In the words of the Holy Father Pope Benedict XVI, "Music is, in fact, capable of opening minds and hearts to the dimension of the spirit and of leading persons to raise their gaze on High, to open to absolute Goodness and Beauty, which have their ultimate source in God. The joy of song and music is also a constant invitation to believers and to all men of good will to commit themselves to give humanity a rich future of hope." Tiseo strives to communicate these spiritual fruits of love, joy, peace and beauty through the gift of music. He includes among his influences a wide range of musical styles, including Renaissance polyphony, Neapolitan folk music, heavy metal, and contemporary composers of sacred music such as Tavener and Part. Some of his favorite artists include Genesis, King's X, Iron Maiden, Fr. Stan Fortuna, Massimo Ranieri, Phil Keaggy, and many more. Tiseo grew up in the suburbs north of Detroit where he continues to reside. After completing his undergrad studies in psychology, he spent one year discerning a vocation to the priesthood at Sacred Heart Major Seminary in Detroit. After discerning that his call was to married life, he eventually earned a Master's degree in clinical psychology and works with troubled juveniles in the local community. He is a husband and father of two beautiful children, and considers fatherhood the most rewarding and fulfilling gift of all. In his free time, he dedicates himself to composing and recording music which expresses different aspects of the Divine nature.

THEANDRIC's goals for the future include the completion of a full-length album in 2012, international performances, and building a strong connection with fans of Spirit-filled music worldwide. The name THEANDRIC was chosen for the project as it can refer to the harmony of Christ's human and divine nature, but also to refer to our humble human efforts to cooperate with God in the creative process.

Do You Know Someone You Think Would Be A Good Priest?

Last week, I asserted that Prayer is arguably the most powerful thing we can do as lay people to lead those who are called to the religious life to recognize and act on their calling. Praying for vocations leads to more people answering the call.

At St. John Neumann, we have two programs in place to help you pray for Vocations: Eucharistic Adoration and The Vocations Chalice. This week, I'll talk about Eucharistic Adoration.

What is it? Eucharistic Adoration is prayer and reverence shown to the Blessed Sacrament *Exposed*. "Exposition is a manner of honoring the Holy Eucharist, by exposing It, with proper solemnity, to the view of the faithful in order that they may pay their devotions before It." (NewAvent.com, The Catholic Encyclopedia)

Every Friday at St. John Neumann from about 9:30AM to 6:30PM, the Holy Eucharist is exposed in the chapel. Jesus, present in the Blessed Sacrament, is calling us to come visit with Him. To adore Him. To let Him work with us and through us. To let him pour out his blessings upon us in a particular way.

Spending time with the Blessed Sacrament Exposed does three things. First, it brings us Peace, the peace that only the Lord can bring. In the presence of the Lord, your soul changes. It can't be helped. It's like sitting in the sun and getting a tan. It just happens. Come sit in the presence of the Son and let Him change your soul, and give you His peace.

Second, He convicts us. Whether we like it or not, He knows us. Everything about us. He tells us, This isn't your life. He leads us to repent and to be more like Him. To think as He thinks, instead of how the world thinks. To live in his Freedom, freedom from the slavery of sin. Come, listen to what he wants for your life and ask him for the grace to live as he wants you to live.

Third, it rejuvenates us. It makes us new again. At Eucharistic Adoration, we are literally allowing His face to shine upon us. This isn't just poetry. This is the reality when we pray in front of the presence of the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. We are exposed to His glory and we are made new. We are energized with his Love. Come, soak up his Love and be made new.

Eucharistic adoration is a direct line, too, to praying for Vocations. When you come to Eucharistic Adoration, pray that God shows you who in your life would be right for the religious and consecrated life, and gives you the grace to suggest it to them. And also, pray for God to show you what he wants for your life, what he wants your vocation to be, and for the grace to answer that call.

After each mass next weekend and the weekend after that, we will have new sign up for the Vocations Chalice. As you know, we are always looking for more people to host the Chalice in their homes. If you are interested, please sign up then or by sending an email to the Vocations Committee at <u>Vocations@StJohnNeumann.us</u>. We will get you on the list!

Again, please spend a few minutes each day saying a prayer for Vocations. Also, come to Eucharistic Adoration sometime during the day on Fridays, and spend some time with the Lord. And finally, don't forget to ask "that person" if he or she has ever thought about the religious life. Do it TODAY!!

FAITH WORKS

Jesus painted the parable of Lazarus and the rich man in stark contrasts. On the one hand, the rich man lived like royalty (dressed in purple) and

partied everyday. On the other hand, Lazarus was so poor he would have even eaten from the rich man's garbage; he was so sick that dogs, the animal all Semites hate, came to lick his sores. As detestable as the rich man was, Lazarus was pitiable.

Both men died. The rich man eternally condemned himself with his hard heart. With all pretense stripped away, the rich man realized his predicament when he looked upon Lazarus in the "bosom of Abraham" (i.e., heaven). But even in his prayer and pain, the rich man treated the lowly Lazarus with contempt. When he was denied help, the rich man prayed for a heavenly messenger (Lazarus) to visit his five brothers so they might convert. "Don't they have the Bible?" Abraham responded. This was not sufficient for the rich man. The parable ended with Abraham's response, the rhetorical question of Christian faith; if you do not believe in Scripture, how can you believe in one risen from the dead?

Like many other parables, Luke recorded Jesus words with an eye to his audience and their advisories. In the early church, the Pharisees were seen as rich, while Christians were poor. Pharisees, who became the leaders of universal Judaism after the destruction of the Temple in 70 A.D., ejected Jewish Christians from synagogues late in the first century. Isolated from their own people, Jewish Christians stood alone religiously. Hated as Jews by the general population, they were isolated economically. These Jewish Christians would love to live off the scraps of the rich synagogues.

At the same time, Luke recorded the words of Jesus with an eye toward great irony. "If you do not believe in Scripture, how can you believe in one risen from the dead?" can be restated: "If you do not believe in one risen from the dead, how can you believe in Scripture?" This was direct challenge to the Pharisees. For the Christian, the resurrection of Jesus was the ultimate revelation, one to



which all Scripture pointed. In the Christian mind, faith (and the Bi-

ble) would be impoverished without the resurrection.

Do we recognize the special place of the poor with our service? When we serve them, do we act as if we are doing them a favor, or do we see they are doing us a favor? Do we not realize their presence is an invitation to intimacy with God?

Who are the poor? Most of the time we connect the poor with those who lack material goods. But, look again at Jesus' parable. The poor are the disdained, the hated, those kept at arms length. Those who lack goods might be distasteful to middle class sensibilities. But there are others who lack that we might want to keep at bay. They are simply not like us. They might even be our enemies. At what point do we show them compassion?

In these tragic times in which we are tempted to cry out for vengeance, let us remember we are to seek justice. For justice allows room for compassion.




