Well, this weekend the Stewardship Commission, in conjunction with the parish council, the other commissions in the parish, and myself are kicking off a Stewardship Campaign dealing with TIME AND TALENT. This is something that the Stewardship Commission, which was newly formed this year, has been working on since its inception.

When first formed the Stewardship Commission put together a mission statement for their work and that statement is as follows:

As leaders of the Stewardship Commission for St. John Neumann Parish, we are called by Christ and gifted by the Holy Spirit to motivate our fellow community members to engage in a more fulfilling participation in prayer, nurturing, sharing and giving of our time, talent and treasure within our parish community and the community beyond.

With this mission in mind, the commission felt that an education process of the sharing of our Time and Talent needed to be done within our community. So this is the kickoff weekend of a nine-week campaign of doing just that, a campaign that will culminate the weekend of June 1 and 2 with a Ministry Fair.

All of us are called by the Lord to be His disciples, and who among us does not want a closer relationship with God? Many times, however, we are so preoccupied with our daily affairs that we fail to see discipleship as God calling to each of us. As Christians, it is good to pause and take time out to listen to the Lord calling us.

During the next several weeks, our parish community will learn more about how each one of us can become a better Christian, a disciple of Christ. We will be learning about Christian stewardship, the outward expression of Christian discipleship.

For many of us, stewardship has only one meaning – giving of our financial resources. The fact is, Christian stewardship can be a very beautiful and harmonious way of life. Its meaning is far more encompassing than simply giving. Stewardship involves prayer, nurturing our families, and sharing our God-given gifts with others.

Contained inside the bulletin this week is a brochure, *Christian Stewardship*. As we begin our Christian Stewardship journey, please take a few minutes to read the brochure and learn more about the true meaning of stewardship. I think you will find it helpful.

As the weeks progress we will be hearing about Christian stewardship from people within our parish and their personal experiences with stewardship and what it has meant in their lives..

Please pray for our parish community as we take this stewardship journey together in response to the Lord's call!

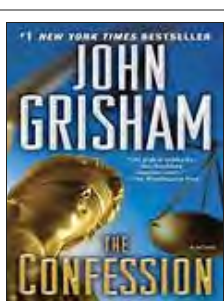

In the midst of many losses and calamities, Job responds with one of the most beautiful poems of hope ever written. So beautiful that many composers have set music to this text. George Friedrick Handel wrote one of the most beautiful airs in all music, Number 45 of *Messiah, I Know that My Redeemer Liveth*.

While doing research for this article I came across a quote by Scott Soper which I thought was quite interesting:

"Music expresses so much about us, much more than words alone ever could. If we are going to share with each other what we have learned about life and God, we must use all of our arts. FAITH WORKS

From Fr. Ron Rolheiser - "When I despair, I remember that all through history, the way of truth and love has always won. There have been murderers and tyrants, and for a time they seem invincible. But in the end they always fall. Think of it, always." Mohandas K. Ghandi wrote those words and they can be helpful in difficult times.

We live in difficult times. We've only to watch the news on any given evening. If there's an all-knowing, all-powerful, and all-loving God who's Lord of this universe, his presence isn't very evident on the evening news: There's violence all over the planet, fuelled on every side by self-righteous ideologies that sanction hatred, by self-interest that lets community fend for itself, and by a socially-approved greed that lets the poor fend for themselves.

It's fair and reflective to wonder: Where is the resurrection in all of this? Why is God seemingly so inactive? Where is the vindication of Easter Sunday?

These are important questions, even if they aren't particularly deep or new. They were the questions used to taunt Jesus on the cross: "If you're the son of God, come down off that cross! If you're God, prove it! Act now!" Then and now, it seems, we've never figured out why salvation can't work like a normal movie where, at the end, a morally superior violence kills off all that's bad.

Except God doesn't work like a Hollywood movie and never has. For centuries they prayed for a messiah, a superman, to come and display a power and a glory that would simply overpower evil but what they got was a helpless baby lying in the straw. And when that baby grew up they wanted him to overthrow the Roman empire and instead he let himself be crucified. We haven't changed much in what we expect of God.

