Hello Everyone!

As a continuation of our Called by Christ-Gifted by the Spirit, I address this article on the Stewardship of Talent:

Stewardship in the Scriptures relates to the management of something that does not belong to us, but to someone else. Even our talents and special abilities belong to God. We own nothing that was not first given to us: "And what do you have that you did not receive? But if you did receive it, why do you boast as if you had not received it?" (1 Cor. 4:7).

God has entrusted us with aptitudes and abilities, and as good stewards, we must use them for His glory and not our own. This is true not only of musical, artistic, athletic, academic, business, and persuasive talents, but also of the spiritual gifts we have received "And since we have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let each exercise them accordingly" (Rom. 12:6).

Peter specifically relates spiritual gifts to the concept of stewardship: "As each one has received a special gift, employ it in serving one another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God" (1 Pet. 4:10). Faithful stewardship of natural talents and spiritual gifts requires that we use them to glorify God and edify others."

Our purpose is not to please ourselves, but to serve others. "Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to his edification. For even Christ did not please Himself" (Rom. 15:2-3a). Paul adds in Philippians 2:3-4: "Do nothing from selfishness or empty conceit, but with humility of mind let each of you regard one another as more important than himself; do not merely look out for your own personal interests, but also for the interests of others.

Another aspect of good stewardship is that we learn to concentrate on the things we can do well and not worry about the things we cannot do. Our calling is to be trustworthy with what we have been given, and not to envy or covet another person's abilities or ministry. Our abilities come from God and He has equipped us to fulfill the purpose for which He has called us. "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:10).

Each of us has an arena of influence, whether large or small, and a specific ministry that the Lord has placed in our care. "Let a man regard us in this manner, as servants of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God" (1 Cor. 4:1). Regardless of what we have been given, every stewardship is tested by the same standard: faithfulness. It is not the size of our ministry that counts, but what we do with what we have been entrusted.

Cucchi's Corner

St. Athanasius lived from around 297-373. He is considered a Doctor of the Church and was Archbishop of Alexandria. Athanasius' parents were probably Christians. He was well educated especially in Scripture and theology. Once ordained a deacon he became secretary to the Bishop of Alexandria. It was at this period in his life that he produced his first literary work; a thesis on the Incarnation in which he talked about Christ's redemptive work on the Cross.

One of the things Athanasius is remembered for is his conflict with Arius and Arianism. Around 323 a scandal came about by a man named Arius who said that the Word of God (Jesus) is not eternal, that He was created in time by the Eternal Father, and therefore He could only figuratively be thought of as the Son of God. Arianism is in opposition to Trinitarian Christological doctrine as determined by the first two Ecumenical Councils and currently maintained by the Roman Catholic Church. Athansius was present at the first council which was called the Council of Nicaea. It was at this council that the true doctrine of the church was set forth: Arius was excommunicated and the Nicene Creed was promulgated. Here at SJN we profess the Nicene Creed (New Missal Translation 2010) year round except during Lent.

FAITH FORMATION

In today's Gospel (John 13: 31-33a, 34-35) Jesus says, "I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that your are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

It is these words of Jesus that were the underlying message of our April Faith Unwrapped. We viewed short clips from a variety of movies and we looked for the good being done by the characters in the movie clips. We looked for how these people were showing God's love. We watched for how the good that was being done would affect those around these characters.

And why did we do this? Well, throughout this season of Faith Unwrapped we have considered the call of the Second Vatican Council, a meeting of 2500 Bishops that occurred 50 years ago. One of the major points of the documents of Vatican 2 was that all Christians, lay, as well as clergy and religious, are to called to carry out the mission of the Church. We are all called to spread the Good News. We are all called to be "salt for the earth" and "light for the world."

The most effective way to do this is by following the command that Jesus gave us in today's Gospel. Jesus points out "This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Many may do good for humanitarian reasons, but we who are Catholic Christians choose to do good because we have been commanded to love as Jesus has loved us. We know that means that we are to sacrifice our lives for others, as Jesus gave his for us.

If you were able to attend the April Faith Unwrapped, you received a booklet with a summary of the movies at which we took a peek. During our Summer break, we encourage each household to view and discuss as many of the movies as are suitable for your family. If you were unable to attend, there are several copies of the booklet available on the Faith Unwrapped table in the Gathering Area. Take one for your family and have fun at the movies. Let the movies you view and your discussion inspire you.

We are also asking parishioners to share comments and information about any other movies in which you find characters doing good or sharing God's love.

FAITH WORKS

Jesus of Nazareth was the man who came to tell us that it is all right to trust our hopefulness. "Dream your most impossible dream," he tells us. "Hope your

most expansive hope, fantasize your wildest fantasy, and you will have just begun. Out beyond those dreams, hopes, and fantasies, the generosity of my heavenly Father only begins. For eye has not seen nor has ear heard nor has it entered into the human heart what the heavenly Father has prepared for those who return his love."

It is the nature of hope that it shatters our sorrows and our fears, our disappointments and our anxieties. Hope has its healing effect because it enables us to see things differently, to put together the pieces of our life in a pattern we may not have tried before.

Our life can begin all over again. If we hold on to hope, we can see possibilities in the other and in ourselves which were not apparent before. Angers and injuries dissolve and love is reborn.

Jesus is the man of hope. He is the Christ, the one whose words and deeds reveal the heavenly Father to us as he was never revealed before. Jesus is the "sacrament" of God, the best revelation we will ever have of what God is like. Jesus' hope was rooted in the unshakable conviction that the power of God was at work in the world. He called it the "kingdom of God," and we sometimes call it the "reign of God."

The idea is that God has a plan for the world and that plan is going forward irresistibly. Jesus not only believed in the kingdom of God, he died for it. He was not only convinced that hope was valid, he went to his death because of that conviction. He knew that the power of God would guarantee that his death would not be in vain; he knew that death would have no final victory over him; he knew that the power of God would sweep away the temporary triumph of death. But he also knew he had to die.

Jesus claimed a special intimacy with the Father. Christians believe that God revealed "who God is" to us in a special way through Jesus; hence his hope was necessarily unique. Indeed the whole point of Jesus' life was that he disclosed to us a vision of hope based on his intimacy with God, something we would not dare believe, something we would not dare commit ourselves were it not for Jesus.

So Jesus went to his death with a special hope. Jesus knew he would win; he did not know how. Such is the anguish of all human life-no matter how hopeful. Jesus was supremely confident of the triumph of God's plan and of his own victory as the revelation of that plan. God's kingdom would succeed as certainly as does the seed become the tree, as does the tiny grain grow into the harvest.

The followers of Jesus who hope in the kingdom of God, live lives of courage, vigor, confidence, commitment, and generosity. they never stop trying, never give up, never sink into a rut, never turn back, never refuse an opportunity to help, never reject the possibility of reconciliation, never think that it is too late to begin again. For the followers of Jesus who hope in the kingdom of God, tomorrow is not merely the first day of the rest of their life; tomorrow will also be different even when today is the last of their life. Jesus brings a kind of certainty to hope, a certainty that we could never achieve alone. That's why we put our trust in him and allow him to form us with his great hope


