

Hello All!

Well this weekend is the Body and Blood of Christ, so I wanted to say a few things about the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

One of the main attacks our Protestant brethren have on the Catholic Church is often focused on the Eucharist, mainly our Evangelical and Fundamentalist brethren. However the foundations of the REAL PRESENCE of Christ in the Eucharist are clearly found in Scripture. In chapter six of Johns Gospel, Christ speaks about the sacrament that will be instituted at the Last Supper.

Jesus says: "I am the living bread which came down from heaven; if any one eats of this bread, he will live forever; and the bread which I shall give for the life of the world is my flesh.' The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, 'How can this man give us his flesh to eat?' (John 6:51-52).

Our Protestant brethren who like to dispute this claim that Jesus is not talking about physical food and drink, but about spiritual food and drink. These are the same brethren who interpret Scripture literally in other areas but choose to make a figurative interpretation here! Hmmm?

However Paul, in Corinthians, confirms the REAL PRESENCE: "The cup of blessing which we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread which we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" (1 Cor. 10:16)

The History of our Church shows the Christian community never doubted the REAL PRESENCE in the Eucharist. Given this, it leads me to the dilemma I see regularly.

How often I watch people receive the Eucharist and walk out to their car. I as your pastor am not going to stop you from doing so, that is a personal choice, but at the same time I have to say I do not understand it. I see in the Eucharist the love Christ has for all of us. And to see people receive the Body and Blood of Christ, and leave as if I just receive a snack, PAINS me to the soul!

I believe the reception of such a great gift deserves reverence and prayer upon the reception. So, I ask that we all consider this in our worship. I believe we all need to bring forth some reflection and ask ourselves do I truly see in the Eucharist the Body and Blood of Christ sacrificed on the Cross or do I view it as our Protestant brethren as something merely symbolic. As a Catholic there is only one answer and that is He is present to us in the Eucharist! Given that He deserves our reverence upon our reception of His Body and Blood!

Cucchi's Corner

Sequence for Corpus Christi

The sequnce is a chant sung or recited during the Mass on the Feast of Corpus Christi, before the proclamation of the Gospel. At one time there were sequences for many feasts in the Church's year. Currently only four remain: *Victimae paschali laudes* (11th century) for Easter, *Veni Sancte Spiritus* for Pentecost (12th century), *Lauda Sion Salvatorem* (c.1264) for Corpus Christi, *Stabat Mater* for Our Lady of Sorrows. I invite you to pray this one:

Lauda Sion Salvatorem

Zion, praise your Savior. Praise your Savior. Praise your leader and shepherd in hymns and canticles. Praise him as much as you can, for he is beyond all praising and you will never be able to praise him as he merits.

But today a theme worthy of particular praise is put before us -- the living and life-giving bread that, without any doubt, was given to the Twelve at table during the holy supper.

Therefore let our praise be full and resounding and our soul's rejoicing full of delight and beauty, for this is the festival day to commemorate the first institution of this table.

At this table of the new King, the new law's new Pasch puts an end to the old Pasch. The new displaces the old, the reality the shadow and light the darkness. Christ wanted what he did at the supper to be repeated in his memory.

And so we, in accordance with his holy directions, consecrate bread and wine to be salvation's Victim. Christ's followers know by faith that bread is changed into his flesh and wine into his blood.

Man cannot understand this, cannot perceive it; but a lively faith affirms that the change, which is outside the natural course of things, takes place. Under the different species, which are now signs only and not their own reality, there lie hid wonderful realities. His body is our food, his blood our drink.

And yet Christ remains entire under each species. The communicant receives the complete Christ -- uncut, unbroken and undivided. Whether one receive or a thousand, the one receives as much as the thousand. Nor is Christ diminished by being received.

The good and the wicked alike receive him, but with the unlike destiny of life or death. To the wicked it is death, but life to the good. See how different is the result, though each receives the same.

Last of all, if the sacrament is broken, have no doubt. Remember there is as much in a fragment as in an unbroken host. There is no division of the reality, but only a breaking of the sign; nor does the breaking diminish the condition or size of the One hidden under the sign.

Behold, the bread of angels is become the pilgrim's food; truly it is bread for the sons, and is not to be cast to dogs. It was prefigured in type when Isaac was brought as an offering, when a lamb was appointed for the Pasch and when manna was given to the Jews of old.

Jesus, good shepherd and true bread, have mercy on us; feed us and guard us. Grant that we find happiness in the land of the living. You know all things, can do all things, and feed us here on earth. Make us your guests in heaven, co-heirs with you and companions of heaven's citizens. Amen. Alleluia.

Greetings from the Stewardship Commission,

Thanks to all of you who participated in the Called and Gifted workshop. It was well attended with approximately 120 participants, most from SJN and some from other states such as Indiana, and from various places throughout Michigan. The presenters were engaging and inspiring. SJN was fortunate to have been able to provide this opportunity.

