Cucchi's Corner

This month we have been singing the Alleluia by Fr. Jim Chepponis of the Diocese of Pittsburgh. The Alleluia is part of Jubilation Mass. Fr. Chepponis explains in the front cover of the Mass: Jubilation Mass was written over a ten-year period. It was begun in 1987 and was expanded, tested, and altered until written down in final form in 1999.

Fr. Chepponis is a widely published composer. Since 1996, Fr. Jim has served the Diocese of Pittsburgh as Director of the Office for Music Ministry, and his work includes providing music for all Diocesan liturgies, directing the Diocesan Choirs and serving as a music resource person for parishes throughout the city. In July of 2003, Fr. Chepponis was also appointed as pastor of St. John Capistran Parish in the Upper St. Clair, suburb of Pittsburgh. His published articles on music/liturgy have appeared in liturgy periodicals.

Last Thursday we received a shipment of our new hymnals... Gather Third Edition. The main reason we needed to get new hymnals was the third edition of the Roman Missal 2011. With that came new Mass settings with the revised texts. The publisher, GIA has also included some new hymns which we will enjoy learning over the coming years. I presented 2 hymnals at Worship Commission and we decided to go with Gather. This hymnal contents reflect a wonderfully diverse selection of sacred music.

These books, unlike our previous set, have the Sunday readings in the back of the book. I will be posting that # on the hymn board on the second line next to the letter "R" for readings. On Sundays where I use the psalm that is grouped with those readings only 1 number will appear on the hymn board.

Also at the front of the hymnal are many of the texts you may want to refer to: Gloria, Creed, memorial Acclamations, etc...

LENT SOUP AND BREAD SUPPERS and STATIONS of the CROSS

New this year we have added Mac & Cheese and Salad

The three traditional practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. One of the Lenten events that St. John Neumann has offered for a number of years is Friday Soup and Bread Suppers followed by Stations of the Cross. Supper starts at 6:00 PM and runs until we run out of

soup or until about 6:50ish. The soups are meat free, and bread, salad and mac & cheese will also be offered. After dinner there is the option to move to church for Stations of the Cross at 7 PM. At the supper, a donation that would be equivalent to what you would spend on a meal for your family is accepted. **Donations go directly to our St. Vincent De Paul ministry**. Your family is invited to one or both parts of the evening.

There are plenty of opportunities to go beyond just savoring the fine soups that are provided every week. In the gathering area there is a sign up board with the following opportunities for you and your family to participate in:

COORDINATOR: This individual/ family group supervises the kitchen preparations and the evening's activities. They need to be available from 4:45 PM until clean-up is completed. A list of who has signed up will be provided. Making a reminder call to those who have signed up during the week before the supper is helpful to make certain the evening goes smooth. Training and a walk through the kitchen for the team/individual will be provided. Dates open for this are March 7th and March 14th. Please contact Marshall Grazioli at mgraz5@yahoo.com or 734-981-6778 if interested.

SOUP PROVIDER: Please make or purchase 6 – 9 quarts of meatless soup. You may use a meat base like beef or chicken, as long as there are no chunks of meat. In the soup section they do sell vegetable soup stock and soup base. If we are warming, please get it to the kitchen by 5:15 PM; if you are bringing it hot, bring it by 5:40 PM. Possible soups: Vegetarian Chili, Cabbage, Cream of Broccoli, Mushroom, Corn Chowder, Vegetable, Seafood Chowder or your favorite.

BREAD PROVIDER: Please make or purchase One Large Loaf or it's equivalent (about 20 slices). Bring it to the kitchen during the day on Friday by 5:15 PM. Suggestions: Dinner Rolls, Whole Wheat, Rye or other Grain, French or Italian.

MACARONI & CHEESE PROVIDER: Please make or purchase your favorite macaroni and cheese. Bring the prepared dish to the kitchen, 5:15 PM if it will need to be warmed or 5:40 if it is hot and ready to serve.

SALAD PROVIDER: Provide tossed salad (chopped lettuce & veggies) along with a bottle of dressing. Deliver to the kitchen by 5:15 PM.

