

Hello all!

This Wednesday, July 3rd, we celebrate the Feast of St. Thomas the Apostle, the Patron of architects! Here is a little bit of information on St. Thomas, also known as doubting Thomas.

St. Thomas was a Jew, called to be one of the twelve Apostles. He was a dedicated but impetuous follower of Christ. When Jesus said He was returning to Judea to visit His sick friend Lazarus, Thomas immediately exhorted the other Apostles to accompany Him on the trip which involved certain danger and possible death because of the mounting hostility of the authorities. (Jn 11:16)

At the Last Supper, when Christ told His Apostles that He was going to prepare a place for them to which they also might come because they knew both the place and the way, Thomas pleaded that they did not understand and received the beautiful assurance that Christ is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. (Jn 14:5)

But St. Thomas is best known for his role in verifying the Resurrection of his Master. Thomas' unwillingness to believe that the other Apostles had seen their risen Lord on the first Easter Sunday merited for him the title of "doubting Thomas." Eight days later, on Christ's second apparition, Thomas was gently rebuked for his skepticism and furnished with the evidence he had demanded - seeing in Christ's hands the point of the nails and putting his fingers in the place of the nails and his hand into His side. At this, St. Thomas became convinced of the truth of the Resurrection and exclaimed: "My Lord and My God," thus making a public Profession of Faith in the Divinity of Jesus. (Jn 20:24-29)

St. Thomas is also mentioned as being present at another Resurrection appearance of Jesus - at Lake Tiberius when a miraculous catch of fish occurred. This is all that we know about St. Thomas from the New Testament. Tradition says that at the dispersal of the Apostles after Pentecost this saint was sent to evangelize the Parthians, Medes, and Persians; he ultimately reached India, carrying the Faith to the Malabar coast, which still boasts a large native population calling themselves "Christians of St. Thomas." He capped his life by shedding his blood for his Master, speared to death at a place called Calamine.

As you head home this weekend some things to ponder on our readings from Sunday:

What happens to Jesus when He reaches his destination – Jerusalem?

What is your (spiritual/material) destination?

Where will your material path lead you?

Is your material path blocking or enhancing your spiritual journey?

"Suffering, injustice, and evil, even our own personal brokenness, are encompassed by a prayer of praise and lose the power to claim primary importance in our lives. They are included mysteriously in our wholehearted trust in the goodness of things. We may still feel the power of darkness that exists everywhere, but we have the freedom to open the door to heaven in our midst and bear witness to a singing universe. This is truly a gift, one that Francis calls forth from his companions, from all creation, and from us.

Believing in the dream of heaven on earth, we live with the confidence that heaven is not only at the end of the journey but accompanies us along the way. At some time or another we have all glimpsed the new creation. Our response? Praise wells up within us. Praise assures us that we live daily in the radiance of God; it gives us strength to choose a freedom, a greater sense of giftedness, and an awareness of our bond with humanity and creation. Our willingness to sing and dance an alleluia – this is the sign of life in the Spirit! This is our ongoing prayer as it was for Francis." (Wayne Simsic, Living the Wisdom of St. Francis)

WHY WE SING

- 3. Our ancestors reveled in this gift, sometimes with God's urging. "Write out this song, then, for yourselves," God said to Moses. "Teach it to the Israelites and have them recite it, so that this song may be a witness for me." 5 The Chosen People, after they passed through the Red Sea, sang as one to the Lord. 6 Deborah, a judge of Israel, sang to the Lord with Barak after God gave them victory. 7 David and the Israelites "made merry before the Lord with all their strength, with singing and with citharas, harps, tambourines, sistrums and cymbals." 6 "Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you? If anyone destroys God's temple, God will destroy that person; for the temple of God, which you are, is holy" (1 Cor 3:16-17).
- 4. Jesus and his apostles sang a hymn before their journey to the Mount of Olives. St. Paul instructed the Ephesians to "[address] one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and playing to the Lord in your hearts." He sang with Silas in captivity. The letter of St. James asks, "Is anyone among you suffering? He should pray. Is anyone in good spirits? He should sing praise." 12



