I hope you all had a pleasant week! This week our Gospel is the gospel in which a woman is caught in the act of adultery and her accusers are turned back by Christ while the woman is free to leave without any punishment! One of the profound questions to this Gospel by both the opponents in the Gospel and Christian teachers throughout the years is how could Jesus let a blatant sinner off without punishment? "St. Ambrose worried that the Gospel could produce anxiety in the inexperienced and tried to dismiss the idea that Jesus could have made a mistake. John Calvin assured his followers that although Jesus remits our sins, he does not subvert the social order or abolish legal sentences and punishments. While the latter may be true, Jesus does, indeed, abolish the notion that our relationship with God is contained within rules and law." (Barbara Read). Law can never truly express how we relate with God. God's forgiveness, offered to us in the person of Christ, binds us to God and invites us to a new way of life. This gift of forgiveness is replicated every time WE offer forgiveness and compassion to one another, as Christ does to the adulteress woman!

You have all seen the image painting by Michelangelo on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel in Rome: God surrounded by cherubs, strains his right arm forward, with his index finger extended toward Adam. Rather than pointing at Adam as accusing him of guilt, God is exerting every effort to draw us, the human, into the divine embrace of God—the two fingers, almost touching, but not quite. And the completion of that connection if desired, is up to Adam, or US!

That my friends is forgiveness as opposed to accusation! It is done out of LOVE!

As you drive home ponder the following:

While you pray, keep in mind the image of the finger of God that points toward compassion rather than condemnation. How might you be holding back from touching the finger of God? What does Jesus say to you when you face him in prayer with your sins?

Lastly a thought from Cardinal Avery Dulles:

"It is evident that discipleship is a wide and flexible concept ... by the tradition as embodying the ideals of the active and contemplative life. But notwithstanding all this variety, there is a proportionately common element, the norm of which is given in Christ. All are held to: 1.) self-abnegation, 2.) humble service, 3.) generosity towards the needy, and 4.) patience in adversity. ... No follower of Christ must be so taken up with external activities as to forget the "one thing necessary" (Luke 10:42) namely, to be inwardly transformed by the knowledge and love Christ brings into the world."

Cucchi's Corner

During Lent the Chorale has sung the Agnus Dei from the Missa Choralis by Fr. Licinio Refice. Fr. Ron sang this piece while a student at The Pontifical North American College in Rome (2000-2004). The seminary community is composed of students sponsored by dioceses from across the United States and Australia who devote themselves to personal formation for priestly ministry under the attentive guidance, supervision and evaluation of a formation faculty of priests and religious.

Licinio Refice was an Italian composer and priest. He and other composers of the time were taking Italian church music in a new direction. Refice also wrote operas. Refice died in 1954 during a performance of Cecilia (one of his operas) in Rio de Janeiro. Renata Tebaldi was singing the title role in the performance.

The text of work is the Agnus Dei from the Roman Catholic Mass. The title Lamb of God appears in the Gospel of John, with the exclamation of John the Baptist: "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" in John 1:29 when he sees Jesus.

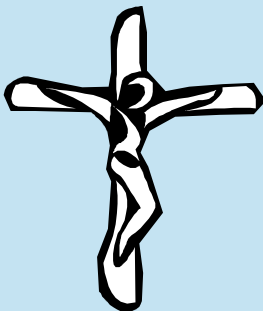

Today's Gospel story (John 8:1-11) tells us about the time some people brought a woman caught in sin to Jesus and how he responded to the situation. I love how Mary DuQuaine and Aileen Scommegna suggest we talk to children about this story.

We might wonder what Jesus wrote on the ground. Whatever Jesus wrote, the wind and the weather made it disappear. Perhaps Jesus was making the point that this is how God treats our sins when we turn to God because we are sorry for our sins and ask for forgiveness. God wipes our sins away like sand being blown away in the wind. The sadness that sin gives us is wiped away too and we can rejoice.

The story also reminds us that everybody makes mistakes. Of course Jesus is the one person in the story who never committed a sin. But he is the person in the story who is full of forgiveness for the woman. Jesus wants us to be like him.

Jesus want us to love others as he loves us. He wants us to not judge others and be forgiving.

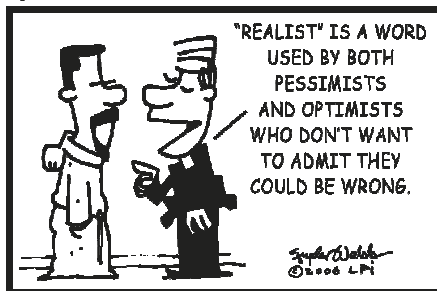
March's **Faith UNwrapped** examined Ecumenism. No goal of Vatican II held a higher place in the heart of Blessed John XXIII than the restoration of ties with other Christians. As a Vatican diplomat in various parts of Europe during the years before and after World War II, Pope John recognized that the divisions between Christian churches were a cause of scandal. But even more, he held very dear to his own heart the prayer of Jesus before he died, "That all may be one..." (John 17:20).

In his opening speech at Vatican II, Pope John said this: "The Catholic Church, therefore, considers it her duty to work actively so that there may be fulfilled the great mystery of that unity, which Jesus Christ invoked with fervent prayer from His heavenly Father on the eve of His sacrifice." (Opening speech at Vatican II of Pope John XXIII on October 11, 1962.)

Some Principles to help us more toward the restoration of Christian Unity

1. Nurture a sense of truth about other Christians, avoiding stereotypes and prejudices.
2. Join together in dialogue in order to gain a greater appreciation of each other's richness.
3. Cooperate with each other to address the needs of the society around us.
4. Join together in appropriate forms of shared prayer.
5. Humbly examine our own religion to make sure it is in line with the will of Christ.
6. Do all this under the guidance of the Holy Spirit and the leaders of the Church.
7. When dialoguing with Christians from other denominations or people from other religions, focus on what unites us rather than on what divides us.

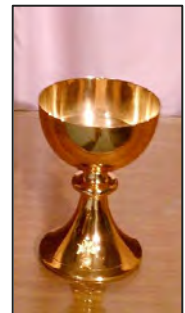
