

Hello All!

Next weekend is the beginning of our Parish Mission. As you know, Fr Josh Wagner is going to be here from Monday, April 7 through Wednesday April 8 presenting the parish mission entitled, "The Four Phrases That Will Change Your Life!"

Along with sharing the mission with you, he will also be celebrating all the masses the weekend prior. This will allow all of you the opportunity to get to know him a little bit as he celebrates mass for you.

First question you may be asking is 'what is a parish mission? Here is a little bit of history behind parish missions and what they are:

Parish missions began in the eighteenth century. Saint Alphonsus Liguori, a priest of the Diocese of Naples, made significant contributions to the development of parish missions. The Redemptorists brought them to America one hundred years later.

A parish mission is a preaching event conducted on consecutive evenings. The preaching centers on the Word of God as well as Catholic doctrine and Catholic practice. This preaching emphasizes an individual's personal relationship with the Lord, a deeper sense of the parish community, and a greater consciousness of service within this community.

A parish mission allows you to take some time to look at your life, values, and direction. It encourages you to ask: "What is really important to me? What am I doing with my life? What values do I have? Where does God fit into my life? What does my faith, my Church, mean to me?"

A parish mission is a great opportunity to gain spiritual renewal as both individuals and as a parish.

Second question— 'Who is Fr Josh Wagner?'

Fr Josh Wagner is a classmate and friend of mine from my seminary days in Rome. He is a priest of the Diocese of Columbus and pastor of an inner city parish in Columbus. I have full confidence he will be able to bring to you all the things that a parish mission is about.

Third question—'Why should I come to the Parish Mission?'

Being a part of the mission is an opportunity for you to gain spiritually. Also, the mission allows us to gather together once again as a parish community/family to see how God has graced our lives as a SJN family!

It is my hope to see all of you, at some point, throughout the course of the three days. If you can make all three days GREAT! If you cannot, but can only get to one day, that is GREAT too. And yes feel free to bring your kids—this can be a family event! It is not intended for adults only.

Lastly, on the Tuesday night of the mission, we will be offering the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the Lenten season. There will be a number of priests here to help in that capacity.

Again, I hope you all can attend at least one of the three days!

Laetare Sunday

This Sunday which is the 4th Sunday of Lent is also called Laetare Sunday. Laetare is the Latin word for rejoice. At this point we are half way through Lent and we anticipate the joy of the Easter season. It is common for a priest to wear pink vestments on this day to mark this Sunday as different from the other Sundays in Lent.

Laetare Sunday, so called from the *incipit* of the Introit at Mass, ("Rejoice you with Jerusalem; and be glad for her: exult and sing for joy with her.") This Sunday is also known as Mothering Sunday, Refreshment Sunday, Mid-Lent Sunday (in French *micarême*), and Rose Sunday.

Mothering Sunday-from Mediæval times when the appointed epistle spoke of "Jerusalem, which is above, is free, which is the mother of us all" (Gal. 4.26). Since then it has been a day on which we give thanks not only for our earthly Mother, but also for Mother Church and our Lady, our spiritual Mother. On this day it is thus customary for children to give their mothers a bouquet of sweet violets, and in Rome the Pope blesses the golden rose.

Refreshment Sunday derives its name from the Gospel reading for that Sunday prior Vatican II the feeding of the five thousand, and the relaxation at Mid-Lent for Christians to be refreshed in order to continue the Lenten journey.

Rose Sunday, because the golden rose sent by the popes to Catholic sovereigns, used to be blessed at this time.

Discerning your call will give you a new perspective on your life and will help you to be more fulfilled in your work and in your relationships. Our parish is sponsoring a teaching team from the Catherine of Siena Institute in Colorado Springs to offer the introductory Called & Gifted workshop, which will be on Friday, May 2, from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm, and Saturday, May 3, from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. Everyone is invited to participate. To register, please turn in the registration form found in the gathering area to the parish office. Space is limited, and registration must be received by April 13.



LENT SOUP AND BREAD SUPPERS and STATIONS of the CROSS ***New this year we have added Mac & Cheese and Salad***

The three traditional practices during Lent are prayer, fasting and almsgiving. One of the Lenten events that St. John Neumann has offered for a number of years is Friday Soup and Bread Suppers followed by Stations of the Cross. Supper starts at 6:00 PM and runs until we run out of soup or until about 6:50ish. The soups are meat free, and bread, salad and mac & cheese will



also be offered. After dinner there is the option to move to church for Stations of the Cross at 7 PM. At the supper, a donation that would be equivalent to what you would spend on a meal for your family is accepted. **Donations go directly to our St. Vincent De Paul ministry**. Your family is invited to one or both parts of the evening. There are plenty of opportunities to go beyond just savoring the fine soups that are provided every week. In the gathering area there is a sign up board with the following opportunities for you and your family to participate in:

COORDINATOR: This individual/ family group supervises the kitchen preparations and the evening's activities. They need to be available from 4:45 PM until clean-up is completed. A list of who has signed up will be provided. Making a reminder call to those who have signed up during the week before the supper is helpful to make certain the evening goes smooth. Training and a walk through the kitchen for the team/individual will be provided.

SOUP PROVIDER: Please make or purchase 6 – 9 quarts of meatless soup. You may use a meat base like beef or chicken, as long as there are no chunks of meat. In the soup section they do sell vegetable soup stock and soup base. If we are warming, please get it to the kitchen by 5:15 PM; if you are bringing it hot, bring it by 5:40 PM. Possible soups: Vegetarian Chili, Cabbage, Cream of Broccoli, Mushroom, Corn Chowder, Vegetable, Seafood Chowder or your favorite.