5. Obedient to Christ and to the Church, we gather in liturgical assembly, week after week. As our predecessors did, we find ourselves "singing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in [our] hearts to God."₁₃ This common, sung expression of faith within liturgical celebrations strengthens our faith when it grows weak and draws us into the divinely inspired voice of the Church at prayer. Faith grows when it is well expressed in celebration. Good celebrations can foster and nourish faith. Poor celebrations may weaken it. Good music "make[s] the liturgical prayers of the Christian community more alive and fervent so that everyone can praise and beseech the Triune God more powerfully, more intently and more effectively."₁₄







The Sunday Lectionary readings lead us toward a reflection on our discipleship. I looked to Fr. Ron Rolheiser for insights to this relationship with Jesus.

Thus these things - private integrity, social justice, involvement in ecclesial community, and mellowness of heart - are the essentials of Christian discipleship. Jesus mandates social justice as non-negotiable, not optional, within Christian discipleship. This is clear from Jesus' own life, from the text on the last judgement in Matthew's gospel, and from the fact that in the gospels, on average, one out of every eight lines is an imperative from Jesus to reach out to the poor.

We need the right truth, but also the right energy. Nothing counts for much, no matter how right or orthodox the action, if it doesn't issue from love and gratitude. In T.S. Eliot's words: "The last temptation that's the greatest treason, is to do the right thing for the wrong reason." When our concern for truth, orthodoxy, justice, or morality comes out of a place of anger, bitterness, or judgement, we are no longer acting as disciples of Jesus, no matter how right the cause. No action rooted in bitterness, anger, jealousy, self-righteousness, or in a desire for revenge can ever justify itself in Jesus' name.

But there's still a further question: Is there anything in Jesus' teaching and his challenge to us that might serve as a litmus test? Is there any one, singular, teaching that can serve as a criterion as to who is and who isn't a true disciple of Jesus?

There is. For Jesus, the litmus test for a disciple, at least for a mature disciple, is this: Can you love an enemy? Can you bless someone who curses you? Can you forgive, and can you forgive even a murderer?

It is precisely to this challenge that Jesus refers when he tells us that our virtue must go deeper than the virtue of the scribes and Pharisees. The scribes and Pharisees were, for the most part, sincere and decent men and women who loved God, tried to help the poor, were concerned about truth and morals, and practiced justice. But loving an enemy and forgiving a murderer aren't prescribed by justice, the ten commandments, church dogma, human decency, or even sincerity. They're an invitation to something deeper, an invitation that comes from Jesus' life and teaching, and an invitation that, in the end, constitutes the litmus test of mature discipleship.

Who's a real Christian and who's not? The deepest answer in the gospels would be: The person who can love an enemy, bless those who curse her, and forgive everyone, even a murderer.

P= PRAISE – There is no better way to come to Jesus than with a heart full of praise for how much he loves us, for who he is, and how he radically blesses us! Praise reminds us what Jesus is already doing in our lives.

R=REPENT – Our sins create a wall between God and us. When we confess our sins, it is as though God points to a huge laser from Heaven and collapses that wall to bits! Our guilt is gone. We are free to turn form the sinful patterns in our lives. We are free to live a life that pleases God.

A =ASK – "Ask and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." Matthew 7:7. Remember, nothing is too small or too big to bring to the Lord. He cares about your sick grandfather, your math test, and even what movie you will see on Friday night. Be specific in your prayers and wait for his answers.

Y = YIELD – At a yield sign on the highway, we pause before proceeding to make sure the way is clear. When we yield in prayer, we pause to await God's signal that our path is clear. The Holy Spirit helps us trust that, in Jesus, God will make our paths straight. Trust in Him.


