And children's voices echo, answer making,

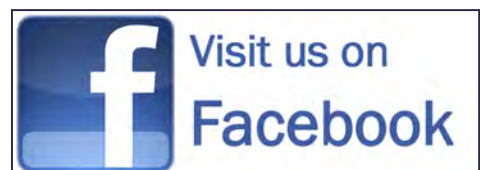

Alleluia! Alleluia!



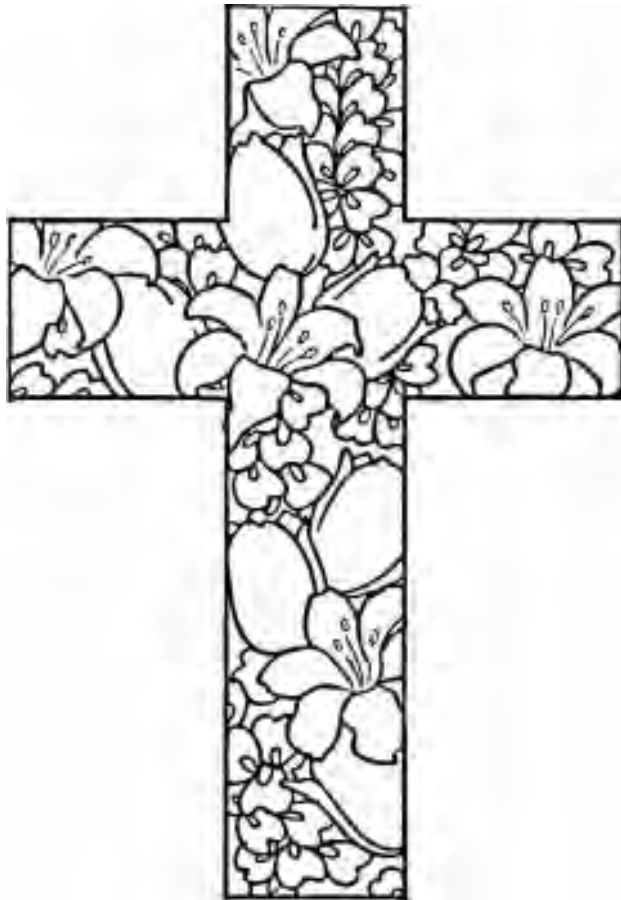

FAITH WORKS

RESURRECTION - This Jesus event reveals to us that death does not have the final word, life does. And hence we live, not dominated by the fear of death but filled with the expectation of life. This is revealed to us through the mystery of the cross and resurrection of Jesus.

What happened?" We can imagine two extreme responses to this question. On the one hand, that Jesus' rising was a bodily resuscitation (as if he simply woke up) and on the other, that his rising was only in the hearts and hopes of disappointed disciples. Each one is false—to the New Testament witness—but they help us to locate what did happen in between them.

So, the Resurrection was not the kind of resuscitation that the disciples had experienced when Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead (John 11:1-44), or the daughter of Jairus (Mark 5:21-43) or the son of the widow of Nain (Luke 7:11-17). These three would live a while and then have to die again. Rather, the body-person of the risen Christ was transformed. Unlike a mortal body, he could pass through walls (John 20:19); he could walk along with and then "vanish" from two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:31). By all accounts, "he appeared in another form" (Mark 16:12). A large group of disciples, having seen him bodily "alive," then witnessed him ascending from their midst "into heaven" (see Acts 1:6-12 and Luke 24:50-53).

Jesus' resurrection was not just wishful thinking on the part of disciples. To begin with, they clearly were not expecting it; those two disciples on the Emmaus road spent a whole day with him before recognizing who he was. When others met him, they were "startled and terrified and thought that they were seeing a ghost" (Luke 24:37).

The disciples were transformed by their conviction that God had raised Jesus up, many giving their lives in witness to this truth; such commitment is impossible from a conspiracy of fond hopes. The disciples knew that his resurrection was "real" because Jesus had shown them the wounds in his body—even inviting Thomas to touch them (John 20:24-29). He had asked them for food and eaten it (Luke 24:36-43); why, he'd even invited them to breakfast (John 21:12).

