## **IT'S MY OPINION AND I HAVE ONE!**

First, as I will do throughout the course of our Christian stewardship program, is to give at least a small blurb on Christian stewardship.

“Christ has called all of us to live lives of gratitude, thanking God for all that we have and all that we are. Christians respond to God’s generosity by cultivating their gifts wisely, sharing them generously, and realizing that God deserves the first fruits of our blessings. In the coming weeks, we will be invited to learn more about what it means to be a Christian steward.”

In our gospel reading this week we hear Jesus ask Peter three times “Do you love me?”. How significant those questions are. Through Peter’s response, he is able to put behind him the three times he denied Jesus during the Passion of Christ.

In today’s Gospel, Jesus tells Peter again and again, “If you love Me, feed my sheep.” He says the same to each of us, “if you love Me, use the gifts I have given you to serve your brothers and sisters.”

This lends so well to Christian stewardship, to love Jesus is to put that love into action in the world and share it with others. That is done by giving of ourselves all we have been given and not holding onto it. Otherwise, we are still locked away in the upper room afraid of the world and not trusting in the Love of God and how much we are to show that love.

May your prayer on this scripture, and the homilies you hear this weekend pierces your heart to ask God, ‘How can I share and give of myself to the Church, in a way similar to the way in which Jesus gave of His life so this vary Church could exist for us to worship in today?’

As a witness to you of what Christian stewardship is about and how it effects us in our lives, next weekend the 20<sup>th</sup>/21<sup>st</sup> a member of your parish family will be giving their personal testimony as to what being a Christian steward has meant to them in their life.

Questions to ponder:

Do I truly love Christ? If so, how do I express that love to others?

Am I able to share of the gifts I have received in this life for the betterment of not only my family at home, but my parish family as well?

Do I trust in the tenant, that the more I give the more I receive?

# Cucchi's Corner

This weekend we are singing *The Summons* by John Bell. The text really challenges us to give all of our person and entire being. I think it also deals with the fear we all sometimes encounter in regard to sharing our faith concretely with others. But the hymn text reminds us of an exciting truth present in current reality: we can live in God and God can live within us. It doesn't get more exciting than that! The hymn comes to us from the Iona community. Here is some information explaining the tenants of the community from their website <http://www.iona.org.uk>:

Iona is a small island off the west coast of Scotland, where in 563, Columba founded a Celtic monastery that was very influential in its own times. In the middle ages it was the site of a Benedictine abbey and over the centuries has attracted many thousands of people on their own pilgrim journeys.

The Iona Community, founded in 1938 by the Rev George MacLeod, then a parish minister in Glasgow, is an ecumenical Christian community that is committed to seeking new ways of living the Gospel in today's world. Initially this purpose was expressed through the rebuilding of the monastic quarters of the mediaeval abbey on Iona and pursued in mission and ministry throughout Scotland and beyond. The Community today remains committed to *rebuilding the common life, through working for social and political change, striving for the renewal of the church with an ecumenical emphasis, and exploring new more inclusive approaches to worship, all based on an integrated understanding of spirituality.*

The Iona Community today has almost 250 Members, mostly in Britain, over 1500 Associate Members and around 1400 Friends worldwide. An ecumenical community of men and women from different walks of life and different traditions in the Christian church, its members share a common Rule which includes:

- Daily prayer and reading the Bible
- Mutual accountability for their use of time and money
- Regular meeting together

Action and reflection for justice, peace and the integrity of creation

In you and you in me.*

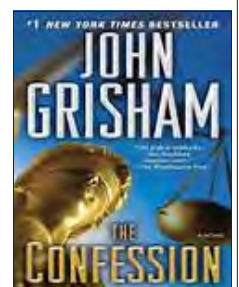

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Today’s Gospel (John 21:1-19) is one of my favorite Gospel stories. I especially love the conversation between Jesus and Peter. It is an incredible story of forgiveness and reconciliation. Jesus invites Peter to proclaim his love for Jesus. That invitation allows Peter to understand that Jesus knows that Peter loves him even though he was too afraid to stand and admit to that love on the night Jesus was arrested.

When I say this story is incredible, I think of my own experience as a human being. I think of how hard it is to forgive someone to the point of reconciliation when someone has hurt us deeply. Jesus on the other hand asks Peter to come again and walk with him and help him bring others to God. Wow...