Thank you to all of you who helped with food, set up, clean up and any other aspect of the workshop, including participation.

As a follow up to the Called and Gifted Workshop, we are attempting to facilitate one on one interviews for discernment of charisms, as referenced by the presenters. It looks like there will be time slots available for several days next week. More interviews may be scheduled for next month. Also the day time interviews on June 25 are for parish staff only. The fee for this service is \$25 (cash or check) which you will give to the interviewer at the time of your meeting.

We are currently working with a calendar program that can be emailed to participants and allow you to sign up directly on the calendar for a time that suits your availability. This calendar will allow you to schedule an appointment with an interviewer to discuss your own Spiritual Gifts Inventory.

FAITH WORKS

Last week Jesus debated with a Jewish audience. In John 3:16-18, he discussed spiritual rebirth with Nicodemus. In today's gospel, he finds himself in a fiery dialogue with

a Jewish crowd. They traveled across the Sea of Galilee to see Jesus after they witnessed of a great miracle: the multiplication of the loaves and fish (see John 6:1-15). Jesus challenged their reason to seek him out. They wanted a prophet to follow. But Jesus offered them something more than food to feed their bellies. He offered them the feast of eternal life! And, so, the dialogue continued with the audience on the physical plane and with Jesus on the spiritual plane.

Jesus used the phrase "I AM" to denote the divine presence within Jesus. "I AM" refers back to the title God revealed to Moses at Mt. Sinai (Exodus 3:14-15). This title, YHWH in the Hebrew text, was connected with the verb "to be," not in the context of existence but activity ("to be doing something"). Jews believed their God lived because he actively intervened time and time again their history. Unlike the dead idols of neighboring peoples, the Jews proudly called their God, the "living" God, the One that got the job done.

Jesus used the idea of the living God when he described himself as the "living" bread from heaven. He bridged the title "I AM" with bread. Unlike the manna God sent the Hebrews as they wandered the desert, Jesus came to feed people as the living bread. Jesus, then, connected his identify (I AM, the living One, the divine presence) to his mission (bread from heaven to feed the world).

Jesus is the bread that "came down from heaven", but he "will give" this bread (his flesh). Notice the shift in verb tense from the past to the future. The past refers to the Incarnation; the future refers to his death on the cross. With this simple shift in time, Jesus again emphasized the thematic change from his identity to his mission.

The crowd began to grumble about Jesus' claim. How could Jesus give his flesh as food? Even though people complained to each other, the thrust of their argument went against Jesus. Jesus responded emphatically. "Amen! Amen! I say to you!" Then, with an "if...then" statement, Jesus divided his audience into the spiritually dead and the spiritually living.

Those who do not eat and drink have no life, for they have no intimacy with the "Son of Man." Taken together as a Semitic phrase, the term "flesh and blood" referred to the entire person. The phrase, "Son of Man" flowed from a reference to everyone (like the phrase "G.I. Joe" referred to all American fighting men in World War II; see Psalm 8:4) to a reference to the Messiah (see Daniel 7:13). The phrase "Son of Man" made Jesus like everyone else. It also made him God's Chosen. With these two converging meanings, the

instrument for universal salvation. Those who had direct intimate union with the Son of Man had eternal life, for they possessed God's very life. Those who did not existed as empty shells.

To drive the point home, John used an unusual verb in 6:54a: "The person gnawing on my flesh..." This graphic image connected the eater to the food, the believer to the Master. The believer must not nibble the flesh of the Master. No, to feast on the bread of life required a full commitment from the believer!


What did Jesus mean by "true food" and "true drink?" In the context of ancient times and the context of the verse, the word "true" meant "only." The body and blood of Christ, then, were the only food and drink that really mattered.

The divine presence within Jesus ("I AM") was the only thing that mattered. Everything else paled in comparison. In the same way, intimacy with Jesus (flesh and blood) was the only thing that really matter for the believer (eat true food...drink true drink).

Jesus used bread to compare believers and unbelievers. Believers gnawed on the bread (the flesh of Jesus) that gives life. They shared a table fellowship centered on the Lord. And they became part of the Body they consumed.

Unbelievers (symbolized by the Jewish antagonists of Jesus) held they lived close to God, for their ancestors ate the manna bread from heaven (i.e., their ancestors based their lives solely upon God's providence). But there was a difference between one truly living close to God and believing one lived close to God because that person enjoyed a good life. Living close to God involved risks (being misunderstood and even persecuted for faith); enjoying God's favor merely meant a relatively comfortable life. The one who chose intimacy with God was spiritually alive. The one who simply paid lip service to God for his blessings was spiritually dying.
