


Hello All!

Hope you all had a wonderful new year! Since I am writing this article on December 17 (in order to get an article in the bulletin we had to have it turned in by December 20th) I have no idea what my New Years was like except to tell I was watching the ROSE BOWL! I wanted to let you know the plans on renovation of the interior of the Church are still underway. As you recall the major portion of the Changing Lives money went towards the renovation. The architect we are utilizing, Guss Pappas, will be here the weekend of January 11/12, after all the masses, to share with you all the thoughts our design team have come up with. This presentation will take place inside the body of the church after each mass that weekend, so hopefully you can stay and see!

Now, I you hope you recall, I have been sharing the reflection from the reconciliation service we had in Advent. Again the theme was discipleship. Here is the final section of that reflection; I do hope you all have been able to soak this in prayerfully!

Presider:

"So likewise, whoever of you does not forsake all that he has cannot be My disciple."

Until I recognize that everything I have belongs to Jesus Christ, I am not His disciple. Consider Jesus' encounter with the rich young ruler who asked Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus command to him, "Go and sell all you have and give money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then com, follow me.' At this, the man's face fell, and he went sadly away because he had many possessions"

To be a disciple am I willing to give up on the things of which I cling?

Reader:

Do I recognize that all I possess truly belongs to Christ?

Am I willing to let go of what I love most in this world to follow Christ?

Do I care for those in my life though it may cost me in my personal gain?

Do I place my family as more important than my career?

Psalm Response:

Jesus our teacher and our Lord, stooped to wash the feet of his disciples, and he told them, "This is an example; just as I have done, so you must do."

Presider:

"For which of you, intending to build a tower, does not sit down first and count the cost, whether he has enough to finish it."

Jesus does not ask us to give only part of ourselves He is asking us to commit everything. "Salvation is free, but discipleship costs everything we have."

To be a disciple I need to count the cost of Discipleship.

Reader:

Am I willing to give up the sins I cling to in order to follow Christ or does a part of me still hang on to them?

Am I willing to listen to the words of Christ and discount the philosophical thoughts of the secular world?

Am I willing to be mocked for professing my love for Christ or will I go along with the crowd so as not be made fun of?

Am I willing to take the plans I have mad for myself or my children, in order to follow the will of God?

Cucchi's Corner

Did you ever wonder what the origin of some of our most beloved Christmas carols was? The text of Hark the Herald Angels was written by Charles Wesley. The music was composed by Felix Bartholdy Mendelssohn. Charles Wesley and his brother John were leaders of the Methodist movement. Charles lived from 1707-1788. He was educated at the Westminster School & at Christ Church, Oxford. It is said that he got many of his ides for his hymn texts while riding horseback. Wesley wrote more than 6000 hymns during his life. Hark the Herald's original name was "Hymn for Christmas Day".

Every hymn has 2 components: a tune and a text. This tune is named MENDELSSOHN. It is said that Mendelssohn never intended this tune to be sung to a sacred text. Much of his compositions were influenced by Bach, Mozart, Handel & Beethoven. A couple of his other famous works are Midsummer Night's dream & Elijah.

Bless Your Door on Epiphany
The gospel tells us that the magi found
Christ "on entering the house." The door to
your home is a holy threshold. You can bless
those who come in and go out by inscribing

above the door in chalk the first two numbers of the year+C+M+B+the last two numbers of the year. Tradition tells us that the letters stand for the names of the magi: Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. Adolph Adam points out that it may also mean "Christus mansionem benedicat" or "May Christ bless this dwelling." It's appropriate to bless your

door in January—janua means "door" and the first month is the door to the new year.

Leader: Peace be to this house and to all who enter here.

Leader: A reading from Proverbs: "By wisdom a house is built, and through understanding it is estab-

lished; through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures."

Leader: Let us pray: Gracious God, as a shining star once guided the magi to the birthplace of the infant Jesus, so enable those who dwell here to be your light in the world; through Jesus Christ we pray.

All: Amen.

After inscribing the doorway, say this prayer:

God of Bethlehem and Cana,
God of Jordan's leaping waters,
in baptism you bring us into your family.
You wed us and embrace us as your beloved.
May we fill this place with kindness to one another,
with hospitality to guests,
and with abundant care for every stranger.
By the gentle light of a star,
guide home all who seek you
on paths of faith, hope and love.

Then we will join the angels in proclaiming your praise: Glory in heaven and peace on earth, now and for ever.

Amen.

Leader: Lord, remember your children and teach us to pray: **All:** Our Father...

All may make the sign of the cross in remembrance of their baptism.

Leader: May the Lord watch + over our going out and our coming in, from this time forth and forevermore.

All: Amen.

Then sing a Christmas carol.



Queen's Quotes from Religious Formation

Greetings and Happy New Year Salutations,

Today is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord. Epiphany is a Greek word which means "showing" or "manifestation." Today's Gospel tells of the star that guided the wise men to the infant King.

The Magi were, and continue to be, mysterious figures. Some translations call them wise men, while others call them kings. Some call them astrologers and some call them priests. Whoever they were, they traveled a long distance and gave what they had... precious metals, perfumes, spices, to honor JESUS. This is truly an example of how we are called to give our all to Jesus. We are called to go the distance, with only the star of our faith to tell us the way, and offer everything that we have to Christ. What "journey" are you called to make to grow closer to Christ? A Morning with Dr. Janet Smith

St. John Neumann, St. Thomas a'Becket and Resurrection parishes are jointly organizing a mini-conference with Dr. Janet Smith as featured speaker. It will be held on Saturday, 1/11/2014; from 9:00 AM to 12:30 PM. Dr. Smith will give two talks: "The Family As A Path to Holiness", and "The Sexual Mess We Are In And How We Got Here". Dr. Janet Smith holds the Fr. McGivney Chair in Life Ethics and is Professor of Moral Theology at Sacred Heart Major Seminary. An internationally renowned expert and widely published author, she among other things, is consulter to the Vatican's Pontifical Council on the Family. The first 100 arrivals will get a free CD copy of her famous talk: "Contraception: Why Not?"

The Family as a Path to Holiness: When people become parents they must grow-up; they must become more generous, selfless, disciplined, etc. Thus, a major purpose of children is to make adults of their parents! This humorous talk, filled with anecdotes about family life, will help parents realize the importance of their vocation and provide some insight into how to do it well.

The Sexual Mess that We Are In and How We Got Here: Unwed pregnancies, abortion, and divorce have become rampant in our society. The accompanying toll of broken hearts is all around us. How did we get here? Dr. Smith will explore the causes of our culture's radically altered understanding of the meaning and purpose of human sexuality, and its discounting of the belief that babies are a beautiful gift from God. She will discuss the church's answer which is a proven enhancer of marital satisfaction and stability.
