Hello all!

The theme of vigilance propagates itself throughout the readings this weekend. In the first reading we have the vigilance of the people of Israel waiting on the Passover, in the second reading we are touched by the vigilance of Abraham, and in the gospel we are told to wait with vigilance for the coming of Christ.

What does it mean to wait with vigilance?

Let us think about ourselves and who we are. Are we not a society of "planners"? We plan for everything—vacations, our retirement, how we are going to buy a house... When we were kids didn't we plan what we would do with our lives, and we tend to take every precaution to make sure it happens, don't we? The question that is brought to us today in our readings is are we vigilant about Christ, and more directly, are we vigilant in waiting for him to come again?

How do we show our vigilance? Abraham is one model of this vigilance for us. Throughout the reading in Hebrews we are told of Abraham's vigilance by the display of his faith in God. He was one who did whatever God asked of him, to the point of almost killing his own son. He understood that following God and His will was the only way to live life. His faith went beyond believing, it also was displayed in action, an action that God asks of us as well.

At the end of the Gospel, Christ tells us that to whom much is given more will be expected.

We have no idea when Christ will come again, he tells us it will be like a thief in the night, but we need to be ready for his coming at all times. Being ready does not mean sitting back and waiting with faith while doing nothing. Christ tells us clearly 'to those whom much is given much is expected.' That statement is very profound!

We who know Christ and wait on him are being held to a higher level of accountability where He is concerned. As a catholic community we believe we have the fullness of the truth of God. Does that mean that other faiths do not have any of the truth, such as a protestant faith, the Jewish faith, Muslim, Buddhist, etc? No it does not. We believe they have elements of the truth, but not in totality.

If we truly have the fullness of the knowledge, than we should know better about how to act and behave. What do I mean by this? Because we "know the truth" we will be held to a higher level of accountability in the eyes of God.

I liken this to those of you parents with two children. One child is very mature and understands right from wrong very clearly, etc. The other child does not have as clear of an idea about the difference. Now if the two of them do the same thing wrong, you are probably going to look at the one who "knows better" and possibly be more disappointed in that child and hold them to a higher punishment because you know that the more mature child should know better than the other. The same thing applies to us in the eyes of God. If we know the fullness of the truth, more will be expected of us in our lives. So in waiting for Christ to come, if we simply sit back, do nothing but wait, we are not living the life Christ expects of us or any of His people.

To wait with vigilance is to wait while living the mission of Christ, the mission of getting out and loving his people. We need to help others around us, show them care and love. We need to be respectful to the people in our lives, meaning our parents, our brothers and sisters, our friends and our children. We need to give to our community, such as here in our own parish, volunteering my service. If we do not do these things we are not preparing for Christ when he arrives. If we are not living a Christian life than we are the ones who fall asleep when Christ comes in the night. It is only in living the Christian life, the life God has shown us, that we will be awake and ready when Christ comes.

Our vigilance is shown in our actions, founded in living a life of love, care and concern for others. Again, **To those** who are given much, much will be expected!

You Are Mine

This weekend at the Preparation of the gifts we are singing my favorite hymn- or at least one of my favorites! ... You are Mine by David Haas. No matter where you go, when you hear a Catholic parish sing this hymn-without fail they belt this one out. I guess it is because the words are so meaningful and the melody is so nice & easy to sing. Here is some information about David Hass off the GIA publishers website:

David Haas resides in Eagan, Minnesota, where he is director of The Emmaus Center for Music, Prayer and Ministry and serves as campus minister / artist-in-residence at Benilde-St. Margaret's High School in St. Louis Park, Minnesota, where he also teaches in the theology and music departments. Highly regarded as one of the preeminent liturgical music composers in the English-speaking world, he has produced more than 45 collections of original music. His liturgical works are sung and prayed throughout the world and appear in hymnals of many Christian denominations and in many languages.

A native of Bridgeport, Michigan, and the Diocese of Saginaw, Michigan, David is a 1975 graduate of Bridgeport High School and studied vocal music performance, piano, and conducting at Central Michigan University. He completed his studies in music performance, liturgy, and theology at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul. Presently an active member of St. Cecilia Church in St. Paul, he formerly served as director of music and liturgy at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Ankeny, Iowa and The Church of St. Thomas Aguinas in St. Paul Park, Minnesota as well as being composer-in -residence at St. Thomas the Apostle Church in Minneapolis. From 19in-residence at the St. Paul Seminary School of Divinity in St. Paul, during which time he was very active internationally in writing, composing, and presenting workshops and seminars on the implementation of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. During these years, David was part of what is commonly referred to as the "Minnesota School" in collaboration with two of his colleagues, Michael Joncas and Marty Haugen, in producing some of the most popular and effective music for the Church's worship that has appeared in the days following the Second Vatican Council. 85-1988 he was an adjunct instructor and composer- in-residence at the St. Paul Seminary School of Divinity in St. Paul, during which time he was very active internationally in writing, composing, and presenting workshops and seminars on the implementation of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. During these years, David was part of what is commonly referred to as the "Minnesota School" in collaboration with two of his colleagues, Michael Joncas and Marty Haugen, in producing some of the most popular and effective music for the Church's worship that has appeared in the days following the Second Vatican Council.

FAITH WORKS

Are you anxious about the fall? How does that anticipation change your outlook on the summer?

Seasons change. And our plans try to anticipate that change. Parents buy school clothes and supplies for the coming year. Children dread the loss of vacation time. Business people make plans for the year end holidays. Farmers look forward to the fall harvest. We all look ahead, to plan, anticipate. It's part of our culture and our being.

The theme of the end times might seem out of place in the lazy days of summer. As church people, we have this theme preached to us in late November and early December, when we celebrate Christ the King and the first Sundays in Advent. Nonetheless, today's gospel shakes us out of our doldrums, like the little voice in our heads that remind us fall is coming. Just as we anticipate the autumn, we anticipate the coming of the Lord!

Christ calls us to anticipate his return. Jesus gives us two traditional images for action: girded loins and lamps lit. Girded loins prepared one for running. Lamps lit referred to movement at night. Taken together, the images painted quick, nighttime travel. In For Luke, the night referred to the trials (the dark times) before the Final Judgment. In other words, the Christian community should be prepared for fast action, in spite of persecution.

While we might not have fervor the early Christians had, we are to still look forward to his arrival. At the end of the world, Jesus will return to judge everyone according to their actions and their faith. Then, good will definitely triumph over evil. Until that time, we represent Christ to others by our actions and our faith. Our example, then becomes part of our anticipation.

Why study the coming of the Lord now? Actually, we celebrate the his return every time we break bread with him in the Eucharist. We taste him now. But we will realize him in his fullness at the end of time. So, in the Eucharist, we have a "partially realized eschatology." (theology of the end of time)

Have you ever reflected on Second Coming? What insights have you had? How does the belief in the Second Coming change your outlook on the future? Your actions today?