Jesus also said we should love as he does. Like the way he loved Peter? Wow...

# FAITH WORKS

What are you planning for vacation this summer? It's almost vacation time! Time to indulge hobbies, time to share leisurely meal, time to renew relationships. For some, half the fun is planning the vacation. For others, half the fun is being with others on vacation. No matter. It's a time to escape the mundane, high-pressured existence to find a sense of self.

After the resurrection, Peter and his companions left the pressure of Jerusalem for their quiet roots in Galilee. There, doing what they did best, they encountered the Lord. In symbols that would paint the way they evangelized.

Unlike the other resurrection stories found in the Gospels, this appearance took place in Galilee. There are seven disciples in the story: Peter (the leader), the sons of Zebedee (James and John), Nathaniel, Thomas, and two others. For Jews, the number seven represented fullness, so there was a "fullness" of the community present.

According to good business practice, Peter went fishing with the others at night. But they did not catch anything. Reminiscent of Jesus' call to Peter at the beginning of his Galilean ministry, Jesus greeted the community at dawn and ordered them to cast their nets over the side. Such a great number of fish were caught, they had to be dragged to the shore.

Like much of John, these few sentences were packed with symbolism. The *boat* was an old symbol for the church; *fishing at night* represented a failing missionary effort. It must have felt like the night Jesus was dead in the tomb. But with the dawn, the Risen Lord was present, and with him came the great number of new Christians (represented by the great number of fish). According to some early Christian writers, the number of 153 fish represented all the known species in the world at the time; these fish represented all the peoples of the world, where the missionary effort should go. With the great catch, the Lord was recognized.

Bringing the catch with them, Peter and the disciples joined Jesus for breakfast of bread and fish. A breakfast meal with the Risen Lord should have been Eucharist (bread and wine) but a meal of bread and fish was part of the early Christian tradition. The multiplication of the loaves and the fish (Matt. 14:15-21 & 15:32-38, Mark 6:35-44 & 8:1-8, Luke 9:12-17, and John 5:6-13), the appearance of the Risen Lord eating fish as a proof of the resurrection and early Christian art in the catacombs (images of Jesus sharing bread and fish with his followers) were powerful witnesses to this tradition.

What did the meal mean to the early Christian community? Remember that the fish represented new believers; the meal then represented the initiation of Christians, as they were incorporated into Christ and the community (represented by Christ and the community eating the fish). The image was Eucharist in reverse; instead of the believer consuming Christ in the Eucharist, the new believer is consumed by Christ. The inclusion of new believers into the Body of Christ (i.e., the community) brought new life (just as eating fish brought strength and nourishment to the body). The image of the bread and fish pointed out the close connection between

Eucharist (bread) and baptism (fish). Scholars speculate that the Church leadership had a meal of fish and bread to celebrate the initiation of new Christians into the community.

Why don't we celebrate this meal today? In the ancient society, fish could be kept only for a limited time and traded only over a limited distance. When the disciples left the area of Galilee (where fish was a food staple) and moved into the Mediterranean world of the Roman empire, the meal could only be celebrated in the coastal areas. As the Church grew to inland areas, fish was not readily available. So the tradition quickly died out.

The balance of the reading redressed Peter's denial of Jesus before his death. The Risen Lord asked Peter three times about his devotion; three times Peter professed his love for the Lord; three times, Christ instructed Peter to feed the followers. Confirming Peter's choice, Jesus used an old proverb as a prophecy for Peter's death; when he was young, he was free, but now he has made his choice, he must live with the consequences of that choice. Like Peter, a Christian's life of faith and service leads to death (to the culture) and a new life (in Christ and his community).

No matter whether the believer is new or old, a pew sitter or a leader, the call of Christ is the same: "Follow me." Following Christ means evangelization and life in the community. Are we, like Peter, spreading the net for new believers and professing a true love for our Savior? Or are we on the sidelines watching others doing the work of the Church?

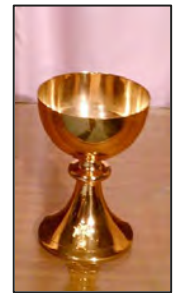
