

The Stewardship Commission of St. John Neumann Parish invites you to mark your calendars and reserve the dates of May 2 and 3 for an important event.

For each of us, the Called and Gifted Workshop presents an opportunity to take a deeper look at how we relate to God, asking these questions: Do I have a relationship with Jesus? What is that relationship or how is it defined? Have the gifts I received from the Holy Spirit through Confirmation made a difference in my life? How can I better develop these gifts to enhance my relationship with God? If I truly wish to encounter Jesus Christ in my life, I must examine how to make that encounter happen.

The homilies in recent weeks have urged us to reflect upon what it means to live our faith. It is more than attending Mass once a week. It involves sharing the Good News with others outside of our Catholic rituals. Is my relationship with Jesus reflected in how I live? Do I spread the news of the Gospel by praying outside of Mass and talking about God with others? Or am I uncomfortable praying or talking about God outside of Church?

Don't we have a responsibility to share the Gospel message of Jesus? How can we best accomplish this? The Called and Gifted Workshop helps us prepare for this. We must become aware of our

personal relationship with God and Jesus Christ, exploring the gifts we have been given. Becoming comfortable with Christ in our lives and understanding our relationship with Him is the first step in sharing the Good News with others and becoming true Disciples of Christ, his present day evangelists.



Annunciation

On Tuesday we celebrate the Feast of the Annuciation of the Lord. The **Annunciation** is the revelation from the archangel Gabriel to Mary that she would conceive a child to be born the Son of God. The **Annunciation** on March 25, which as the Incarnation is nine months before the feast of the Nativity of Jesus.

A new hymn to come on the scene in recent years that is associated with the Feast of the Annunciation is No Wind at The Window:

No wind at the window, no knock on the door No light from the lamp stand, no foot on the floor No dream born of tiredness, no ghost raised by fear Just an angel and a woman and a voice in her ear

Oh, Mary, Oh, Mary don't hide from my face Be glad that you're favored and filled with God's grace The time for redeeming the world has begun And you are requested to mother God's son

This child must be born that the Kingdom might come Salvation for many, destruction for some Both end and beginning, both message and sign Both victor and victim, both yours and divine

No payment was promised, no promises made No wedding was dated, no blue print displayed Yet Mary, consenting to what none could guess Replied with conviction, "tell God I say yes."

The text of this hymn was written by John Bell from the Iona Community. This is the same composer of the beloved hymn we sing The Summons (# 700 in our green hymnal).

The Iona Community, founded in 1938 by the Rev George MacLeod, then a parish minister in Glasgow is an ecumenical Christian community that is committed to seeking new ways of living the Gospel in today's world. Iona is a small island off the west coast of Scotland, where in 563 Columba founded a Celtic monastery that was very influential in its own times. In the middle ages it was the site of a Benedictine abbey and over the centuries has attracted many thousands of people on their own pilgrim journeys.

LENT SOUP AND BREAD SUPPERS and STATIONS of the CROSS ***New this year we have added Mac & Cheese and Salad***

The three traditional practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. One of the Lenten events that St. John Neumann has offered for a number of years is Friday Soup and Bread Suppers followed by Stations of the Cross. Supper starts at 6:00 PM and runs until we run out of soup or until about 6:50ish. The soups are meat free, and bread, salad and mac & cheese will



also be offered. After dinner there is the option to move to church for Stations of the Cross at 7 PM. At the supper, a donation that would be equivalent to what you would spend on a meal for your family is accepted. **Donations go directly to our St. Vincent De Paul ministry**. Your family is invited to one or both parts of the evening. There are plenty of opportunities to go beyond just savoring the fine soups that are provided every week. In the gathering area there is a sign up board with the following opportunities for you and your family to participate in:

COORDINATOR: This individual/ family group supervises the kitchen preparations and the evening's activities. They need to be available from 4:45 PM until clean-up is completed. A list of who has signed up will be provided. Making a reminder call to those who have signed up during the week before the supper is helpful to make certain the evening goes smooth. Training and a walk through the kitchen for the team/individual will be provided. **Dates open for this are March 7th and March 14th**. **Please contact Marshall Grazioli at mgraz5@yahoo.com or 734-981-6778 if interested**.

SOUP PROVIDER: Please make or purchase 6 – 9 quarts of meatless soup. You may use a meat base like beef or chicken, as long as there are no chunks of meat. In the soup section they do sell vegetable soup stock and soup base. If we are warming, please get it to the kitchen by 5:15 PM; if you are bringing it hot, bring it by 5:40 PM. Possible soups: Vegetarian Chili, Cabbage, Cream of Broccoli, Mushroom, Corn Chowder, Vegetable, Seafood Chowder or your favorite.

BREAD PROVIDER: Please make or purchase One Large Loaf or it's equivalent (about 20 slices). Bring it to the kitchen during the day on Friday by 5:15 PM. Suggestions: Dinner Rolls, Whole Wheat, Rye or other Grain, French or Italian.

MACARONI & CHEESE PROVIDER: Please make or purchase your favorite macaroni and cheese. Bring the prepared dish to the kitchen, 5:15 PM if it will need to be warmed or 5:40 if it is hot and ready to serve.

SALAD PROVIDER: Provide tossed salad (chopped lettuce & veggies) along with a bottle of dressing. Deliver to the kitchen by 5:15 PM.

SET UP CREW: Need to be available from 5:00 PM until 6:00 PM. This team of folks will be responsible for covering and setting the tables, setting out soup bowls, plates, napkins and silverware, preparing beverages, warming food, cutting bread, putting salad in serving dishes and setting up the food area (bread, butter, soup, salad, mac & cheese).

SERVING CREW: Need to be available from 5:45 until 7:00 PM. Possibly help with last minute set up details. Serve and replenish the food and beverages, as needed.

CLEAN UP CREW: Need to be available from 6:45 PM until area is cleaned up. This crew is responsible to clear and clean the dining area and the kitchen. Packaging leftover food or return to provider. **PLEASE SIGN UP IN THE GATHERING AREA**


How would you describe Catholic teaching on economic life? How does it relate to Catholic teaching about the God-given dignity of every person?

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul-Camp Ozanam

Last year, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul at St. John Neumann Church sponsored 5 young people for a week at Camp Ozanam. Their reactions upon returning were exactly what we hoped they would be – "Awesome! Can we go again next year?" We are happy to tell them that yes, they can go again this year; and we would like to send an additional five kids along with them.

Dennis Oszust, a former camper himself, is the Vincentian who is heading up this campaign. If you know of a child who would benefit from a week away at beautiful Camp Ozanam, please contact us 734-455-5910 ext. 17. Each family will be paid a visit, and each child will be interviewed. A physical is provided at no cost to the family, and the campers are provided with debit cards to the SVDP thrift store to purchase necessary items for camping.

This year, 5 weekly sessions are scheduled between July 7th and August 4th. Three camping programs are offered.

Traditional Co-Ed Camp is for children between the ages of 8-12. Adventure Camp is for children ages 13-14. There are separate camps for boys & girls. Loving Arms Camp – offered with St. John Health Systems- is for children who have suffered a loss of a friend or family member and are having a difficult time dealing with the loss.

All programs include swimming, hiking, nature study, arts and crafts, drama, and sports activities.

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is blessed to have this opportunity to help young children witness the beauty of God's creation. Please help us by thinking of some young person you know of who would benefit from Camp Ozanam. We will do the rest.
