervises the kitchen preparations and the evening activities. They need to be available from 4:45 PM until clean up is completed. A list of who has signed up will be provided. Making a reminder call to those who have signed up during the week before the supper is helpful to make certain the evening goes smooth. Training and a walk through the kitchen for the team/individual will be provided. **Dates open for this are March 8 and March 15. Please contact Marshall Grazioli at mgraz5@yahoo.com or 734-981-6778 if interested.**

SOUP PROVIDER: Please make or purchase 6 – 9 quarts of meatless soup. You may use a meat base like beef or chicken, as long as there are no chunks of meat. In the soup section they do sell vegetable soup stock and soup base. If we are warming, please get it to the kitchen by 5:15 PM; if you are bringing it hot, bring it by 5:45 PM.

Possible soups: Vegetarian Chili, Cabbage, Cream of Broccoli, Mushroom, Corn Chowder, Seafood, Vegetable, Seafood Chowder or your favorite.

BREAD PROVIDER: Please make or purchase One Large Loaf or it's equivalent (about 20 slices). Bring it to the kitchen during the day on Friday by 5:15 PM. Suggestions: Dinner Rolls, Whole Wheat, Rye or other Grain, French or Italian.

SET UP CREW: Need to be available from 5:00 PM until 6:00 PM. This team of folks will be responsible for covering and setting the tables, getting out the soup bowls, napkins and silverware, setting up the butter, peanut butter, jelly and bread area, making coffee and tea water, cutting up bread and warming soups as necessary. Setting soup out.

SERVING CREW: Need to be available from 5:45 until 7:00 PM. Possibly help with last minute set up details. Serve the soup and beverages as needed. Replenish peanut butter and jelly, bread and punch as needed.

CLEAN UP CREW: Need to be available from 6:45 PM until area is cleaned up. This crew is responsible to clear and clean the dining area and the kitchen. Left over soup can be returned to their providers or they can be packaged and left in the refrigerator to be distributed to families in need.

Today's Gospel (Luke 9: 28b-36) tells us the story we call the Transfiguration. In the story, the disciples Peter, John and James see Jesus in a very different way. They are on top of a mountain. His "face changed in appearance and his clothes were dazzling white." They see him speaking with Moses and Elijah. Then a cloud surrounds them and they hear a voice say, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him."

The story is filled with symbols that give us a message. The description of how Jesus' face and clothes are changed suggest to us that Jesus is the light that we can live by. When it is dark, we can be confused, frightened and stumble. Turning on a light can solve that problem. Jesus is the person to turn to when things are hard or dark in our life.

The Gospel story also tells us that Jesus is God the Father's chosen Son. We are told to listen to him. During this season of Lent we try hard to spend more time in prayer and so listen to Jesus. Jesus invites us to walk with him, which we know means taking on the cross. Giving ourselves to others, especially the poor and needy, is what is meant by walking with Jesus.

Our parish offers us some marvelous ways to turn to Jesus, our light and to walk with Jesus, our model. Last week Catherine Lanni came to speak to adults on Thursday evening. Dr. Patricia Cooney-Hathaway, a professor of Spirituality and Theology from Sacred Heart Major Seminary, will be here on Tuesday, March 19th. Bible study with Sr. Joel is happening on Wednesday evenings.

Our March Faith UN-wrapped (March 10 through 13) will address all ages with how the Holy Spirit speaks through the documents of Vatican II. This month is entitled, "The People of God, Unwrapping Ecumenism."

In the Gathering area look for the "The Little Black Books" for daily personal prayer.

Consider reaching out to the poor through the parish's outreach program for this Lent, i.e. Heifer International (www.heifer.org)

Each Friday we have Eucharistic Adoration or soup suppers, followed by Stations of the Cross with evening prayer.

FAITH WORKS

Catholicism does not call us to abandon the world, but to help shape it. This does not mean leaving worldly tasks and responsibilities, but transforming them.

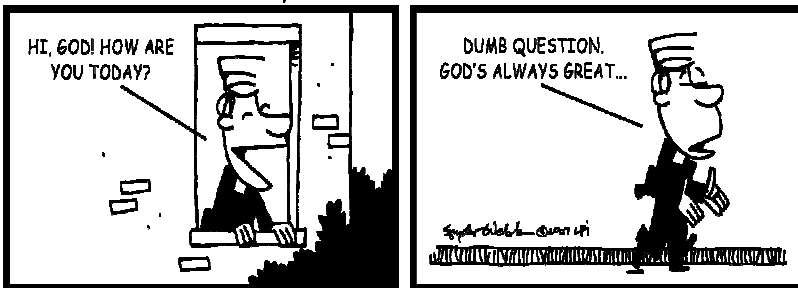
We begin at home. Our families are the starting point and the center of a vocation for justice. How we treat our parents, spouses and children is a reflection of our commitment to Christ's love and justice. We demonstrate our commitment to the gospel by how we spend our time and money, and whether our family life includes an ethic of charity, service and action for justice.

Workplace justice. Workers are called to pursue justice. In the Catholic tradition, work is not a burden. Work is a way of supporting our family, realizing our dignity, promoting the common good and participating in God's creation. Decisions made at work can make important contributions to an ethic of justice. Catholics have the often difficult responsibility of choosing between competing values in the workplace. This is a measure of holiness. Associations that enable workers, owners or managers to pursue justice often make the witness of the individual more effective.

Business decisions. Owners, managers and investors face important opportunities to seek justice and pursue peace. Ethical responsibility is not just avoiding evil, but doing right, especially for the weak and vulnerable. Decisions about the use of capital have moral implications: Are they creating and preserving quality jobs at living wages? Are they building up community through the goods and services they provide? While economic returns are important, they should not take precedence over the rights of workers or protection of the environment.

Buying decisions. As consumers, believers can promote social justice or injustice. In an affluent culture that suggests that what we have defines who we are, we can live more simply. When we purchase goods and services, we can choose to support companies that defend human life, treat workers fairly, protect creation and respect other basic moral values at home and abroad. We can also make conscious efforts to consume less.

If we sometimes get confused about what God wants, we are in good company. In today's Gospel a few of the Apostles join Jesus on a mountain, where he is transfigured. Meaning Jesus is transformed, changed so they can see who he truly is. They hear God's voice telling them to listen to Jesus' words. They go down the mountain and still are confused. Later on they even abandon Jesus. The Apostles were human like us. It would be nice if we always saw God and heard God's voice so clearly. It just doesn't happen that way. God at times can seem very close and other times very far away. The Scriptures can seem crystal clear at times, but then confusing at other times when you try to live them in daily life. Some of us have had "transforming" experiences, like powerful Retreats where everything seems so clear or moments of prayer when God seems very close. 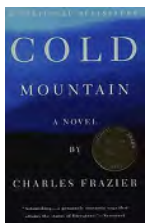
Overeater's Anonymous Open Meeting

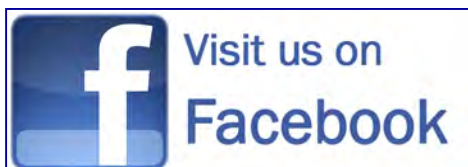
