IT'S MY OPINION AND I HAVE ONE!

Well it is Palm Sunday,. What is this day about? This is the day that we remember the “triumphal entry” of Jesus into Jerusalem, exactly one week before his resurrection. Why the name Palm Sunday? That is because of the palm branches that were laid on the road as Jesus rode the donkey into Jerusalem. Palm Sunday was the fulfillment of the Prophet Daniel’s “seventy sevens” prophecy: “Know therefore and understand, That from the going forth of the command to restore and build Jerusalem until Messiah the Prince, there shall be seven weeks and sixty-two weeks; The street shall be built again , and the wall, even in troublesome times” ([Daniel 9:25](#)). [John 1:11](#) tells us, "He (Jesus) came to His own, and His own did not receive Him." The same crowds that were crying out "Hosanna" were crying out "crucify Him" five days later ([Matthew 27:22-23](#)).

That is Palm Sunday in a very very very brief explanation! As you travel home this Palm Sunday, think about the following:

Why does Jesus suffer and die on the cross?

Why didn't Jesus just find a way out? An escape clause?

How are you able to reconcile yourself to suffering?

How did Jesus “resolve” the evil in the world that causes suffering?

“He triumphs over death by accepting enslavement by it so that humanity can be set free. This is the whole meaning of death and resurrection of Christ, who descends into the most inaccessible depths of suffering and so destroys evil at its roots. There is but one solution to the mystery of evil: the triumphant Cross of Christ. Every explanation becomes unbearable in the face of suffering; every human effort becomes ridiculous in the face of evil. We are unable to bring consolation or explanations to someone in the midst of suffering; all we can do is try to relieve some of his or her suffering. Jesus Christ alone brings victory over suffering of bodies and souls. ... We believe that Christ resolves the whole human drama because he alone reaches its ultimate depths. We must avoid leaving Christianity on the surface; it is neither a system of morality, nor a social order, nor a system of metaphysics. Rather it is the fact that what is inaccessible to humankind, what reveals the very mystery of his existence as neither morality nor sociology could do, has been achieved by the Word of God.” (Jean Cardinal Danielou, *Prayer, The mission of the Church*)

Cucchi's Corner

In college, I studied a few organ works by the mid-Baroque, German composer Dietrich Buxtehude. Throughout Lent I have played one of Buxtehude's works: Ach Herr Mich Armen Sunder...or as we know it in English: O Sacred Head Surrounded (# 415 in the SJN green hymnal).

It is believed that Buxtehude was born in Denmark (now part of Sweden). He preceded J.S. Bach in a period of church music history we call the North German School (1600-1725). He held positions in Helsingborg (1657-1658), then at Elsinore (Helsingør) (1660-1668), and last from 1668 at the St. Mary's Church in Lübeck. He married Tunder's daughter Anna Margarethe (1668). His position in Lübeck afforded him much latitude in his musical career. His artistry influenced other greats like Georg Philipp Telemann, G.F. Handel and J.S. Bach. I remember in my college organ literature courses hearing the story about Bach, in his 20's traveling to Lubeck to hear what Buxtehude was doing. Bach told his pastor he was going to be away for 3 weeks, but ended up being away for 3 months. What I find interesting about all of this is to see over the centuries the myriad of ways the spirit has moved to bring about God's purposes.

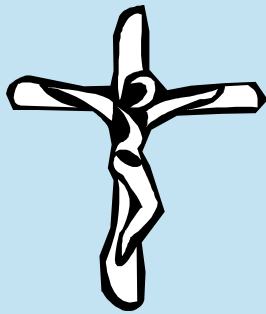

Today is Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. We hear two Gospels today. First we hear the story of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem when he was honored by a great crowd of people who were waving Palm branches and crying out in praise "Hosanna." The people were honoring Jesus as a great prophet and with the hope that he would be their King. We celebrate this event with a special procession with the help of our young people here at St. John Neumann. I hope you enjoyed celebrating this in our entrance procession today.

The second Gospel story we hear is the story of the Jesus' passion and death. We hear this story again on Friday, Good Friday. This week is a wonderful week to talk with our children about our Faith.

One thought we could explore with the children is the fact that we often call Jesus the "Lamb of God." Holy Week is a great time to talk about the meaning of this title for Jesus. On Palm Sunday, Jesus was coming into Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover Meal later in the week. The Passover Meal recalls and celebrates the Jewish people's being freed from slavery. At that time they celebrated by sacrificing a lamb to God, which helped them to secure their freedom from slavery.



When Jesus died on the cross he was the lamb that freed us from sin. So we give Jesus the title "the Lamb of God."

When it is time to receive Jesus in Communion the priest proclaims: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb."

We are those blessed people who are to receive Jesus; we are those called to the supper of the Lamb. And we celebrate this in this Holy Week!

STORE ADS ARE FILLED with “sales “ for Easter clothes. It might seem a little early to purchase “lighter” clothing at this time of year, but there is a long standing tradition of receiving some new clothing at Easter.

At one time, Easter clothes were white, then they turned to light colors and now prints of every hue are available. Why were they originally white? Because they were meant to be copies of the White Garment received at Baptism. As Christians renewed their baptismal promises at Easter, they wore new white clothes to recall their eternal life in Christ.

If you purchase new clothes for Easter, grab the moment of meaning, reflect on your faith, give thanks for your baptism, and share your faith in Jesus with someone.

EASTER FOOD AND BASKETS will be blessed this Saturday at 1:00 PM. The food traditionally blessed for Easter, the Feast of the Lord’s Passover from death to life, are the foods which God prescribed for the ancient Passover meal: lamb, bread, wine and bitter herbs. Ethnic groups have included other food which remind them of Jesus’ resurrection. One example is the use of pork which breaks the Old Covenant and leads us to the New Covenant. Eggs are an obvious reminder of New Life burst open from the “tomb.” Chocolate shapes of all sorts have also been seen in baskets brought to church for blessing.

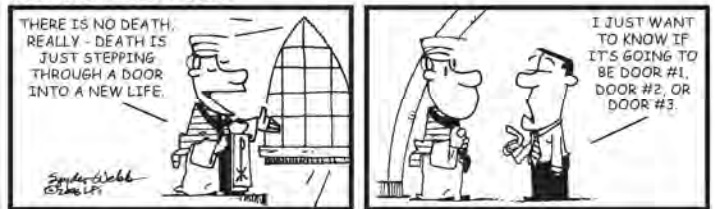

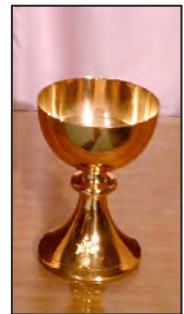

I always find Palm Sunday to be a pretty intense time to examine our own faith life. For me, it is pretty easy to become a 'fair weather' Christian. When things are good, I clearly see God, I talk to God, I let Him know how thankful I am for the blessings He has put in my life. It is mind blowing to think when Jesus arrived in Jerusalem there were crowds to meet him, all greeting him, all offering their admiration. But, just a little while later, none of them (well, except a couple) were present to be with Him at His moment of death on a cross. Maybe, a good challenge for us during this most Holy of Weeks would be to consider how we walk with Jesus. Are we sometimes celebrating His presence in our lives, juts to deny Him by our actions a short while later?
