LISTEN, JESUS IS SPEAKING!!

Today we see two sisters - Martha and Mary. They represent two different approaches to Jesus. You could say a lot about each of the sisters, but the difference is this: Martha wanted Jesus to listen to her, while Mary wanted to listen to Jesus.

This is not in any way to put down Martha. She is a great saint and Jesus clearly had a deep affection for her. "Martha, Martha," he says. To repeat someone's name does not necessarily indicate exasperation, but rather in this case, warmth. "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things."

Most of us, if not all, identify with Martha. We have work to do, problems on our mind, things to finish before we can relax. When we try to pray, our minds spin with a dozen distractions. We remember a phone call we should make, something we need to get at the store, a task that just can't wait.

And - God forgive us - like Martha we sometimes put down the "Marys": "It must be nice. Look at all the stuff I have to do. I wish I could get a break."

Fair enough, but that's not the point. All of us know deep down that the best gift we can give someone is not a thousand dollars or a delicious meal. That would be wonderful, but we want something else. When we think about our lives, we recognized that the best gift someone ever gave us was this: open-ended, undistracted listening. That is the gift Mary gave to Jesus. Martha was busy doing something for Jesus - and, to accomplish it, she wanted Jesus to listen to her. Mary on the other hand, just wanted to listen to Jesus. "Mary," said Jesus, "has chosen the better part."

In our human relationships (friend to friend, husband to wife, parent to child) we can easily recognize the power of open-ended, undistracted listening. Something similar applies to prayer. Jesus has all the time in the world to listen to you or me. He comes from the point of view of eternity, which by definition is undivided and perfectly open-ended. The problem is not on Jesus' side. He can listen to each one, all day and all night. The problem is on our side. We are reluctant to do what Mary did - to put aside other activities and to listen.

Martha is a beautiful person - and all of us can identify with her desire to get things done. And all of us would appreciate the meal she prepares. Still, she also is a liability that we can equally identify with - her anxiety to have other (including Jesus) listen to her. Mary, on the other hand, simply listened to Jesus. And "Mary has chosen the better part," says Jesus, "and it will not be taken from her."

LISTEN!!!!!!!!!!!!!!! Jesus is speaking!



FAITH WORKS

Gene Kijek



On his way to Jerusalem, Jesus led his entourage into the village and the home of Martha. As the good host, she served them. But, her sister, Mary, wanted to be a disciple. Martha tried to shame Mary into helping through Jesus. But Jesus would have none of her shame. Instead, he praised Mary's choice.

Martha was a woman of means. In a gender segregated society, such women were the exception, but they were not unusual.

The actions of Mary were highly unusual. Sitting at the feet of Jesus, Mary assumed the position of disciple learning from a rabbi. In other words, as a fellow student, she made herself the equal of her male counterparts. Jewish women were not expected to receive an education. Her presence and position would have caused scandal as outrageous behavior. (However, upper-class Gentile women many times had some education. Luke's Gentile audience may not have been as shocked as Jewish Christians who heard this narrative.)

Martha approached Jesus so he could shame Mary into helping her. This way, Mary would return to her social role of servant, with the approval of the people around her.

Jesus responded with a meal analogy. While Martha was frustrated with the burdens of service, Mary focused only on one thing, the teaching of the Lord. He likened her choice to choosing a portion at a meal. What she chose would not be taken from her. Implicitly, Jesus recognized her rightful place at the meal of the community.

What is more important when we welcome a guest: getting about the business of serving them, or seating down so we can listen to them?

There is a period of reflection after Adults celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation called "Mystagogia." This is a time of *debriefing* or *letting the reality hit you*. The honeymoon is such a time after the wedding vows - exploring the implications of self-gifting. We eventually realize that Marriage Mystagogia lasts a lifetime.

Back to baptism. The implications of our baptism also last lifetime for we continually are called to respond to the present moments of divine grace. Yet, we regularly wonder did I respond well enough.

A suggestions is to spend a few moments at the end of the day to reflect on this challenge: am I attentive to God within the busyness of my daily life? We need to *debrief* our day, allow *the reality to hit us*. Within all of day's experiences is the God. Without some reflection, we might overlook the opportunities to meeting God.

Prayer Request from St. Vincent de Paul

Since the almost-two-years that the St. Vincent de Paul has been serving the St. John Neumann Community, we have provided temporary shelter to 20 homeless individuals and families. Other SVDP Conferences in the surrounding areas have experienced a similar increase in the number of newly homeless. To investigate how we might better serve this population, not only to provide temporary shelter, but to assist them to obtain adequate housing and financial resources, an Exploratory Committee to End Homeless in Western Wayne County has been formed. To date, we have developed a preliminary proposal, a budget, and a fund-raising plan. We are now seeking interested parties to serve on the board. People with fund-raising experience, attorneys, real-estate development expertise, bankers, clergy and others are welcome to inquire about how they might assist us in this effort.

Most importantly, however, we are in need of prayer. Please pray that our effort will be successful. The following prayer is said by the committee members at the beginning of each meeting. Please add your prayers to ours. As always, we are most grateful for your support.

Hear our prayer today for all women and men, boys and girls who are homeless this day:

For those sleeping under bridges, on park benches, in doorways or bus stations:

For those who can only find shelter for the night but must wonder in the daytime:

For families broken because they could not afford to pay rent.

For those who have no relatives or friends who can take them in.

For those who have no place to keep possessions that remind them who they are.

For those who are afraid and hopeless.

For those who have been betrayed by our social safety net.

For all these people we pray that you will provide shelter, security and hope.

We pray for those of us with warm houses and comfortable beds

That we not be lulled into complacency and forgetfulness.

Jesus, help us to see your face in the eyes of every homeless person we meet

So, that we may be empowered through word and deed,

And through the political means we have

To bring justice and peace to those who are homeless. Amen

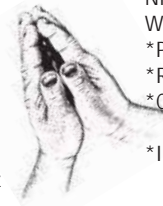