But God, as revealed in the death and resurrection of Jesus, doesn't meet our expectations even as he infinitely exceeds them. What the resurrection teaches is that God doesn't forcibly intervene to stop pain and death. Instead he redeems the pain and vindicates the death. God rids the world of evil not by using force to blot it out, but by vindicating what's good in the eyes of evil so that eventually the good is all that's left. Evil has to forever "look upon the one whom it has pierced!" until it understands what it has done and lets itself be transformed. How does this work?

What the resurrection of Jesus reveals is that there's a deep moral structure to the universe, that the contours of the universe are love and goodness and truth and that this structure, anchored at its center by Ultimate love and power, is non-negotiable: You live life its way or it simply won't come out right. More importantly, the reverse is also true: If you respect the structure and live life its way, what's good and true and loving will eventually triumph, always, despite everything. If this is true, and it is, then we don't have to escape pain and death to achieve victory, we've only to remain faithful, good, and true inside of them.

However part of what's revealed here is that we need a great patience, a patience called hope. God's day will come, but God, it seems, is not in any hurry.

Good and truth will always triumph, but this triumph must be waited-for, not because God wants us to endure pain as some kind of test, but because God, unlike ourselves, doesn't use coercion or violence to achieve an aim. God uses only love, truth, beauty, and goodness and God uses these by, structurally and non-negotiably, embedding them into the universe itself, like a giant moral immune-system that eventually, always, brings the body back to health. God doesn't need to intervene like a super-hero at the end of a Hollywood movie and use a morally- superior violence to kill the bad people so that the good are spared pain and death. God lets the universe right itself the way a body does when it is attacked by a virus. The immune-system eventually does its work, even if, in the short term, there are pain and death. But always, in the end, the universe rights itself.

Simply put: Whenever we do anything wrong, anything at all, it won't turn out right. It can't. The structure of the universe won't receive it and it comes back to us, one way or the other. Conversely, whenever we do something right, anything that's true, good, loving, or beautiful, the universe vindicates that. It judges our every act and its judgment allows no exceptions.

Perhaps that judgment doesn't seem to be immediate, it can seem a long time in coming and thus, for a time, we can be confused and ask the question: "Why doesn't God, truth and goodness, come down off the cross?" But, eventually, as Ghandi says, always, without a single exception, evil is shamed and good triumphs. The resurrection works.

Today we hear the story of “Doubting Thomas.” The Catholic Church recognizes that there are two kinds of doubt: voluntary doubt and involuntary doubt (*Catechism of the Catholic Church 2088*). Voluntary doubt means disregarding or refusing to believe what God has revealed to us and what the Church teaches us. It is an immovable, intentional doubt. It means closing yourself off to any possibility that you might be missing something or that your mind might be changed. Thomas doubts, but his doubt is the other kind: involuntary doubt. This is when we want to believe, but something inside of us is just having trouble truly accepting something. Maybe you have felt this kind of doubt from time to time. The good news is that when we doubt in this way, we remain open to the working of the Holy Spirit within us. And in time, just as he does for Thomas, God gives us what we need in order to grow in belief and understanding. Take Jesus’ words to heart today. Believe in Jesus and remain open to the power of his Resurrection.

Nina was baptized; received First Holy Communion and Confirmed at the Easter Vigil and Alexis also received First Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil. 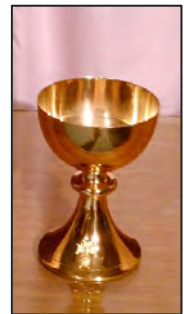

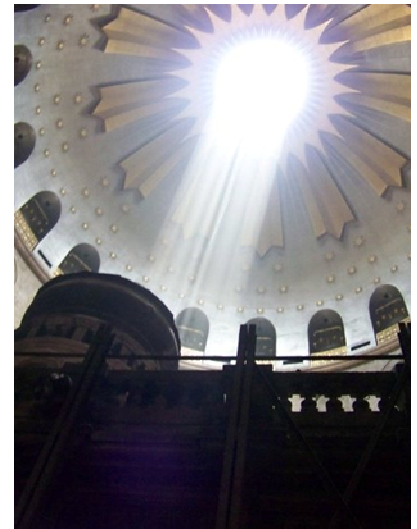

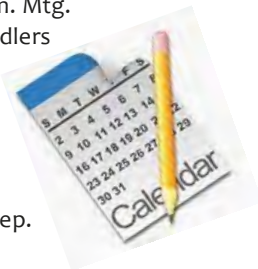