So, what did happen, between these two wrong responses? We cannot fully describe it; the resurrection of Jesus, the Christ, belongs within the supernatural world, within God's eternal realm. Paul portrays the risen Christ as "a spiritual body" (1 Corinthians 15:44) and we may not be able to improve upon that—on this side of eternity.

Those first disciples recognized Christ's resurrection as very real. Though they could not fully name his new way of living, it was a new phenomenon to their experience—of "another world," as it were, within the life and power of God. Nor can we describe it, never having known as much in our experience. Yet we are invited to join in the rock-solid conviction of those first witnesses that Jesus "was raised on the third

day" (1 Corinthians 15:4).

Death did not have final dominion over Jesus. He lived and still lives. Despite the fact that it was the last thing they expected or wanted, the friends of Jesus did encounter him once again as very much alive; they encountered him repeatedly in circumstances under which their initial doubts, suspicions, hesitations, and disbelief could not survive. The Lord was truly risen. They could not explain (and neither can we) exactly how it happened, and they had to rush forth to tell the Good News to all the world.

The real question is not so much whether we believe that Jesus rose from the dead (though one cannot be a Christian if one does not believe. What else is the faith all about?) but whether we believe that we too shall rise. The resurrection of Jesus is a "sacrament," a dazzling burst of illumination that brings light to the darkness in which we live.

The Resurrection of Jesus tells us that there is no victory through domination. There is no such thing as triumph by force. By his life, death and resurrection Jesus stops the cycle of violence and challenges the notion of dominating power. This is a power that seeks to change things from the top down, from the outside in. Instead, Jesus invites us to relational or spiritual power, where we are not just changed but transformed. And not transformed from the top down but from the bottom up, not from the outside in but from the inside out. Transformed into God!

Sr. Joan Chittister, a prominent spiritual writer, suggests that those who believe in the resurrection should see the empty tomb as an invitation to look for Jesus among the living, among the people he redeemed but still call out for mercy and help: the poor and suffering among us. Resurrection calls us to life that is more than we can have ever imagined today and everyday.

For the next seven weeks we will reflect on the meaning of the resurrection through the scriptures readings at the liturgy. Take some time in this Easter Season to review the readings to discover insights into transformed life.

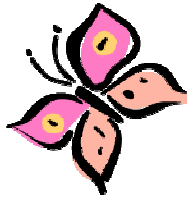

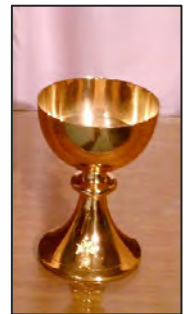

HIGH SCHOOL WITH MARY WILKERSON

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I cannot believe it is Easter Sunday. It is no Secret that Lent, Holy Week, and Easter Sunday is by far my favorite time in the Church year. It gives us a chance to walk with Christ in His suffering, but we cannot forget, it gives us a time to celebrate with Christ in His Resurrection as well.

1 Corinthians reminds us, 'Where, O Death is our victory?'. That is my favorite reminder of Easter. Even death, which seems as though it is the most final thing, cannot phase our God. It helps to give perspective on situations in my life that might seem hopeless. It helps to remind me when it seems like evil is winning, that evil was defeated a very long time ago. We are so blessed to be sons and daughters of a God who loves us enough to die for us and to rise again to show us His greatness.

Remember that Easter Day is actually 8 days long (called the Octave of Easter), we get 8 days to celebrate, 8 days to indulge (within reason), 8 days to delight in our God's victory of everything! Including death! You rock God!!!!

Below is a reflection from our youth group meeting a few weeks ago.

"Acceptance seems simple at first. Include everyone. The only problem is that it's so easy to stick to cliques and not let others in. This was the focus of youth group. We explored acceptance with simulations and discussions about times when one was left out and when one left others out. By the end of the night, everyone left with a better understanding about how important it is to break out of cliques and reach out to someone who could use some love."

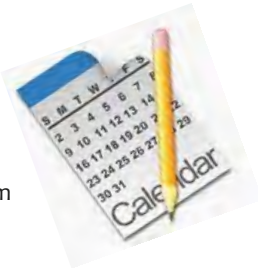
