Hello all

I am not preaching this weekend, the Deacon is but I had to gather some thoughts as I do have mass for the Tigers so I had to come up with something. So earlier in the week, on Monday these were some of the rambling thoughts I have in my head. I thought I would jot them down for my article. At this point I have no idea if this will become my homily for the Tigers, but I think it is a good start!

In the Gospel this weekend Jesus asks people who they think He is. Then He tells them what it must be to be His follower, what we must do. We need to look at that because the first question determines what we do with the next question or the next command if you will. Jesus asks, "Who do people say that I am?" When you go to any bookstore today you can find out who the crowds say Jesus is. Some say Jesus is a prophet. Some people say he was just a man who deceived many people. There are all kinds of things out there that people say. If you watch the Discovery Channel or you watch the History Channel, they try to come up with their own theories as to who Jesus is. So, we can listen to what TV says about Jesus and all of these other places or we listen to ourselves. Ultimately it comes down to Jesus looking at you and saying, "Well who do YOU say that I am?" And how YOU answer that question determines how YOU live your life.

So who do you say Jesus Christ is? Is He a good person who gave us some nice moral ways to live life? You know, the LOVE stuff. We have to love each other and care about each other. That is all nice. Or is He really the Son of God and is GOD?

Somewhere in our lives we have to make sure that we have the faith of the Church. That we believe what we believe; that we know that Christ is God and if we don't really know that, then we have to search until we find that out. Once we come to know and believe that Christ is the God of the universe, the Alpha and the Omega, the One that each of us will stand before on judgment day, the One that keeps us alive by His resurrection, once we believe that, then we just cannot follow Him as a moral teacher. We must follow Him with our lives.—Not part of our lives on Sunday.—Not just trying to be good people.—That is not enough!

In the words of Jesus, "No one can be My disciple unless you deny your very self, take up your cross daily, every day and follow in My footsteps. Those who seek their life will lose it. Those who lose their life will find it." This goes against the grain and teaching of the world! To truly come to Jesus you must die! You cannot come to Jesus to "get what you want and make yourself feel good."

Many people will start church shopping because they want the church to make them feel good. To follow something because of how you feel will never make you satisfied. Why? Because your feelings change all the time, don't they?

Those of you married, I venture to guess there are days you look at your spouse and say, WOW I am so lucky. Then there are other days you look at your spouse and say to yourself (or maybe even to your spouse), "what did I do???" Ultimately though you married the person you married to give your life for them and so this is what you MUST do for Jesus, you give your life for Him!

When you and I come to Him, He says this is a daily dying to be with Me. Not just once but every day! This means we seek God's will each day of our lives and we live His will instead of our own. When it comes to following Jesus a lot of people go into automatic pilot, like saying "The Lord's Prayer." Well, YOU NEED TO STOP THAT!!!

In your daily prayer to God we should add the following:

Jesus, I have plans today but I am willing to put all of those plans aside if You have another set of plans for me.

By doing this, every day we deny our very selves, pick up our cross and follow in His steps.

Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship, a revision of Music in Catholic Worship, was developed

by the Committee on Divine Worship of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). On November 14, 2007, the Latin Church members of the USCCB approved these guidelines. These guidelines are designed to provide direction to those preparing for the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy according to the current liturgical books (in the ordinary form of celebration).

#### Foreword

Greetings from the bishops of the United States to priests, deacons, liturgists, music directors, composers, cantors, choirs, congregations, and faith communities throughout the United States. "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." It is our duty and our joy as shepherds of the Church to guide and oversee liturgical song in each particular Church. Liturgy is the source of the Church's prayer and action, and the summit by which our lives and all our ministries ascend to the Father. We pray that this document will draw all who worship the Lord into the fullness of liturgical, musical prayer.

#### I. WHY WE SING

expresses

1. God has bestowed upon his people the gift of song. God dwells within each human person, in the place where music takes its source. Indeed, God, the giver of song, is present whenever his people sing his praises.2
2. A cry from deep within our being, music is a way for God to lead us to the realm of higher things.3 As St. Augustine says, "Singing is for the one who loves."4 Music is therefore a sign of God's love for us and of our love for him. In this

sense, it is very personal. But unless music sounds, it is not music, and whenever it sounds, it is accessible to others. By its very nature song has both an individual and a communal dimension. Thus, it is

so well the sacramental presence of God to his people.

Today's Gospel is challenging. Jesus asks the same question twice: whom do you claim me to be? In both cases, Jesus was not asking for an objective answer. He asked about his role in the religious life of (first) the people and (second) the disciples.

The disciples answer for the people in order of popularity. Since Jesus preached some of the same themes as John the Baptist (repentance and the immanence of the Kingdom), most people saw Jesus as a disciple of John. There were a minority who saw Jesus in terms of the end times. They thought he fulfilled the role of Elijah. The popular belief held that Elijah would return at the end of time to announce the coming of the Messiah. Finally, a few believe Jesus had the spirit of one of the ancient prophets.

Then Jesus turns and asks the question in an emphatic way: "But you! Whom do you claim me to be?" Peter answers with an assertion of faith: You are the Christ! Luke uses Peter's answer as a springboard toward Jesus' self identification.


Jesus explains that would need to suffer, to be rejected by the leadership, and to be killed. The assumed agent for his suffering and death would be "the elders, the chief priests and the scribes." But, he would need to be raised three days later. The assumed agent for that response would be God himself. In other words, the Messiah would suffer at the hands of men, but be glorified by God.

What does it take to follow such a Messiah? To be willing to act like him. To be willing to suffer and die for the Gospel, so God can raise the person up. To be willing to become Christ-like and reject self-centered interests.

The daily cross should not be confused with daily troubles in life. The daily cross is the day by day commitment a Christian makes to follow Jesus. The daily cross is not suffering quietly through each day alone. The daily cross is to help Christ and those in his Body carry the cross that leads to glory.

Losing our life is to let go of being self-centered and focusing on nurturing the lives those around us, especially those who have no support. We accomplish this in our families, in our neighborhoods, in our workplaces, in our economic and civic choices. It's a life-style we live and leads us all to the fullness of life.
