IT'S MY OPINION AND I HAVE ONE!

In my homily a couple of weeks ago, at the 8:30 and 10:30 masses, I preached on living your life in the spirit as opposed to the flesh. One thing I touched on was an exercise/prayer from Joseph Cardinal Mercier. This is a prayer that I have begun praying each day as I wake up to begin my day. Cardinal Mercier was the Cardinal Archbishop of Mechelen in Belgium at the turn of the 20th century. After the homily many of you asked if I would publish this prayer for you, so here it is.

First Cardinal Mercier stated the following:

"I am going to reveal to you the secret of sanctity and happiness. Every day for five minutes control your imagination and close your eyes to the things of the sense and your ears to all the noises of the world, in order to enter into yourself. Then, in the sanctity of your baptized soul (which is the temple of the Holy Spirit), speak to that Divine Spirit, saying to Him:

O Holy Spirit, beloved of my soul, I adore You. Enlighten me, guide me, strengthen me, console me. Tell me what I should do. Give me your orders. I promise to submit myself to all that You desire for me and accept all that You permit to happen to me. Let me only know Your Will.

If you do this, your life will flow along happily, serenely, and full of consolation, even in the midst of trials. Grace will be proportioned to the trial, giving you strength to carry it, and you will arrive at the Gate of Paradise laden with merit. This submission to the Holy Spirit is the secret of sanctity."

I do hope that this can bring some of you to a place in your spiritual life that you are not.

Also on this 15th weekend of ordinary time, take these thoughts with you as you head for home!

Does the Good Samaritan save the man attacked by robbers or does the man attacked by robbers save the Good Samaritan?

What "law" is in your heart?

How are you reconciled and bring peace "by the blood of the cross."

How do you heal through Jesus' blood?

"He says: It is a joy, a bliss, an endless delight to me that ever I suffered for you. And this is the bliss of Christ's deeds, and this is what he means when he says: We are his bliss, we are his reward, we are his honor, we are his crown. For he still has that same thirst and longing which he had upon the Cross, which desire, longing and thirst, as I see it, were in him from without beginning; ...

For as truly as there is in God a quality of pity and compassion, so truly is there in God a quality of thirst and longing and the power of longing; and the power of this longing in Christ enables us to respond to this longing and without this no soul comes to heaven. And this quality of longing and thirst comes from God's everlasting goodness, and this is the characteristic of spiritual thirst, which will persist in him so long as we are in need, and will draw us up into his bliss." Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship, a revision of *Music in Catholic Worship*, was developed by the Committee on Divine Worship of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). On November 14, 2007, the Latin Church members of the USCCB approved these guidelines. These guidelines are designed to provide direction to those preparing for the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy according to the current liturgical books (in the ordinary form of celebration).

Foreword

Greetings from the bishops of the United States to priests, deacons, liturgists, music directors, composers, cantors, choirs, congregations, and faith communities throughout the United States. "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."¹ It is our duty and our joy as shepherds of the Church to guide and oversee liturgical song in each particular Church. Liturgy is the source of the Church's prayer and action, and the summit by which our lives and all our ministries ascend to the Father. We pray that this document will draw all who worship the Lord into the fullness of liturgical, musical prayer.

I. WHY WE SING

1. God has bestowed upon his people the gift of song. God dwells within each human person, in the place where music takes its source. Indeed, God, the giver of song, is present whenever his people sing his praises.²

2. A cry from deep within our being, music is a way for God to lead us to the realm of higher things.³ As St. Augustine says, "Singing is for the one who loves."⁴ Music is therefore a sign of God's love for us and of our love for him. In this sense, it is very personal. But unless music sounds, it is not music, and whenever it sounds, it is accessible to others. By its very nature song has both an individual and a communal dimension. Thus, it is no wonder that singing together in church expresses so well the sacramental presence of God to his people.

FAITH WORKS

The Good Samaritan parable asks one question: what's more important, duty or hospitality? That's what "who is my neighbor?" really asks. Hospitality and evangelization embrace an inclusive attitude. Welcoming strangers is the first step inviting them to join the followers of Jesus.

Luke painted controversy in terms of a lawyer versus Jesus. The lawyer represented the Pharisees who taught ethnic separation and strict observance to the Law. They also smacked of exclusivity, an "us vs. them" mentality. Inside the group lay salvation, outside the group lay damnation. They rejected the Good News, simply because acceptance would change their mentality.

The lawyer defined and detested the Samaritan so much, he could not call him by his ethnic background. He defined the helpful man by his character: merciful. Notice in his answer the lawyer undercut his own position. He made exclusive claims on God, the Merciful and Lord of all. Yet, it was his enemy that possessed God-like virtues, not the faithful lawyer!

Also notice how Jesus defined the neighbor, not as the victim but as the care-giver. The neighbor was the hospitable evangelist. This image, then, became the standard by which love of others was measured. To truly love others as self meant to act as the Samaritan, the hated man who went out his way to care for the needy.

Jesus' command summed up the moral of the parable: *Go out like the hated Samaritan. Do acts of mercy for whomever you meet.*

As we travel this vacation season, let us remember that, in spite of the risks, we are to care for others as much as we expect to be cared for. Acting with such mercy is the first step in sharing the Good News.

How can I be a good neighbor this summer? At home? On the road?

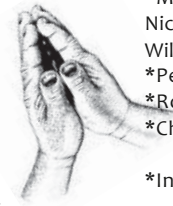

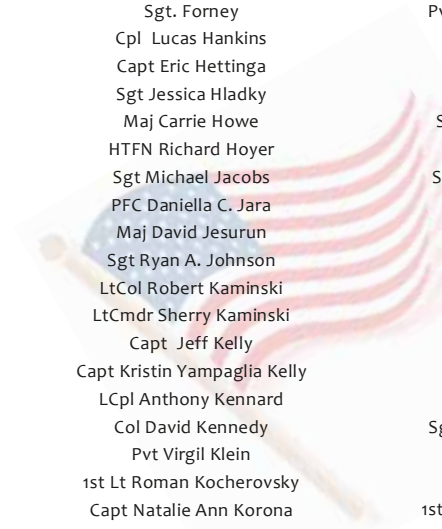