SET UP CREW: Need to be available from 5:00 PM until 6:00 PM. This team of folks will be responsible for covering and setting the tables, setting out soup bowls, plates, napkins and silverware, preparing beverages, warming food, cutting bread, putting salad in serving dishes and setting up the food area (bread, butter, soup, salad, mac & cheese).

SERVING CREW: Need to be available from 5:45 until 7:00 PM. Possibly help with last minute set up details. Serve and replenish the food and beverages, as needed.

CLEAN UP CREW: Need to be available from 6:45 PM until area is cleaned up. This crew is responsible to clear and clean the dining area and the kitchen. Packaging leftover food or return to provider.

FAITH WORKS

The Word "Lent" Interestingly, the word "lent" comes from Old. Looking at its origin, "lent" is a shortening of the word "lengthen," used to describe the increasing

amount of daylight each day. It was used to describe the harbinger of spring and new life.

When we think of spring we often think of sap running in trees, buds opening, green grass, tulips and daffodils popping out of the ground and we also think of spring cleaning. Lent is a time for spiritual spring cleaning. We clean out the clutter that has accumulated in our lives to make more room for God and one another.

Historical Factoid: Lent Church historians tell us that there is enough evidence to indicate that by the end of the fourth century, a forty day period of fasting was observed in parts of the church in commemoration of Christ's forty days in the desert. But then Lent developed into a penitential season for preparing for Easter. By the end of the fourth century Lent had two emphases: it was the time of formation and preparation for the catechumens who would be baptized at the Easter vigil on Holy Saturday; and it was a time of reconciliation for those members of the church whose sins had separated them from God and the church.

The shape and understanding of Lent changed with time. The public reconciliation of penitents died out, as did the catechumenate. Lent had shifted from a season of baptismal renewal to a liturgical season of fasting.

The Bishops of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) called for the restoration of the original meaning of Lent. Here is what the bishops had to say about Lent in the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy:

"The season of Lent is both a time of preparation for baptism and a time of penance for the faithful, in both cases to prepare for Easter. Hence the practice of penance should be fostered in ways that suit our time and the local region." (#'s 109-110 of The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, in Vatican II in Plain English Vol 2, p. 116)

What the document makes clear is that as a church our Lenten priorities should be: the catechumens' preparation for baptism and the renewal of the faithful in their baptismal commitment. Our repentance during Lent is to be individual and private as well as communal and public.

8TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME





What does it mean to fast? Fasting is making do with less food. The result of not eating so much and getting hungry is that we have a heightened sense of awareness. When we eat too much we have a sluggish feeling. When we fast we are more alert and open to the activities of God in our life. Fasting cleanses our bodies and prepares us to pray more deeply.

When do we fast? Catholics between the ages of 22 and 59 are required to fast. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting. This means that on these days we eat only one full meal with no food in-between meals. It is understood that if one eats three meals a day the two other meals should not total one full meal. Of course, everyone is free to fast at any other time as an aid for prayer and reflection.

Fasting is more than simply developing self control around food. Spiritual fasting reminds us of our hunger for God. Fasting is one of the most ancient practices in Lent. The early church celebrated the Paschal fast---abstaining from food for two days before the Easter Vigil. The Second Vatican Council called us to renew the observance of this tradition "...let the paschal fast be kept sacred. Let it be celebrated everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible, prolonged throughout Holy Saturday so that the joys of the Sunday of the Resurrection may be attained with uplifted and clear mind" (Liturgy, #110).

What does it mean to Abstain? To abstain is to refrain from eating meat as an act of penance and sacrifice. Since innumerable people in the world cannot afford to eat meat, our abstaining from eating it can put us in solidarity with the poor of the world.

When do we abstain? Catholics in the United States abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and all the Fridays of Lent as well as Good Friday. This does not include abstaining from eggs and dairy products. All Catholics who have completed their fourteenth year of age and older are bound by the law of abstinence.


Greetings and Salutations,
