So this past weekend I preached on not stepping over/ignoring people. Those of you who were at the 10:30 and 12:30 mass know what I am talking about! Basically the idea was that the rich man completely ignored that Lazarus was laying down at the step of his door and walking over him, completely ignoring his human existence and that we should never ignore anyone especially those in need!

Well after the 10:30 mass there happened to be a family outside holding a sign saying "homeless with 5 children." The mother, father, and one of the children were out there. One of the things asked of me was did I plant these people to see what the reaction of you, the parishioners, would be. First let me say that NO I DID NOT DO THAT!

The other thing I want to say is the following: I know that some of you probably gave money to the family and that was done out of the generosity of your heart, not that I have not done that myself in the past. But I want you to know that as soon as I heard they were out there, I went outside, spoke to the father and brought him into the building. I set him up with our St Vincent De Paul and had them speak to him. One of the reasons for the SVDP is the people who are a part of this organization deal with these situations and know how to determine the true need of people asking.

Though I preached to not overlook people in this world, I generally do not give cash; I help people out in other ways. Personally I have found that someone standing outside a church often is not a person in need, but someone trying to play on the sympathies of the people leaving the house of God. Normally, for me, I offer to buy them food or fill their tank up with gas rather than give them the cash for those things. At the same time, I admit that rather than err on the side of not giving and ignoring, I will give the money as I know many of you did and I am grateful for that.

The reason I write on this is that I am sure many of you were surprised when you were exiting church and saw this family in the parking lot! I wanted to reassure you all that we did take care of the family and set a meeting up for them at the parish. Our Christian Service at St. John Neumann is at work!

Thank you once again for the true charity you hold in your heart for the people of God.



#### Do You Know Someone You Think Would Be A Good Priest?

Last week, we talked about Eucharistic Adoration. This week, I'll talk about the Vocations Chalice program.

The purpose of the Vocations Chalice program is to encourage parishioners to pray to promote vocations to the Priesthood and the Religious life. The parish is blessed to have an available consecrated chalice to use as a tangible reminder of this special intention for the Church. Each week, a different parishioner – any one person, couple or family – takes the Chalice to their home, displays it in a prominent place of honor, and uses it as a reminder to pray for Vocations. When we pray for vocations, we lift up to God those men and women whom He is calling to follow Him in a very special way.

How does it work? First, the Transfer. As most of you have seen, we transfer the Chalice to new parishioners each week at one of the weekend masses. We have set it up so that the transfer takes place at the same mass each week for a number of weeks, and then rotates to a new mass for a number of weeks, and so on. In fact, when you sign up, you can give us your preferred mass time – and who doesn't have one of those!! – and we'll do our best to schedule you on a week that will fit your schedule and preferred mass.

Next, at home. The Chalice comes with a separate packet of information. This packet contains directions on what to do with the Chalice at home and guidelines on how to treat this holy object. The packet also contains a suggested set of prayers to say for the week, a different prayer and intention for each day. You may say the prayers in the packet or pick out prayers of your own. Many participants have set the Chalice on their mantels so they can see it regularly; or have set it up as the centerpiece to their dining room or kitchen table so that they can say the prayers when everyone is gathered for dinner.

The packet also contains additional information on Vocations Awareness and promotion. This information is great for generating ideas on how to identify and encourage young people whom you believe may have been called to a religious vocation.

Finally, the packet contains a journal to document your experience with the Chalice. It is your option as to whether you write something or not. Many people have chosen to do so and all of the entries are beautiful and inspiring!

The last activity to do with the Chalice is to return it to Mass at the end of your week so it can be transferred to the next family. If something comes up where you can't make it to either of your scheduled masses, members of the Vocations committee are available to help facilitate the hand off. We're just a phone call away so that this all happens without a hitch.

The one response we get quite often when we ask people to sign up for the Chalice is that they cannot commit to it right away or that now is not a good time. Just so you know, if you sign up right now, chances are slim to none that you'll get it right away. Here's why. We have between 30 and 40 families that are signed up at the moment and we are continuing to rotate through them. We have only one chalice for this program and each participant gets it for a whole week. Our goal is to have at least enough participants so that we can fill a whole year.

What this enables for you is that when you get on the list today, we can work with you so you can have it in your home when it's just right for you. We may even be able to schedule it for that special religious occasion in your family – First Communion or Confirmation ... or even an Ordination!! Someone from the Vocations Committee will work with you to make the arrangements so that it can all go smoothly.

After each mass this weekend, we will have new sign up for the Vocations Chalice. If you are interested and miss the sign up after mass, you can still sign up by sending an email to the Vocations Committee at <u>Vocations@StJohnNeumann.us</u>.

Again, please spend a few minutes each day saying a prayer for Vocations, whether you have the Chalice at home with you or not. And, don't forget to ask "that person" if he or she has ever thought about the religious life. Do it TODAY!!

## **FAITH WORKS**

FAITH does not arise as a response to something coming out of the stars, and then authenticated by the Church. Neither does it spring solely from the wellsprings

of the heart.

Revelation, or God's self-disclosure, occurs in the ordinary experiences of life.

For the Christian, Jesus Christ is the personification of that revelation and of God's benevolent intentions toward us. However, the Gospel is believable only if it actually helps us to explain and enrich the ordinary experiences of life: whether loving relationships, on the one hand, or tragic misfortunes, on the other.

In other words, we do not have faith because someone in authority or some book tells us to have faith. We have faith because it illuminates and gives deeper meaning to the ordinary experiences of life.

Christian faith is a virtue by which we freely accept God's self-communication in Jesus Christ. Catholic faith is simply Christian faith as embraced and lived out in the faith-community known as the Catholic Church.

The life of faith is a process. We move through various stages of faith-development.

In the beginning, we have the faith of a very young child rooted in images and stories. Their authority is embodied in parents and other significant care-givers. Faith is more a matter of trust than of belief, much less of conviction.

Eventually, the growing child internalizes the rules by which the faith is to be lived. In years past, these rules (commandments, precepts) were committed to memory as if they could be applied to every conceivable situation one might encounter.

Gradually the young person of faith begins to establish some distance between himself or herself and the various mediators of faith (parents, catechists, teachers, clergy). A tension arises between the young person's desire for autonomy and self-expression, and the pull of conformity, both with the Church and with the young person's peers.

At this stage of development, religious appeals that require obedience to authority become less and less effective, while the example and witness of authorityfigures become increasingly important.

At the next stage, that is, of young adulthood, they move outside the family into the larger



world of college or military service or the workplace. Here Facebook they encounter, sometimes for the first time, a wide variety

of beliefs and non-belief.

The young Christian adult is compelled to rethink previous beliefs as well as the system of moral conduct based on those beliefs.


Some fail to make that passage. They either cling rigidly and uncritically to the belief-system inherited from family and Church, or they reject everything outright. Neither is an intelligent and responsible way of dealing with pluralism and diversity.

Healthy persons of faith accept pluralism and diversity, and even learn from it. They rethink their beliefs, which means they rethink their relationships with God, with Jesus Christ, and with the Church. They disengage themselves from some aspects of those relationships, and strengthen and recommit themselves to others.

Finally, they reach the highest, or generative, level of faith when they think always of others ("a faith that does justice"), when they make sacrifices, sometimes heroic sacrifices, for the sake of those of younger generations who will follow them in the faith. Such faith comes from God and, in the end, leads back to God.
