Cucchi's Corner

November 22nd is the feast day of St. Cecilia. A few years ago we had a festival titled "Saints among Us" where we considered lives of Catholic saints that were holy people and human people who lived extraordinary lives. Each saint the Church honors responded to God's invitation to use his or her unique gifts. God calls each of us to be a saint.

St. Cecilia was a third-century Roman martyr. We are left with little more than enduring legends about her life. While still a young girl, Cecilia dedicated her virginity to God. When forced by her family to marry, she converted her husband who also vowed celibacy. One legend tells of "pipes" played at her wedding. Although these pipes were probably the bagpipes common throughout Europe, ancient translations rendered the word "organ pipes." Consequently, St. Cecilia has often been portrayed by a pipe organ. Another legend calls her "the inventor of the organ," while another says an angel fell in love with her because of her musical skill. This heavenly visitant gave her both her and her husband a crown of martyrdom, brought from heaven. With such ample fable and longstanding tradtion, she is considered the patron of music & musicians(Catholic Source Book, Edited by Rev. Peter Klein, 1970).

There are many churches, schools, choirs, orchestras, museums, musical societies and even a religious order- the Dominican Srs. Of St. Cecilia named in her honor. In our diocese there is a St. Cecilia church in the I-96/Livernois area.

JESUS OF NAZARETH was the man who came to tell us that it is all right to trust our hopefulness. "Dream your most impossible dream," he

tells us, in effect. "Hope your most expansive hope, fantasize your wildest fantasy, and you will have just begun. Out beyond those dreams, hopes, and fantasies, the generosity of my heavenly Father only begins. For eye has not seen nor has ear heard nor has it entered into the human heart what the God has prepared for those who return his love."

Our life can begin all over again. Love grows cold and stale, bickering replaces affection, counting up slights and injured feelings has replaced tenderness. If we let hope hold sway we can see possibilities in the other and in ourselves which were not apparent before. The angers and injuries dissolve and love is reborn. Hope has done its work.

Jesus is the man of hope. He is the Christ, the one whose words and deeds reveal the heavenly Father to us as he was never revealed before. Jesus is the "sacrament" of God, the best revelation we will ever have of what God is like. He knew the heavenly Father because he was, as he claimed, on terms of intimacy with him that no one else enjoyed.

Jesus' hope was rooted in the unshakable conviction that the power of God was at work in the world. He called it the "kingdom of God," and we sometimes call it the "reign of God." Whatever words we use, the idea is that God has a plan for the world and that plan is going forward irresistibly. Moreover, Jesus was convinced that this power of God was making a major breakthrough in his time with his appearance. This new inrushing of God's power was a turning point in the development of God's plan, an opportunity not to be missed. Now was the time to reform one's life and to begin again; now was the time to break out of the fixed, narrow, rigid routines in which humans were caught and give full and free rein to their

Jesus not only believed in the kingdom of God, he died for it. He was not only convinced that hope was valid, he went to his death because of that conviction.

Jesus was supremely confident of the triumph of God's plan and of his own victory as the revelation of that plan. God's kingdom would succeed as certainly as does the seed become the tree, as does the tiny grain grow into the harvest. Nothing could stand in its way. Thus one does all one can to seize this pearl of great price, this buried treasure. One plots and schemes, as did the unjust steward, so as not to lose it. One has the wedding garment and is ready to take advantage of every possibility that is offered. One eagerly responds to the invitation before the doors of the banquet hall are closed. In confidence of the success in gaining God's kingdom, one can stop by the wayside to assist an injured enemy. In other words, one lives a life of courage, vigor, confidence, commitment, and generosity. One never stops trying, never gives up, never sinks into a rut, never turns back, never refuses an opportunity to help, never rejects the possibility of reconciliation, never thinks that it is too late to begin again. For the follower of Jesus who hopes in the kingdom of God, tomorrow is not merely the first day of the rest of his life; tomorrow will also be different even when today is the last of his life.