BREAD PROVIDER: Please make or purchase One Large Loaf or it's equivalent (about 20 slices). Bring it to the kitchen during the day on Friday by 5:15 PM. Suggestions: Dinner Rolls, Whole Wheat, Rye or other Grain, French or Italian.

MACARONI & CHEESE PROVIDER: Please make or purchase your favorite macaroni and cheese. Bring the prepared dish to the kitchen, 5:15 PM if it will need to be warmed or 5:40 if it is hot and ready to serve.

SALAD PROVIDER: Provide tossed salad (chopped lettuce & veggies) along with a bottle of dressing. Deliver to the kitchen by 5:15 PM.

SET UP CREW: Need to be available from 5:00 PM until 6:00 PM. This team of folks will be responsible for covering and setting the tables, setting out soup bowls, plates, napkins and silverware, preparing beverages, warming food, cutting bread, putting salad in serving dishes and setting up the food area (bread, butter, soup, salad, mac & cheese).

SERVING CREW: Need to be available from 5:45 until 7:00 PM. Possibly help with last minute set up details. Serve and replenish the food and beverages, as needed.

CLEAN UP CREW: Need to be available from 6:45 PM until area is cleaned up. This crew is responsible to clear and clean the dining area and the kitchen. Packaging leftover food or return to provider. **PLEASE SIGN UP IN THE GATHERING AREA**

FAITH WORKS

Jesus said, "Unless a seed dies, it remains a single seed; but if it dies, it produces many seeds and then much fruit."

This is a fundamental law of life; that dying is important for living. This is a law of human psychology; it is a law of human sociology; it is a law of human relationships. It is a law of divine spirituality. And the law is this: it is in dying that we begin living. It is only by first dying before we will ever begin living.

St. Francis of Assisi knew this law well when he wrote in his famous prayer for peace; "it is in giving that we receive; it is in dying that we are born again."

The Apostle Paul knew this law well when he said: "We will not be united with Christ in a resurrection like his, unless we are first united with Christ in a death like his."

So what does that mean? This fancy language about dying to begin living. If your dying hasn't been good this past week, neither has your living. And if you haven't been dying this past week, you haven't been living. And they don't say that on Pepsi commercials.

Jesus talks about dying to self. It means dying to selfishness. It means dying to "the big I," the old Adam, the attitude that I am going to live for me, my wife and my family, the purpose of my life is my self fulfillment and me experiencing all that life can give me. Life is preoccupied with me and my happiness; I am preoccupied with myself, my successes, my failures, and what other people are thinking about me; that I am the center of the universe. That's what an infant believes; that the infant is actually the center of the universe and everything revolves around the infant's needs. (Infants are like black holes in space; they suck up our time and energy like a black hole absorbs light.) Many people grow up but remain infants; still believing that they are the

center of their universe. They never grow up but experience infantile paralysis; being paralyzed by their self-centeredness. But when life revolves around me, I am not really living at all. When that childish self-centeredness finally begins to die, finally I begin to live.


That's what we call "sin". Each one of us struggles with our own sinfulness. I have mine and you have yours. It is only as our personal sinfulness dies daily that we begin to live.

Sounds very difficult - getting rid of sin, escaping self-centeredness. But God has given us a built-in antidote. We already know how to die, how to pour out ourselves for others. When spouses change their attitude to live for their beloved, when parents choose to give up sleep, time, finances and their future for their children, they are practicing "dying." The are giving up their lives for those whom they love - so that they live a fuller and more complete life. What might seem as a sacrifice is seen as a "necessary" sharing of life, a dying to self to produce more seeds.

Jesus invites us to follow him in the journey of "dying to self." He asks us to broaden our horizon in giving of ourselves. It seems worth it to stay awake in the middle of the night to soothe away a child's nightmare or to spend extra effort in taking out the stains in the family's laundry.

But what about the people we don't love or even like? Jesus asks us to follow him and stretch our vision to include those others. He is our role model. On the cross he forgives his torturers.

Lent is about encountering our self-centeredness and looking for ways to focus on others, giving our lives away to them. Yes, it takes a lifetime to complete the process. "Unless a seed dies, it remains a single seed; but if it dies, it produces many seeds and then much fruit."

The Society of St. Vincent de Paul-Camp Ozanam

Last year, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul at St. John Neumann Church sponsored 5 young people for a week at Camp Ozanam. Their reactions upon returning were exactly what we hoped they would be – "Awesome! Can we go again next year?" We are happy to tell them that yes, they can go again this year; and we would like to send an additional five kids along with them.

Dennis Oszust, a former camper himself, is the Vincentian who is heading up this campaign. If you know of a child who would benefit from a week away at beautiful Camp Ozanam, please contact us 734-455-5910 ext. 17. Each family will be paid a visit, and each child will be interviewed. A physical is provided at no cost to the family, and the campers are provided with debit cards to the SVDP thrift store to purchase necessary items for camping.

This year, 5 weekly sessions are scheduled between July 7th and August 4th. Three camping programs are offered.

Traditional Co-Ed Camp is for children between the ages of 8-12.

Adventure Camp is for children ages 13-14. There are separate camps for boys & girls. Loving Arms Camp – offered with St. John Health Systems- is for children who have suffered a loss of a friend or family member and are having a difficult time dealing with the loss.

All programs include swimming, hiking, nature study, arts and crafts, drama, and sports activities.
