Cucchi's Corner

On the liturgical calendar, St. Anselm's feast day falls on April 21st. This year his feast day is displaced by the 4th Sunday of Easter. I thought I would write about him anyway. Anselm was a Doctor of the Church and Archbishop of Canterbury, England. He was born in Aosta, Italy around the year 1033. He wanted to enter the monastery at age 15 but his father would not allow it. Anselm left home in 1056, after his mother's death, to pursue studies in Burgundy. Three years later he moved to Bec in Normandy. There he was mentored by the great Abbot Lanfranc. Anselm became a monk at age 27. He succeded Lanfranc and was prior and abbot at Bec. Eventually Anselm was elected by other clergy to become Archbishop of Canterbury.

Anselm was considered an independent thinker and a great theologian. He believed that our reason and revelation from God could be successfully synthesised. Anselm has been called the "the Father of Scholasticism."



FAITH FORMATION

Today we hear Jesus compare his voice to that of a shepherd. Sheep recognize the voice of the shepherd. We who are Jesus' disciples must recognize Jesus' voice.

Recognizing the voice of someone we know, someone who cares for us is an experience most of us have. Think of the moment when you are already home and one of your family comes through the front door; you can't see them but you hear them say, "Hello.." It gives you a good feeling to hear that voice and to know they are home.

One author, who suggests ways to pray with children, asks the children to sit in a circle. The children will naturally sit facing each other in



the circle. She invites the children to turn around and face the outside of the circle and then all sit quietly and listen to the sounds they hear. After about one minute, she suggests to the children that they pay attention to their heart. "Listen quietly to God in your heart. Does God have a message for your heart today?"

What a beautiful question. And it is a question that is not just for children. Who is

FAITH WORK

Gene Kijek

The liturgical season of Easter is 50 days! The Church wants us to reflect on the meaning of the resurrection of Jesus. Its impact is enormous. It is the core tenet

and mystery of our faith.

Ten different appearances of our risen Lord are recorded in the New Testament. They may be arranged as follows:

- 1.To Mary Magdalene at the sepulcher alone. This is recorded at length only by John (20:11-18), and alluded to by Mark (16:9-11).
- 2.To certain women, "the other Mary," Salome, Joanna, and others, as they returned from the sepulcher. Matthew (28:1-10) alone gives an account of this. (Comp. Mark 16:1-8, and Luke 24:1-11.)
- 3.To Simon Peter alone on the day of the resurrection. (See Luke 24:34; 1 Cor. 15:5.)
- 4.To the two disciples on the way to Emmaus on the day of the resurrection, recorded fully only by Luke (24:13-35. Comp. Mark 16:12, 13).
- 5.To the ten disciples (Thomas being absent) and others "with them," at Jerusalem on the evening of the resurrection day. One of the evangelists gives an account of this appearance, John (20:19-24).
- 6.To the disciples again (Thomas being present) at Jerusalem (Mark 16:14-18; Luke 24:33-40; John 20:26 -28. See also 1 Cor. 15:5).
- 7.To the disciples when fishing at the Sea of Galilee. Of this appearance also John (21:1-23) alone gives an account.
- 8.To the eleven, and above 500 brethren at once, at an appointed place in Galilee (1 Cor. 15:6; comp. Matt. 28:16-20).
- 9.To James, but under what circumstances we are not informed (1 Cor. 15:7).
- 10. To the apostles immediately before the ascension. They accompanied him from Jerusalem to Mount Olivet, and there they saw him ascend "till a cloud received him out of their sight" (Mark 16:19; Luke 24:50 -52; Acts 1:4-10).

Jesus of Nazareth was the man who came to tell us that it is all right to trust our hopefulness. "Dream your most impossible dream," he tells us. "Hope your most expansive hope, fantasize your wildest fantasy, and you will have just begun. Out beyond those dreams, hopes, and fantasies, the generosity of my heavenly Father only begins. For eye has not seen nor has ear heard nor has it entered into the human heart what the heavenly Father has prepared for those who return his love."

It is the nature of hope that it shatters our sorrows and our fears, our disappointments and our anxieties.

Hope has its healing effect because it enables us to see things differently, to put together the pieces of our life in a pattern we may not have tried before. Hope throws something new into the picture (or, more often, perhaps, throws a spotlight on something old, lighting it in such a way that it is almost as though we had never seen it before).

Our life can begin all over again. If we hold on to hope, we can see possibilities in the other and in ourselves which were not apparent before. Angers and injuries dissolve and love is reborn.

Jesus is the man of hope. He is the Christ, the one whose words and deeds reveal the heavenly Father to us as he was never revealed before. Jesus is the "sacrament" of God, the best revelation we will ever have of what God is like.
