Hello all!

So this week is the Transfiguration of the Lord, I thought I would give you a brief reflection on this event.

Why did our Lord not manifest His divine glory on Tabor before all the disciples instead of before three of them? First, because He Himself gave the Law through the mouth of Moses: "At the mouth of two witnesses or at the mouth of three witnesses, shall the matter be established" (Deuteronomy 19:15). Therefore, three witnesses are sufficient.

These three witnesses represent three main virtues: Peter Faith, for he was the first to confess his faith in Christ as the Son of God; James Hope, for, with faith in the promise of Christ, he was the first who laid down his life for the Lord, being the first to be slain by the Jews; John Love, for he reclined on the bosom of the Lord and remained beneath the Cross of the Lord until the end.

Are we prepared to see God's glory? God is eager to share his glory with us! We get a glimpse of this when some of the disciples see Jesus transfigured in glory on a high mountain as we see in today's gospel passage. Luke's gospel tells us that while Jesus was transfigured, Peter, James, and John were asleep (Luke 9:32)! Upon awakening they discovered Jesus in glory along with Moses and Elijah.

How much do we miss of God's glory and action because we are asleep spiritually?

There are many things which can keep our minds asleep to the things of God. The life of ease can also hinder us from considering the challenging or disturbing demands of Christ. Peter, James, and John were privileged witnesses of the glory of Christ. We, too, as disciples of Christ, we are called to be witnesses of his glory. The Lord wants to reveal his glory to us, his beloved disciples.

The Summons

This weekend we are singing *The Summons*.by John Bell. The text really challenges us to give <u>all</u> of our person and entire being. I think it also deals with the fear we all sometimes encounter in regard to sharing our faith concretely with others. But the hymn text reminds us of an exciting truth present in current reality: we can live in God and God can live within us. It doesn't get more exciting than that! The hymn comes to us from the lona community. Here is some information explaining the tenants of the community from their website http://www.iona.org.uk:

lona is a small island off the west coast of Scotland, where in 563 Columba founded a Celtic monastery that was very influential in its own times. In the middle ages it was the site of a Benedictine abbey and over the centuries has attracted many thousands of people on their own pilgrim journeys.

The Iona Community, founded in 1938 by the Rev George MacLeod, then a parish minister in Glasgow is an ecumenical Christian community that is committed to seeking new ways of living the Gospel in today's world. Initially this purpose was expressed through the rebuilding of the monastic quarters of the mediaeval abbey on Iona and pursued in mission and ministry throughout Scotland and beyond. The Community today remains committed to rebuilding the common life, through working for social and political change, striving for the renewal of the church with an ecumenical emphasis, and exploring new more inclusive approaches to worship, all based on an integrated understanding of spirituality.

The Iona Community today has almost 250 Members, mostly in Britain, over 1500 Associate Members and around 1400 Friends worldwide. An ecumenical community of men and women from different walks of life and different traditions in the Christian church, its members share a common Rule which includes:

- Daily prayer and reading the Bible
- Mutual accountability for their use of time and money
- Regular meeting together

FAITH WORKS

What measures of success do we have? Why does society reduce success to material wealth, fame, or power? How many of us look out for a "sure thing?" The score. The big pay-off. The retire-

ment check. Watch enough late night cable television and you will find the same "get rich quick" infomercials play over and over. Look beyond the gloss of these presentations and you will find one fact. If you want really to make big money, sell greed!

Is the road to success paved with greed? Jesus didn't think so. In the time of Jesus, there was no middle class, only the few who were rich and the masses who were poor. In the Roman empire, the elite (less than five percent of the population) controlled 80-90% of the wealth. The poor rented land to farm from the wealthy. Greedy bureaucrats served these elite by taxing the poor, and served themselves by "skimming" extra tax moneys for themselves. So the poor were victims in two ways, from land rents and over-taxation. The poor were so burdened that it was not unusual for many to be underfed in times of food surplus; many would actually sell themselves into slavery in order to feed their families.

In that desperate atmosphere, there was the temptation to place prime importance on economic survival. But Jesus questioned that logic: life was more than possessions. To make the point, Jesus told the parable of a rich, self-absorbed man who, on the eve of great material surplus, died. In life, the rich man hoarded, but in death, that what he desired was taken away, leaving his heart empty and his character hollow. So, what is really important? Dying with the most toys? Or, living a life of faith? Accumulating stuff requires greed. But living faith requires a prudent knowledge of good, a sense of justice, an unwavering commitment, and a sense of balance. At the crisis points of life (and ultimately at the point of death) which is more important? Which will carry us through?

Reflect on what you have this week. What could you live without? What do you truly need? Pray God will help you guide you in the accumulation and use of your possessions.

tee to End Homeless in Western Wayne County has been formed. To date, we have developed a preliminary proposal, a budget, and a fund-raising plan. We are now seeking interested parties to serve on the board. People with fund-raising experience, attorneys, real-estate development expertise, bankers, clergy and others are welcome to inquire about how they might assist us in this effort.

Most importantly, however, we are in need of prayer. Please pray that our effort will be successful. The following prayer is said by the committee members at the beginning of each meeting. Please add your prayers to ours. As always, we are most grateful for your support.
